NEW INTAKE PIPE

CONSIDERED BY THE WATER-WORKS COMMITTEE

As Necessary for Kingston—Superintendent Hewitt Asked to Urge Its Adoption—The People Will Have to Decide the Question.

The opinion of this committee is that the time has arrived for the installation of a new intake pipe, and it is desired that the superintendent furnish data with a view to such installation and submit the same at the next meeting of this committee. This resolution was adopted by the water works committee at its meeting yesterday afternoon, after a short discussion on the advisability of adding a second intake pipe to the water works plant. The matter came up in connection with the board of health's resolution asking that steps be taken so that a hydraulic test of the intake pipe could be made from time to time. The fact that leaks have been discovered in the present pipe difficulty is experienced in making repairs. The work has an auxiliary pipe at the present time the leaky pipe could be repaired at leisure, while the auxiliary could be brought into play.

Ald. McCartney wanted to know what use a hydraulic test was. The pipe might show leakage but that kind of a test would not show the locality of the leak. Superintendent Hewitt stated that his hydraulic test would show very little and it was difficult to carry it out when only a few hours' supply of water could be stored in the tank at Williamsville.

In reply to Ald. McCartney the superintendent said that three leaks had been found in the present pipe close to shore. The leaks amounted to two and a half gallons a minute. One of the leaks had been closed, but the diver had to root about in order to remedy the other two. It was here that the chairman, Ald. Craig, declared that there should be a duplicate pipe. He favored putting in a thirty-inch one and extending it further out than the present pipe. Then there would be no trouble. It would be up to the people to say if they wanted this extra pipe. There was a clamoring for pure water, and this was in favor of putting in a pipe to vote upon the question of putting in a second intake pipe. It would be a wise move, he said, if the committee took up the matter. A second pipe would be required some years hence anyway, and now that the question of contaminated water had arisen he thought this was the very best time to deal with the matter.

In reply to Ald. Craig the superintendent said that a new intake pipe thirty inches in diameter would cost about \$25,000. He stated that it would be a wise thing if another pipe was installed. Ald. Craig remarked that it would be a most progressive step for the committee to take. The fire underwriters' association for some time past had been asking the city to increase the amount of its water supply.

Er. McCarthy—"That \$10,000 that last year's council confiscated from the water works would come in very handy now." Replying to Ald. McCartney the superintendent said that the present intake pipe extended 2,700 feet into the harbor. Of this distance 200 feet was the old water works' pipe. The present situation of the mouth of the pipe, he said, could not be bettered. It was in the middle of a good lake current. He didn't think that there was any necessity of carrying a new pipe further out. He agreed with Ald. Craig that the new pipe should not be less than thirty inches in diameter. The outer 2,500 feet of the present pipe was twenty-four inches.

Ald. McCartney asked the superintendent what caused the water from many taps, early in the morning, to come out a dark brown color. He had noticed this in his own house and wondered if the water was impure.

The superintendent replied that doubtless the pipes through which the water passed in such cases were old iron and the water lying in them over night caused rust. That was all it was.

The committee then decided to instruct the superintendent to report upon the cost, etc., of a new intake pipe. Asked For Flat Rate. W. J. Crothers interviewed the committee and asked for a flat rate for water supply to his biscuit factory on Wellington street. Last year the factory paid \$166 for water. He said that a manufacturer had as much right to receive a flat rate as a livery or a hotel. The citizens who were employing a lot of labor and paying wages to many hands should receive consideration. Mr. Crothers held that \$400 a year was enough to charge him for water supply.

The members present were satisfied that the Crothers factory deserved some consideration. Ald. McCartney and McCartney suggested a rate of \$120 a year. Ald. Craig thought it might be made \$100. As there wasn't a quorum present the matter was held over till next meeting.

Two residents of Alvington avenue applied for reduction of rate on account of three more consumers on that street having been added. It was shown that there was no agreement whereby there was to be a reduction. Furthermore, the additional consumers were paying more than the others and were getting water from a 4000 extension of the Alvington main. All consumers live just outside the city limits.

The question of building a roof on the water tank in Williamsville was discussed. The superintendent said that a cover on the tank would be useless. The worst thing ever found in the tank was a piece of carpet. Sometimes fish were found. If a roof was placed on the tank there would have to be an opening underneath to admit light because at times the tank had to be cleaned, painted and repaired. The superintendent said he wouldn't recommend any cover. Ald. McCartney suggested in order to keep birds off the edges of the tank that nails, with the sharp ends upwards, be placed upon them. Birds would then not roost there.

The superintendent said that the danger of getting things into the tank was purely imaginary. Ald. McCartney thought, however, that something might be done to satisfy the public mind, and he thought his method the cheaper way. The superintendent said that Ald. McCartney's suggestion was all right, and it might be carried out. The motion of Ald. McCartney it was decided to recommend to the council the scheme above suggested.

In attendance at the meeting were Aids. Craig, McCartney and McCartney.

IN CHARGE AT GLACE BAY.

Walton Routledge Appointed by Government. Halifax, N.S., Feb. 7.—It is reported that Walton Routledge, of the North-West Mounted Police, has been appointed by the Dominion government commissioner of police at Glace Bay, and will have full charge of the strike situation at the collieries of the Dominion Coal company. Upon the arrival of the commissioner he will appoint a sufficient number of men to assist him in maintaining order in the town. Under this order the present large force of regular and special police in the pay of the town will be unnecessary, and in addition it will mean that the services of the troops will be withdrawn.

DANCED AT 115.

Aged Gypsy Queen Joined Tribe in Celebration. Cleveland, Feb. 7.—Aura Mary, gypsy queen Emerita, who says she is 115 years old, danced barefoot in the snow with the other members of her tribe during the celebration of Ave Maria day at their camp near here. Aura Mary believes in living close to nature. She never wears heavy-weight clothing and it is her daily custom to go barefoot throughout the snow or over the ice. She is spry, smokes and says she expects to live ten years longer.
