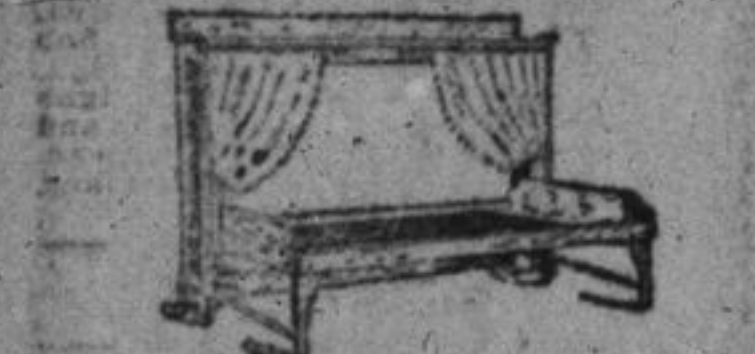

REV. R. E. KNOWLES TO BE CHIEF SPEAKER.
At the Dinner of the Arts Men on Wednesday Night—Grant Hall Secured for Coming Events.

The regular meeting of the Alma Mater Society was held in Convocation hall Saturday evening. The request of year '11, Arts, for the use of Grant hall for the evening of 28th inst., was granted, the occasion being the annual of the junior year dance. The musical committee will have the hall Wednesday evening, Feb. 9th, when Hamburg, the piano virtuoso, appears under their auspices. The science dance will be held, Friday evening, Feb. 11th.
Arrangements were made for the conducting of a mock parliament at the regular meetings of the society and with this end in view cabinet ministers were chosen who will elect their premier. A. D. Cornett, B.A., will act as leader of the opposition. The annual of the session will take place next Saturday night when the speech from the throne will be delivered. The students' orchestra will supply the musical programme for the evening and it is altogether likely that J. R. Mott will address the meeting.

It is expected that O. A. Wheeler, president of the Canadian Alpine Club, will deliver a lecture at Queen's university Saturday evening, January 22nd. His subject will be "Mountain Heritage." The lecture will be illustrated.
With arrangements for the Arts' dinner now almost complete there comes the happy announcement that the students are to have the privilege of listening to one of the most brilliant after-dinner speakers in Canadian life to-day, Rev. Robert E. Knowles, B.A., the powerful preacher, author, who has graciously consented to honor the arts men on this the occasion of their first annual dinner. Mr. Knowles, in the literary world, is heralded as the "Magna Carta of Canada," and his reputation as an orator is no less unique.

OLD RESIDENT DEAD.

Mrs. Margaret Jones Passed Away at Williamsville.

Death, on Sunday, removed one of the oldest residents in this district, in the person of Mrs. Margaret Tremere, wife of the late John Jones. Deceased passed away at her home in Williamsville, after a very short illness. The late Mrs. Jones was close to ninety-five years of age, and was in good health up to Wednesday last, when she was stricken with an illness which proved fatal. In spite of her years, Mrs. Jones was very active up to the last, and in fact was very smart for her age, being able to look after the household duties as well as many a younger person. Mrs. Jones was born in this vicinity, and for close upon seventy years, had lived in the house in which she died. She has a large circle of friends, who will be very sorry to learn of her death. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Samuel Woods, of Vancouver, B.C., and Miss Emma, at home, and two sons, John Jones, undertaker, of Odessa, and Edward Jones, of the States.

HAD TO PAY A FINE.

Had No License to Conduct Second-Hand Store.
In the police court this morning Cornelius Jones was fined \$5 and costs, or twenty days for carrying on business of second-hand store without having the necessary license. Constable Samuel Arniel was the complainant in the case. Jones said that he had purchased a pair of hockey skates and boots, but was ignorant of the law in regard to the taking out of a license. He did not want to break the law.
The magistrate pointed out to Jones that every person who carried on business of this kind had to take out a license and that all who had a license had to keep a book showing all the purchases and sales, the book to be open for inspection by the police at any time, as this was one way in which constables could trace stolen goods. Constable Arniel came across the boots and skates in a search of a pair reported stolen from Bernard McConville. The boots and skates he recovered were identified by McConville as his property.

HE TOOK HIS LIFE.

A Lifer Hanged Himself in His Cell.
During the night one of the guards was startled to find the body of a man hanging to a dock in one of the cells of the penitentiary. He speedily called help and the dead body of Falem Assaly was found. He had used some of his bed clothes with which to strangle himself. Assaly was an Assyrian, about thirty years of age and had been in prison but a few months. He was sent from L'Orignal, his sentence of death for murder having been commuted to life imprisonment. Assaly murdered a relative in the east, and after committing the crime made off. He was out during a terribly cold period and was found with his feet so terribly frozen that amputation was found necessary. His body, after a coroner's inquest, will be interred here.
