

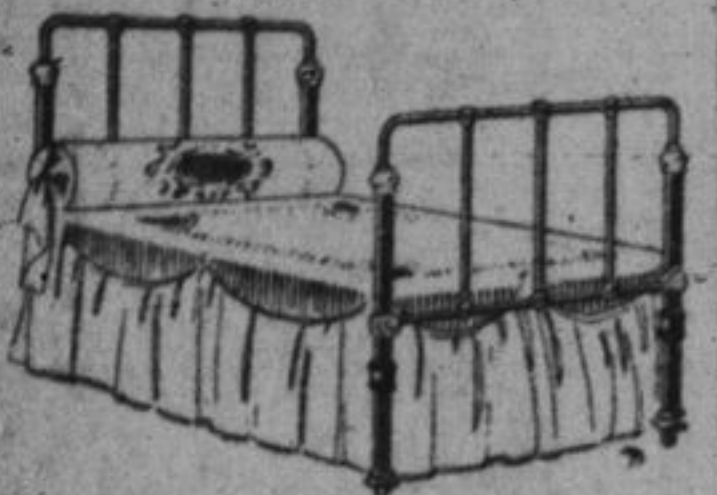

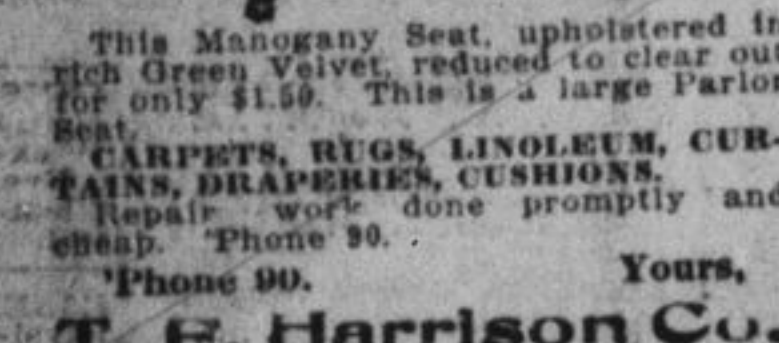

SORROW AT QUEEN'S
OVER THE DEATH OF MRS. DANIEL M. GORDON.

Passing of the Principal's Wife Was Very Sudden on Friday Night—Attended a Dinner Party at Her House Early in the Evening.

There is great sorrow throughout the city, to-day, over the death of Mrs. Daniel Gordon, wife of the esteemed principal of Queen's University.

Mrs. Gordon passed away at 11:30 o'clock on Friday night, after a few hours' illness of an affection of the heart. She had been troubled with this affection two years ago, but in recent months was much relieved.

On Friday evening, although not feeling in the best of health, she came down to a small dinner party, and sat and helped through a couple of the courses. Feeling a little weak, she retired to her room. About eight o'clock she had a chill, and Dr. Third was summoned, and relieved her. When the doctor left, Mrs. Gordon was resting quite comfortably. Later she had another attack, and the end came with great suddenness.

The late Mrs. Gordon's maiden name was Eliza S. Maclean. She was the daughter of Rev. John Maclean, Presbyterian minister, at Belfast, Prince Edward Island, and afterwards of Kilschrean, Scotland. In 1869 she was married to Rev. Daniel M. Gordon, then pastor of St. Andrew's church, Ottawa. In 1882 she went with her husband and family to Winnipeg, and in 1887 to Halifax. The family came to Kingston in 1903 when Dr. Gordon was appointed principal of Queen's.

Her children consist of three sons and two daughters—Rev. Alexander Gordon, of Lethbridge, Alta., who has been visiting at the family home for the past three weeks; Huntley, of Dundas, William, of Brisbane, Australia, and Misses Katie and Minnie at home.

