**CASE TO GO TO HIGH COURT.**



PRINCESS ROSIGLIOSI

Rome, Jan. 13.—The Rosigliosi marriage case will be tried next week by the high court of the Roman Rota. As a rule the bench of this tribunal consists of three ecclesiastical judges. This case, being regarded as one of great importance, will be tried by six judges. The sentence will be in the form of an answer, either affirmative or negative, whether the marriage, contracted in Washington by the princess, is null.

Princess Rosigliosi is an American born in New Orleans in 1870. She was Miss Mary Jennings Reid, and in her youth went to Washington, where she married Mr. Parkhurst, of Bangor, Me., who later divorced her, keeping their two children for himself. She next went to Rome and soon became engaged to Prince Giuseppe Rosigliosi, head of a famous old historical family, and in August 27th, 1907, the latter will inherit the title and the estate. The princess was practically boycotted both by the church authorities and by Roman society, as well as by the Rosigliosi family.

Princess Rosigliosi then appealed to Cardinal Martini, papal delegate in the United States, and he reported to the pope in favor of the annulment of the princess' former marriage. The pope, after long hesitation, finally agreed to reopen the case and ordered the Rota to review the evidence.

**SOME TWO BILLIONS  
BROUGHT INTO COUNTRY WITHIN TEN YEARS.**  
The Budget Debate is Now Proceeding in Parliament—Life of the Naval Policy "A Miserable Proposal."

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—The budget debate was resumed in the House of Commons, yesterday, by M. S. Schell, Oxford, who laid stress upon the immense amount of money brought into Canada by immigrants, both from the United States and from overseas, which he placed at \$2,000,000,000 within the past ten years. He also emphasized the reduction of the tariff involved in the additions to the free list, which he calculated at \$74,654,279 during the past twelve years, and argued that this was proof that the policy of the government was more in the direction of free trade than that of its predecessors. The home market had developed more rapidly than had the export trade, but while this was a proof of national growth, it ought not to prevent the further development of our exports, especially of dairy products.

R. S. Lake, Qu'Appelle, opened his speech by characterizing the naval policy of the government as "a miserable proposal," and went on to argue that Canada should "do her duty and her whole duty to the empire." He proceeded to "ensure the govern-

**YOUNG PEOPLE MARRIED.**  
One Girl Married in Pembroke Court.  
Pembroke, Ont., Jan. 11.—The first marriage that ever took place in Pembroke police court was celebrated last Friday. Chief Butler acting on information duly given him, made a raid on the notorious Holden household and lodged the whole of them in the cells on Thursday night. The next morning Richard Holden, the father; Mrs. Rozena Holden, the mother, and their four daughters—Mary, aged twenty-three; Marguerite, aged twenty-two; Selina, aged eighteen; and Catherine, aged fifteen—were charged before Police Magistrate Mitchell, the father and mother with being the keepers of a disorderly house, and the four daughters as inmates thereof. The evidence of Frank Fulme and other witnesses proved the character of the home, and the magistrate sentenced the father and mother to six months in jail, and the four daughters to two years less one day in the Mercer reformatory at Toronto. The sentence was received with loud lamentations on the part of the girls, especially the eldest one, Mary, who made a strong plea to Frank Fulme, with whom she had been living and who acknowledged himself to be the father of the child she had in her arms, to save her from going to the reformatory by marrying her. At first Frank was not inclined to do so, but after some persuasion from the magistrate he at last consented, and after he had procured the necessary license, the services of Rev. Mr. King were secured, who married them then and there. The comical side of the pathetic scene came in when the newly-married man wanted the minister to christen not only the child of which he (Frank) acknowledged the parentage, but another which his wife previously had by another man, but the reverend gentleman could not see his way clear to do this.
