GENERAL LOCAL LEAGUE HOCKEY MATCHES.

On Thursday evening the first games in the junior city league were played, on the Palace rink, when St. Mark's defeated the Y.M.C.A. team, two goals to nothing. At half time no score had been made by either team. The game was fast and clean, and for juniors was a fine exhibition. This league is developing some fine material, and on the management want to be wise and allow the players to play in the O.H.A. if they are good enough. The St. Mark's team, from Barriefield, are a clever seven, and if they play all season as they did against the Y.M.C.A., they should win out.

R.C.H.A. Beat Wormwits.

At the Palace rink, on Thursday evening, the second game in the senior series of the Kingston amateur hockey league was played between the R.C.H.A. and Wormwits' teams, the former winning out four goals to two, after a hard game. At half time the score stood one all. The teams were evenly matched and played fine hockey, the large number of spectators being well pleased with the game. For the winners White and Baker were the stars and Jordan in goal played a star game. For Wormwits Singleton, Duffy and Stanton played good hockey. It was the soldiers team work and combined rushes that won them the game. Wormwits have just as much speed and just as good strong players but they seem to lack the combination which only constant practice will give. The teams: R.C.H.A. To Play At Picton.

The Junior Frontenacs left at 9:15 o'clock this morning for Picton to play their third game in the first round of the junior O.H.A. James Sutherland and Samuel McCullough accompanied the team.

Sporting Notes.

A defence man in the game is worth two game men on the fence. "Jerry" Lafamme has been elected captain of St. Michael's senior O.H.A. champions. Renfrew's defeat will likely bring on another big attempt to get "Tom" Phillips from Vancouver. Colored players will be allowed in the new outlaw baseball league being promoted by Dr. G. H. Lawson, of Providence. Several have already been signed. There are twenty-five men named Williams playing professional baseball, twenty-nine named Clark, thirty-four named Brown and seventy-three named Smith. Roy Thomas, left fielder of the Boston Nationals, has been unconditionally released. He will coach the baseball team of Pennsylvania University next spring. The Renfrew curfew did not ring till after the Wednesday evening hockey contest was over, as every mother, father, sister and brother was out to see the fracas. Johnson says that two colored men have never been known to draw a large purse, and he is going to keep his eye on that \$101,000 and not bother about Langford. "Tom" Longboat, the fleet-footed Indian, and Percy Smallwood, the Welshman, who holds the world's mile distance championship title, have been matched to race the twelve miles distance in the Exposition rink, Pittsburgh, Pa., on January 25th. His age declaration filed with the O.H.A. gives his birthday as April 26th, 1890.

Granted New Lease.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 11.—Paul Clein convicted of murder in the first degree by a jury in the Spokane county superior court last fall on the charge of killing Jan. Lewandowski, has been granted a new lease of life. Judge J. Stanley Webster holds that a state court has no jurisdiction to try or punish a person for a crime committed upon a government reservation, and in granting a motion for a new trial he said there is no evidence that the body was dragged by the place where it was found, on March 21, 1900. Fred C. Pugh, prosecuting attorney of Spokane county, says in a note to Joseph B. ... United States district attorney, that while he looks upon the order as equivalent to a dismissal, he believes the proof of guilt is strong, adding that he will furnish evidence, records and data in his possession with a view to bringing the prisoner to justice. Clein manifested his satisfaction when Judge Webster granted a new trial, but in conversations afterwards he appeared to take it as a matter of course, stoutly maintaining his innocence, as he has since the night of his arrest.

Death of Captain Hunter.

Colour, Ont., Jan. 11.—Word has been received here of the death in Millbrook of Capt. John Hunter, a highly esteemed resident of that village, and father of "Sam" Hunter, the famous cartoonist. Capt. Hunter was eighty-two years of age and had lived in Millbrook the greater part of his life.

DR. JONESCO ON STOVAINE.

He Thinks it Will Soon Displace Chloroform.

New York, Jan. 11.—Dr. Thomas Jonesco, the eminent advocate of stovaine in surgical operations, has sailed on the steamer Adriatic for Europe. Dr. Jonesco performed twenty-three operations while in America with the use of stovaine. "Naturally the doctors here wanted to have the usefulness of my method proved to them," said the surgeon, "and I think it will be found that within two or three years stovaine will have displaced chloroform as an anaesthetic in surgical operations."

A Map of Canada in Stained Glass.

