WALKS AND ROADS

ROAD PAVING BEFORE THE BOARD OF WORKS.

Street Railway Company Not Likely to Bear Any of the Expense—Four Miles of Walks to be Laid This Year.

City Engineer Craig does not think that more than four miles of concrete walks will be laid this year. There are now only ten miles of boardwalks in Kingston, and in three years these will nearly all be replaced. At present there are forty-four miles of permanent walks in the city. The opening of new streets will add another mile of roadway. There's no place in Canada that has better walks than Kingston.

The Board of Works does not anticipate any trouble in securing the property for the extension of Upper William street. Satisfactory figures to both sides are expected to be fixed. COMMERCE BANK BUYS

Sound Property at Corner Brock and King Streets.

The Ontario syndicate has closed a deal with the Canadian Bank of Commerce whereby the latter purchases the syndicate property at the corner of King and Brock streets, consisting of Reid's butcher shop and Wallace & Parks' flower saleroom. The syndicate had intended erecting a building itself and renting the corner as a drug store and the upper portion to the Oddfellows of the city. Then the Bank of Commerce entered into negotiations for the property and it was announced, to-day, that the deal was about closed for the purchase. The bank intends erecting a handsome building, and the local branch will occupy the lower flat.

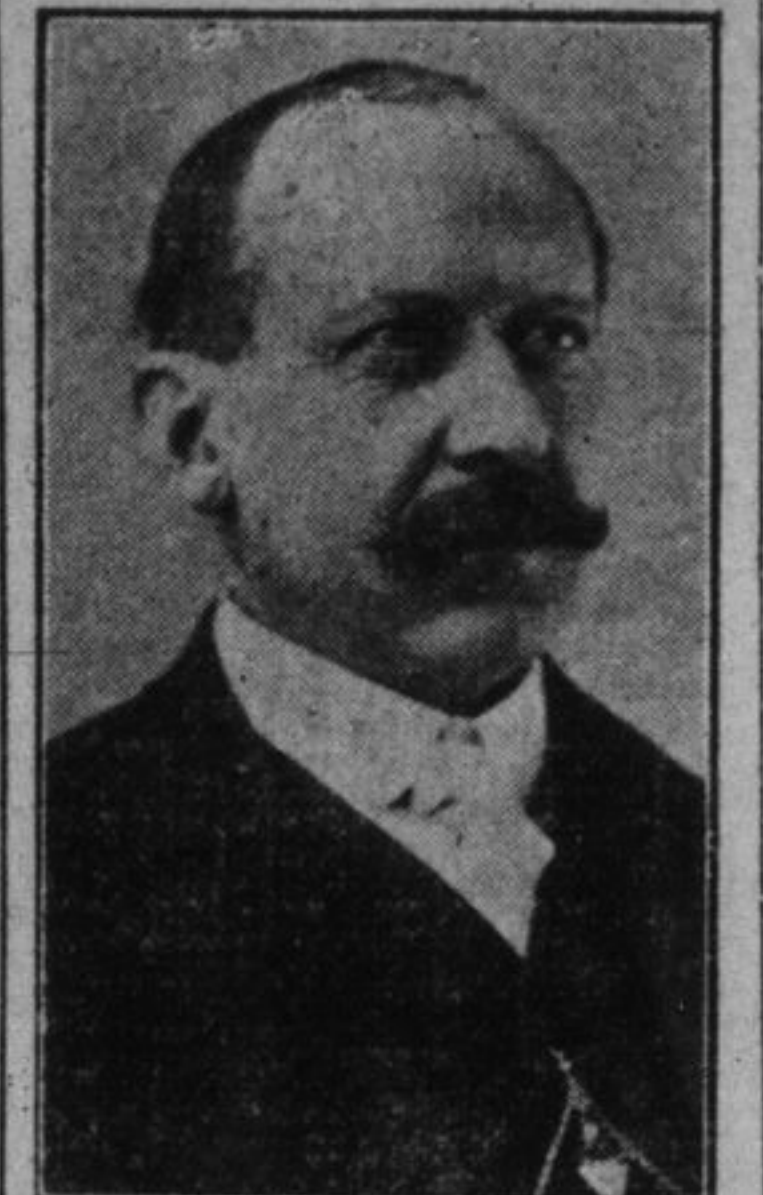
Given Cat-o'-Nine Tails For Truancy.

Modern steamships have a very brief life as compared with the old sailing vessels. This vessel was retained as a royal yacht until the reign of George I, by whose orders she was sold. As the Betsy Cairns she sailed to the West Indies and back for over fifty years and then, after another change of ownership, was employed as a collier until February 17th, 1827, when she struck a rock and was totally wrecked.
