## HOTEL PROPOSITION

OF BOSTON CAPITALISTS BEFORE THE CITY COUNCIL.

City Asked to Give Carruthers' Site on King Street, Guarantee Company's Bonds for \$100,000 as First Mortgage, and Grant Exemption From Taxation.

Another hotel proposition is before the city council and the Board of Trade, one that looks good. Last evening the details of it were submitted to the city council in a letter from W. T. Minnes, chairman of the Board of Trade hotel committee. Mr. Minnes enclosed a copy of correspondence he had with D. Roy Smith, of Boston, who was acting for Senator Fish and other Boston capitalists regarding the erection of an hotel on the Carruthers' site on King street, alongside Simcoe street fronting the harbor. A company is to be formed to build an hotel to cost not less than \$250,000, and according to plans agreeable to the city council, and the company will execute a bond that the building will be in accordance with the plans.

On its part the city will be asked to convey to the hotel company the property known as the Carruthers' site and which was lately bought by the president of the Board of Trade, who was guaranteed against loss by some twenty members, the property to be held for hotel purposes. The city is also asked to guarantee the bonds of the company to the amount of \$100,000, the bonds to be a first mortgage on the real estate of the company, and also to exempt the property from taxation for a period of twenty years. Mr. Minnes stated that in a few days a proposition in definite form would be presented. The Boston people pointed out the necessity of immediate action if the hotel was to be got open for the season of 1911. The matter was referred to the civic finance committee for consideration.

### PRAYER MEETING OVER.

It Was Blown Up By Acetylene Explosion.

Lindsay, Ont., Feb. 17.—The bright and newly renovated and redecorated Methodist church at Woodville, was almost completely wrecked last night by an explosion of the acetylene gas plant.

The faithful adherents of the flock were gathered together in a room of the basement of the church for the purpose of holding the regular prayer meeting, but something was noticed to be wrong with the lights, and Mrs. William McKee, wife of the sexton of the church, went into the room where the plant was kept, and proceeded to light a match to investigate matters. Immediately after the first flicker of the match a terrific explosion occurred which rocked the entire building, and the lives of the twelve or fifteen persons in the building were in great danger. The walls shook, and the roof wobbled, but fortunately withstood the shock, and remained in place. However, the floor, the seats, the pulpit, the gas jets, the stoves, book cases, dishes, and other decorations in the various rooms were completely dislodged, and rattled from their fastenings.

Chaos ensued, and it was with great difficulty that the people of the church, who were in a front room of the basement, gained escape. This they did, however, without being injured beyond some slight bruises.

Mrs. McKee, however, was not so fortunate. She was thrown against the wall of the room, and was almost immediately enveloped in flames. For a wonder she was not rendered unconscious, and of presence of mind enough to run for the only door, which leads upstairs, and out on to the street. She rushed out with her clothes and hair all on fire, and several men came to her assistance. She was seriously burned, and may not recover.

The church had just been recently remodeled and redecorated, and the debt had been wiped out. To-day as a result of the explosion it is almost in complete ruins, being badly shattered. There is insurance.

### WORKED AS PEA-PICKER.

Worked For Several Days in Essex Fields.

London, Feb. 18.—A typical story concerning John Burns was told recently at a meeting held at Witham, Essex, to promote the well-being of the pea-pickers, who, in the summer time, flock in thousands from the poorer parts of London into Essex.

Canon Ingles, vicar of Witham, related that representation was made to the president of the local government board that legislation was needed, to enforce better treatment for the pea-pickers. John Burns, in order to ascertain how the pea-pickers fared, disguised himself as a pea-picker last summer, and worked for several days among the men and women on Essex farms.

Mr. Burns then sent an inspector of his board to prepare a report on the condition of the pea-pickers, and that report had been published, and had served to draw attention to what was admitted to be a public scandal. Mr. Burns advised the Essex people that public opinion must be aroused before farmers or the pea-pickers could be compelled by law to provide accommodation for pea-pickers, who, at present, had to sleep out in the fields, and were less cared for than cattle on the farms.

The Bishop of St. Albans, who presided at the meeting, warmly commended the action of Mr. Burns, who, he said, was always ready to listen sympathetically to any request concerning the well-being of the people.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within six miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.</