Queen's university students and faculty deeply mourn the death of Mrs. Gordon, for, socially, she was the mother of the institution. In the seven years that she has resided at her university home, she has been a kind and gracious hostess. Only those intimately connected with Queen's have any idea of the amount of entertainment the principal's wife has done. The whole student body was her family, and seldom was there an early evening event at the university, but what Mrs. Gordon was not prepared to entertain the participants at her home. Every organization at the university was remembered, and so it was that the students loved the principal's gracious wife who ever had them in her thoughts. To them there to-day, a great blank at Queen's by the removal from their midst of one they revered so much.

The Union Jack is flying at half mast on the old arts' building out of respect to the memory of the deceased. The funeral has been arranged to take place on Monday afternoon at three o'clock from the family residence.

SATURDAY POLICE COURT.
Case Against Restaurant Keeper Was Further Adjudged.

In the Saturday police court Ben Lee, proprietor of the Chinese restaurant, King street, pleaded "not guilty" when charged with allowing liquor to be consumed on his premises. J. B. Walker appeared on behalf of the accused. Inspector Wright, who is prosecuting the case, was not ready to go on and the magistrate consented to an adjournment until next Friday morning, when witnesses will be summoned to give evidence.

Michael Hogan, who has been on remand a week on a charge of drunkenness, was sent over for another week. The magistrate wants to find out where Michael secured his liquor, as he was on the list, but Michael's memory is so poor that he has been unable to tell. Perhaps another week will be sufficient to brush up his memory.

Two drunkards were also on the carpet. One was fined \$10 and costs, and the other was taxed \$2 and costs.

In the juvenile court six children were before the magistrate for truancy. The parents were also summoned and they were given a final warning that they must in the future send the children to school.

HELD JOINT INSTALLATION.
Officers in Chosen Friends Lodges Installed Friday Night.

On Friday night, Councils Nos. 20 and 217, of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends, held a joint installation of officers, in their hall, and there was a large attendance of members.

Dr. J. H. Bell, grand medical examiner of Hamilton, was the installation officer. W. Campbell, of Hamilton, grand organizer, was to have been present, to take part in the proceedings, but was unable to do so, owing to the severe snow storm, in the west and the fact that he had to be in Sudbury, on Saturday. After the installation, addresses were delivered by Dr. Bell, Dr. McCarthy, Dr. Richardson, Joseph Wilson, chief councillor, R. C. Bell, and others. Following are the officers installed:

The auditors, Messrs. James Gowan and Capt. Kirkwood brought in their report, which showed that the sum of \$10,165 had been handled during the year, and that the surplus over all expenditure, amounted to \$518.80. The membership at the close of the year 1909 was shown to be 675. There were four deaths during the year. The council is, at the present time, in a better condition, financially, than it has been in the past twenty years.

Eighteen applications were read for membership, and there were seven initiations. In addition to the surplus, it might be of interest to state that the lodges have room furnishings, valued at between \$200 and \$1,000.

DROPPED DEAD ON STREET.
Former Kingstonian's Sudden Death at Ogdensburg.

Word was received in the city of the death of Mrs. Margaret Mallette, a former Kingstonian, in the person of Mrs. Margaret Mallette, wife of Capt. Justin Mallette, Sr.

Mrs. Mallette dropped dead on Main street, about 10:30 o'clock, on Sunday night, as she and her husband, and two friends, were on their way home from spending the day with friends in the west side of the city. On the way home, Mrs. Mallette suddenly began to gasp for breath.

"I'm dying, I can't breathe, I'm smothering," were her last words, as she fell into her husband's arms, and quickly expired.

For many years Mrs. Mallette had suffered from heart disease, and this was the cause of death. She was sixty years of age, and was born at Cornwall, where the family lived until sixteen years ago. Besides her husband, she is survived by two sons and two daughters, Delbert, Justin, Clara and Mrs. Jennie Blanchard.

Mrs. Mallette was a devoted member of St. Mary's parish, and was a faithful and loving wife and mother. The funeral took place on Wednesday morning, from the family residence, on Hamilton street.
