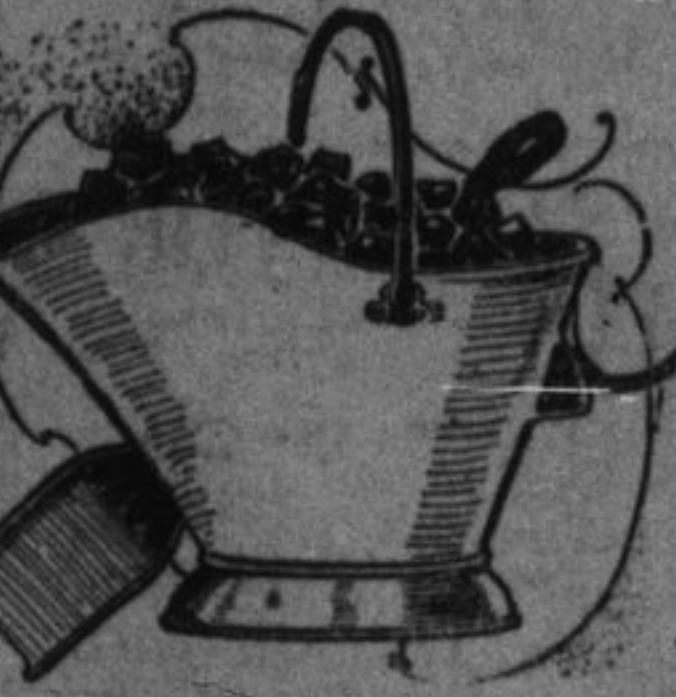

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY

ANNUAL MEETING HELD MONDAY AFTERNOON. Report of Board of Directors Presented and Adopted; Also Report of the Treasurer—Council to be Asked to Reduce Fee Paid by Directors—Elections Held Over.

The annual meeting of the House of Industry, was held, in the police court room, at the city hall, on Monday afternoon. Mayor Couper occupied the chair, and also present were W. J. Crothers, G. Y. Chown, W. B. Skinner, Canon Starr, Ald. Robertson, W. F. Nickle, J. M. Farrell, Rev. S. Selery, Ald. Armstrong, Mrs. W. G. Jordan, Mrs. S. Birch, Miss Machar, and the secretary, Robert Meek.

After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, by the secretary, Robert Meek, the report of the board of directors was presented by Mayor Couper, and this was adopted. The report gave a detailed account of the doings at the institution. The report stated that a year ago, Dr. Bell, the medical health officer, reported on the inadequacy of sanitary conveniences. His recommendation was acted upon, and fixtures were put in, at a cost of \$18,197. This rendered complete the sanitary conditions of the house. The interior of the building was improved by the painting of the upper wards, of the Skinner wing, and the refurbishing of several of the dormitories. Contemplated changes included the erection of a wooden building, more to the north of the House of Industry, for fuel and storage, and the shifting of the walk from Montreal street to the middle of the grounds, so that the approach to the institution might be better. In painting and furnishing the expenditure had been \$264.53.

The expenditure in connection with the house, and for all services, was \$3,662.94. The cost per day per member, was 26.75 cents. The cost of food is rising, and it was recommended that tenders for the supplies be called for at once. The report also stated that the agreements with the counties of Frontenac and Lennox and Addington, had been renewed. The counties paid \$1.50 per week, for each member sent in, and extra for clothing. The counties of Lennox and Addington, commenced this year with an advance of \$35, and it will be applied to providing comforts for the aged people. Praise was given the new superintendent, S. J. Greer, and his wife, for their management, and also to Dr. Williamson and McCarthy, for their medical attendance. When the inmates are not very ill, they are attended at the institution, in the hospital ward, and when very ill, are cared for at the general hospital, or the Hotel Dieu.

The directors also took occasion to extend thanks to the church societies and the various organizations, and many friends, for visiting the institution, and for the kind assistance given in the work. The directors also extended thanks to the many who had given donations.

