MILITARY COLLEGE SALARIES.

What the Auditor-General Has to Say About Them.

The auditor-general's report for 1908-09 shows the salaries paid the staff of the Royal Military College were: Col. Taylor, \$3,200; Capt. de-Bury, \$2,500; Capt. Russell-Brown, \$2,500; Capt. Cochrane, \$2,500; I. E. Martin, \$2,500; W. E. Butler, \$2,500; Lieut. Dawson, \$1,400; Lieut. Blair, \$1,400; Lieut. Hennessy, \$1,095; Capt. Kaubach, \$2,000; Capt. Shine, \$2,500; Capt. Mozley, \$2,500; Rev. A. Laird, \$2,300; J. M. Lanoz, \$2,300; Capt. Dawson, \$1,500; Lieut. Macklem, \$1,500; Maj. Kilborn, \$1,916.25; total, \$57,011.25.

Regarding these salaries, J. Fraser, auditor-general, wrote the deputy-minister of militia, as follows:

"Section 7, Chap. 43, R.S.C., 1906, states: 'The salary of the commanding staff shall not exceed three thousand two hundred dollars a year, and the salaries of the staff adjutant, professor, instructors, assistant instructors and staff, shall be fixed, and may be readjusted from time to time, by the governor-in-council and shall not exceed the total sum of thirty thousand dollars.'

"Please explain why the provisions of this section quoted above have not been followed. I may also say that the \$57,011.25 does not include extra duty and allowances paid to the superior staff amounting in 1908-09 to \$3,249.09 nor does it include the amount of the subordinate staff amounting to \$13,698.54 for the same fiscal year."

The deputy minister replied: "In accordance with a ruling given by my predecessor, who was an able lawyer, my minister did not consider that it was necessary to amend the act with regard to the salaries of the commanding staff of the Royal Military College, provided the increases had been authorized by order-in-council and the necessary sums of money had been provided for in the annual estimates of the department and voted by parliament. Such action was, in itself, considered a sufficient amendment to the act, and has always been taken before any increase in salary was granted, to the commandant or any of the staff. However, in view of your notification, and in order to remove any possible grounds for complaint on the score of illegality in future, my minister intends bringing down this coming session, the attached draft amendment to the Royal Military College act."

The amendment reads, thus: Section 7 of the Royal Military College act, Chap. 43, of the revised statutes, 1906, is repealed, and the following is substituted therefor: "The salaries and allowances of the commandant and of the superior and subordinate staffs of the college shall be as fixed from time to time by the governor-in-council."

The following are the best menus submitted:

I—Tomato soup, croquettes, fish croquettes, meat pie, potato cakes, Waldorf salad, cheese straws, apple snow, toiled custard, coffee—Anita Minnes.

II—Tomato soup, croquettes, fish balls, beef steak croquettes, creamed potatoes, celery salad, cheese pudding, apple charlotte, coffee—Margaret Mackenzie.

III—Puree of celery, fish croquettes, potato soufflé, beef steak croquettes, bechamel sauce, Welsh rarebit, brown Betty, apple snow, demi tarte—Anita Sutherland.

IV—Fish balls, fried tomatoes, beef croquette, celery salad, Waldorf salad, crackers, apple fritter, coffee—Martha Evans.

V—Tomato soup, rice and meat croquettes, celery salad, snowballs and vanilla sauce, crackers and cheese, apples—Nora Martin.

VI—Tomato soup, fish balls, creamed potatoes, celery salad, cheese sandwiches, Dutch apple cake, creamy sauce, tea—Bessie Hill.

VII—Tomato soup, croquettes, fried potatoes, broiled steak, Dutch apple cake, celery, cheese, crackers, tea—Ruth Anglin.

VIII—Cream of tomato soup, croquettes, fish balls, potato salad, apple tapioca pudding, vanilla sauce, coffee—Lorraine Allen.

UNDER THE CITY DOME.

How Will the Vote on License Reduction Stand?

Some of the aldermen are not so sure that Mr. Craig's motion to reduce the tavern liquor licenses from twenty-eight to twenty-five will receive the favorable vote of the city council. They anticipate that the vote will be close in any event. With all members of council present, it will take twelve to carry the reduction motion. Those who are counted upon to vote for it are: Ald. Craig, Harrison, Armstrong, McCartney, Chown and Bailey. The stand of the others is uncertain, but the reductionists hope to secure the votes of the mayor and Ald. Toye, Hart, McKay, Hoag, McCann, Clugston and Graham. That would make fourteen, and a clear majority. A reduction of three licenses would mean a loss of only \$500 in revenue to the city this year.