Canada, London, Dec. 10th, 1909. An excellent specimen of the stained glassworkers' handicraft is afforded by a novel map that has been prepared for the west-end office of the Grand Trunk railway system on Cockspur street, London, S.W. On a solid sheet of glass, 1 1/2 inches thick, measuring 12 feet in length, and 6 feet broad, a faithful reproduction of the map of the Dominion of Canada, has been executed. The names of places in great numbers, the rivers, the lakes, and the mountains are clearly shown, while the distinctive colors for the various provinces, comprising the dominion and adjacent territories of the United States, have been burned in to ensure fixity. Stretching across the continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific may be easily followed the route of Canada's altered route, the Grand Trunk Pacific, by means of which millions of square miles of new grain-producing territory are being opened up to the settler. The work not only affords a graphic idea of the vastness of the great dominion, but also gives an impressive idea of this 3,600 miles of new road. The preparation of the map was a delicate task, since it is the largest piece of stained glass work that has ever been attempted. It required the combined services of eight expert operators continuously for five months, and it is one of the most costly reproductions of a map that has ever been undertaken. In its manufacture the great difficulty was to obtain a result which would be quite legible in daylight, and which would yet be sufficiently transparent to allow of illumination by means of twenty-four twenty-five candle power lamps by night. The delicate blending of the various tints, the definition of the finest hair-like lines, and the distinctness of the names renders it a work of artistic and educational value. Owing to its fragile character and large size, combined with its great weight of one ton three hundredweight, its transport from Birmingham, where it was manufactured, to London had to be carried out by special means.

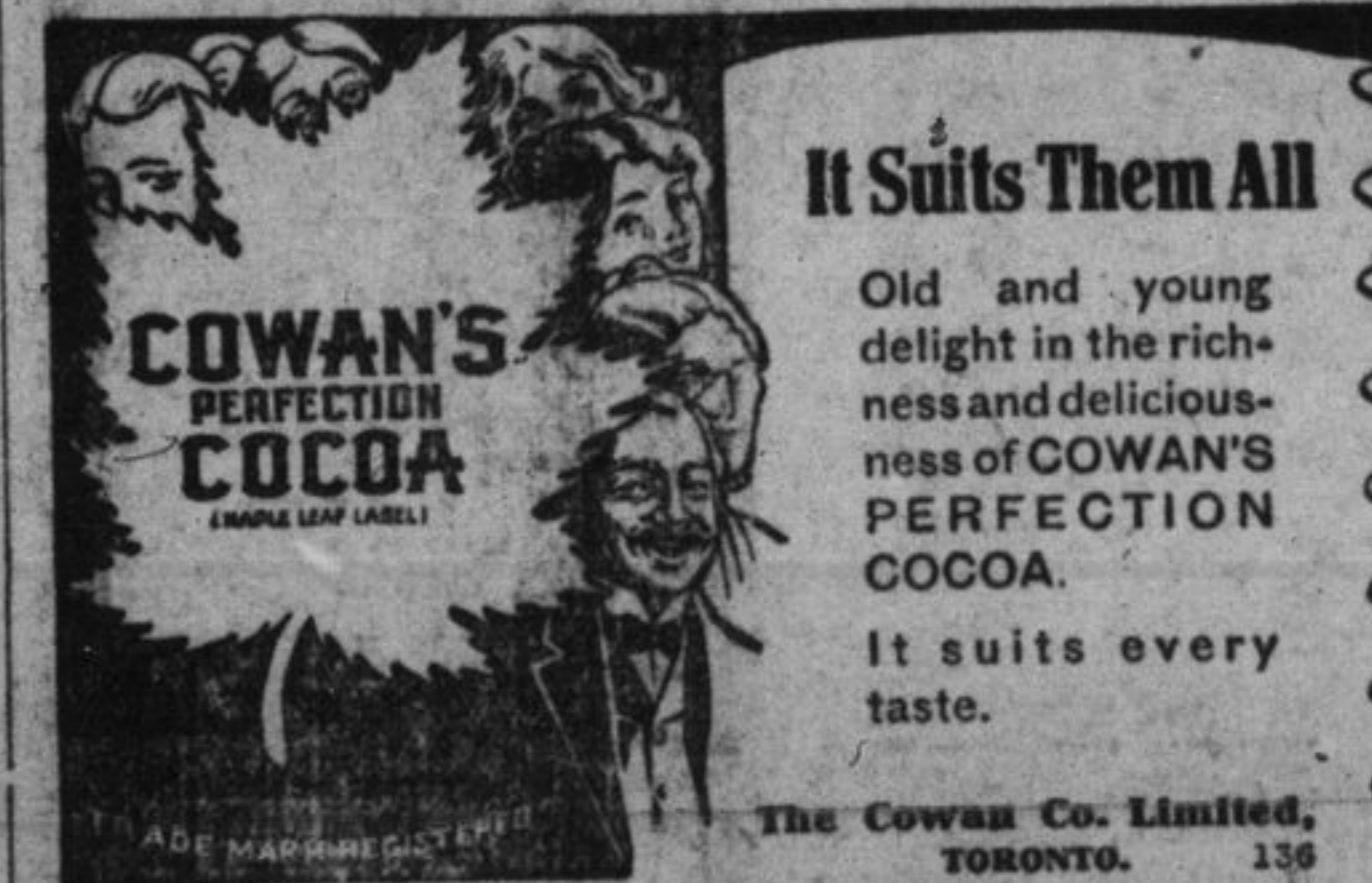

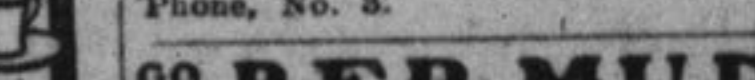