The superintendent also submitted a report, referring to the work, and the report of the treasurer was also submitted. Both reports were adopted. The financial statement, from February 1st, 1909, to January 31st, 1910, was submitted as follows:

Receipts—Cash on hand, \$489.41; cash in savings bank, \$744.85; \$1,234.26. Membership fees, \$36; city of Kingston grant, \$800; provincial government grant, \$856.97; Yvonnean bequest, \$100; donations, \$13.75; interest, \$130.55; maintenance, Lennox and Addington, \$162.75; maintenance, Frontenac, \$710.91; maintenance, not classified, \$180.65; clothing, Lennox and Addington, \$45.95; clothing, Frontenac, \$19.75; boots, Lennox and Addington, \$2.50; proceeds of farm, \$76.55; cheque, dated August 7th, not presented, \$3,147.18. Overdraft on bank, \$43.20. Total, \$4,424.64.

Expenditure—Salaries, \$630.84; bread, \$301.15; meat, \$202.68; groceries, \$730.55; vegetables, \$72.60; milk, \$417.55; water and ice, \$39; light, \$59.01; fuel, \$400.94; dry goods, \$133.87; painting, \$110.53; plumbing, \$81.14; telephone and messages, \$10.75; drugs, \$16; hardware, \$25.75; printing, \$29.20; improvement, \$217.91; miscellaneous, \$92.32; farming, \$60.30; cash in savings bank, \$714.85; interest, \$16.85; \$761.70. Total, \$4,424.64.

On motion of B. W. Robertson and Canon Starr, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the secretary, Mr. Meek, and the treasurer, W. J. Crothers. Both the mover and seconder of the motion paid a warm tribute to the work carried on by these officials.

Mr. Skinner brought up the matter of having the annual fee of \$4, for the directors, cancelled. He suggested that the city council be asked to amend the by-law, so that the fee should be abolished. Every citizen he held, had the right to express an opinion regarding the management of the institution, and if the fee were abolished, he thought that a great deal more interest would be taken in the work. He objected to the fee on that principle.

Mr. Farrell considered that it would not be right to cut off the people on the board, who had been working in the interest of the work, and had given it their sympathy. Mr. Meek said that he objected to the fee, on principle. The city council and inmates provided sufficient money to run the institution.

Mr. Skinner moved, seconded by Mr. Robertson, "that the city council be requested to amend the by-law relating to the House of Industry so that the qualification fee of \$4 be reduced to \$1."

The motion was carried. Miss Machar alone voting nay. She held that the \$4 was not a large sum to pay. There was a motion to re-elect all the old board of directors, but the matter was left over to a meeting to be held in two weeks.

FIFTH AVENUE CONDEMNED.

Unsafe for a Man With Money to Walk on. New York, Feb. 7.—Fashionable Fifth avenue is so infested by pickpockets and "street walkers" that it is unsafe, according to Magistrate Cornell, for a man with any considerable sum of money in his pockets to walk at night from Delmonico's to the Waldorf. The magistrate held Jessie Miles in \$1,000 bail on complaint of John Thomas Russell, treasurer of the New York Taxicab company, who says she forced her acquaintance on him in front of the Waldorf and picked his pocket of \$50 before he could get rid of her.

"Tell your captain," said the magistrate, first recalling the recent case of Warner H. Van Norden, who was similarly robbed of \$28,000, "what present conditions on a street known the world over, and which should be the pride of New York, must change. From the Waldorf to Delmonico's a man now runs the gauntlet of pickpocket women, strong-arm women and panel workers. "Of course, in this case the victim is partly to blame for permitting the woman to force herself on his acquaintance. But her actions were in themselves a violation of law and should have been prevented."

FISH COMPANY MERGER.

Firms on Coast and Gaspé Shore to Unite. Halifax, N.S., Feb. 7.—For several months negotiations have been going on for a merger of large firms engaged in the fish business on this coast and the Gaspé shore, and now it is known that an agreement has been reached under which this will be accomplished. The firms embraced in the merger will be: The Charles Robinson & Co., an old Jersey house; A. G. Jones & Co., Halifax, the Atlantic Fish companies, limited, of Lunenburg, and Seawick & Co., of Lunenburg. The Bank of Montreal for some time has been interested in the Atlantic Fish companies, limited. A representative of the Bank of Montreal and legal counsel for the bank left Halifax for Montreal on Saturday, where the papers will be signed giving effect to the merger, which will control a large proportion of the fish business and fish export trade of the Atlantic coast.
