ASIATICS COMING IN.

The British Columbia government is confronted with a direct charge of countenancing the plans by which the province is being filled up with alien labour. The Victoria Times, a reputable paper, and one which is equal to a vigorous defence if attacked by the government, alleges that as a result of legislation some time ago, which was meant to declare the immigration of Asiatics illegal but actually declared it to be legal, an army of Japanese came into the country.

They were under contract with one Gotch, a Japanese, who was acting for the C.P.R. and the Wellington Colliery companies, and this man Gotch was a client of the attorney-general's law firm. Again, on the eve of the last election, the attorney-general, Mr. Bowser, became very noisy over a discovery which he had made and to the effect that the G.T.P. company had a contract for the employment of fifty thousand Japanese. It was a false report. It was put in circulation for political purposes. Later it was found that the contract was with the Japanese workers for whom Mr. Bowser's firm has been acting, and with certain British Columbia companies, but not the Grand Trunk Pacific.

It is the custom of the conservatives at the coast to make trouble on the labour question, and to accuse the federal government of laxness in its immigration regulations. Apparently the agitation has been with the wrong department. The Asiatics are coming into Canada in large numbers and they are becoming forceful in the life of British Columbia, but they are getting their foothold because of the machinations of the local government, and if Mr. Bowser's deception is establishing it is time the labour party gave him some of their attention.

CONSUMPTION OF LIQUORS.

While a large part of the United States has been occupied by the prohibitionists—while the average map has been marked to show constant advance in the option law—the statistics of the country indicate an increased importation and use of coffee and liquor.

The average import prices show divergent fluctuations during the decade. Of cocoa and cacao, crude, the average import price has decreased from 13.7 cents per pound in 1899 to 11 cents per pound in 1909 and still wines in casks, from 68.9 cents per gallon to 47.6 cents. On the other hand the import price of distilled spirits has increased from \$1.37 per gallon to \$1.76; of champagne, from \$14.42 per dozen quarts to \$16.35, and that of tea from 12.5 cents per pound in 1899 to 15.8 cents in 1909.

The difference in value may account for the larger amount that is spent in beverages, but it does not count for all of it. In wines the sum spent in 1909 was \$7,000,000, as against \$7,000,000 in 1899; in spirits, \$8,750,000, as against \$3,500,000; in malt liquors, \$3,300,000, as against \$1,500,000; in ginger ale, \$383,358, as against \$268,967; in mineral waters, \$1,125,000, as against \$1,000,000.

It is evident from this that the cost of living is high because the ways of the people are expensive, and that in luxuries they are spending more than they can afford. In wines and spirits the importations have been more than 100 per cent. In the cost of spirits alone the increase is over 150 per cent., which far exceeds the percentage that might be expected from an increase of population.

SCHOOL MEDICAL INSPECTION.

The department of education dictates in school matters perhaps a little too much. The education of the province ought to be under the direction of men who are experts in the business, but they can become narrow in their views and impracticable by living by themselves and out of touch with men of affairs. The curricula of our high and public schools are overburdened. Too much is being attempted in too short a time, and the result is a lack in the work of the pupils, and in the very essentials of education.

It is for this reason that the Whig has hesitated to refer to a matter which is pressing for attention, the matter of medical supervision. Some one should be appointed in every school district, and a number of persons where the district is large, to examine the school children and prescribe for those who need treatment. COMPLETED PLANS

AN AERONAUT READY FOR A PERILOUS VOYAGE.

Dr. Fabrice Will Attempt to Cross Atlantic in Balloon by Aid of Columbus' Trade Winds.

Madrid, Feb. 17.—Dr. Gans-Fabrice has now definitely completed the plans for his adventurous attempt to cross the Atlantic in an airship, and the date of departure is fixed for the middle of May. The launching point has not yet been chosen, but it will be either on the coast of Portugal or the island of Tenerife.

The balloon is elliptical in shape, 162 feet long and 49 feet broad, and contains 6,000 cubic meters of hydrogen. The basket takes the form of a gondola, shaped like a submarine boat, 28 feet long, seven feet broad, fitted with a four-horsepower motor.

This engine will only be used to keep the balloon in the course of the African trade winds, the idea being to make the voyage without mechanical propulsion by keeping within the air currents which took Christopher Columbus on his voyage of discovery.

Utica, N.Y., Feb. 17.—The postmaster here has determined to stop the use of clandestine correspondence under assumed names of school girls and very young girls employed in the various knitting mills. The correspondence claimed by young women is especially heavy at the general delivery window on Sunday evenings.

Burns Money to Warn Hand Car Occupants.

Lake City, Ia., Feb. 17.—While on his way home late last night from a party at a farmhouse along the railroad, Steward Dunbar fell through a cattle guard and his foot became caught.

Hearing a hand car, on which guests from the party were riding hilariously into the city, approaching, Dunbar frantically tried to free himself and lighted the first thing at hand to warn the occupants of the car of his danger.

The car stopped a few feet from him. Dunbar was picked up in a fainting condition, the last burnt edge of a \$20 bill still clutched in his fingers.

Another Bath Tub Mystery.

New York, Feb. 17.—In the death of Miss Ida Pendleton, a beautiful woman, twenty-one years old, found asphyxiated with illuminating gas in a bath tub in an apartment house on West One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, yesterday afternoon, the police are confronted with a mystery.

Coroner's Physician Lehan reported the case as suicide, but the absence of any known motive and the inability of Mr. and Mrs. George J. Murphy, her brother-in-law and sister, with whom she lived, to advance a reason why she should have killed herself, makes the death a puzzle.

Still Running Behind.

The tax on corporations produced \$274,000 more in ten months in 1909 than it did in twelve in 1905, and the revenue from death duties and the public domain was about the same for the ten months ending with October, as it was for the whole of 1905. But all this was not enough. In addition

government for the short fiscal year of 1909 (ten months), was \$7,375,000 to this the dominion has been called on for an increase in the subsidies paid to the province and the revenue from that source is now nearly \$900,000 a year more than it was four years ago. All told the income of the year as compared with \$6,000,000 for the

whole of 1905. Still, even in the face of this increasing income the provincial treasurer shows, in his statement accounting for moneys voted by the legislature, an outlay for the last fiscal year (ten months), of \$68,000 in excess of income. The deficit is really much greater than this, because in addition to the ordinary outlay, provided for in appropriations voted, there was an expenditure under statutory authority of \$1,280,000 on drainage debentures, for good roads, and on account of the Temiskaming railway and the Niagara Transmission line. The total outlay for the year was, therefore, \$8,325,000, or \$1,347,000 more than the income of the year.
