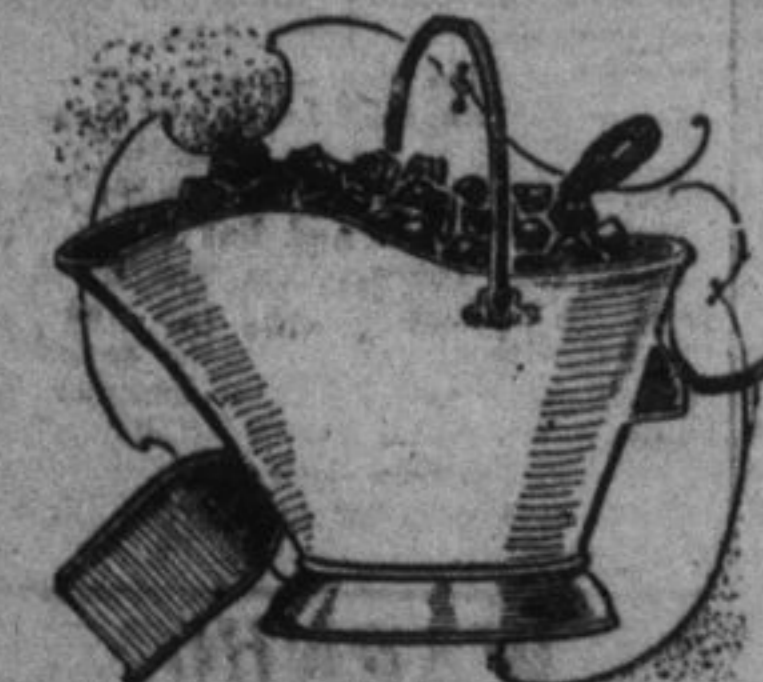

THE SPORT REVIEW

COLLEGIATE AGAIN WIN JUNIOR INTERCOLLEGIATE CUP.

Defeated Varsity III. by 5 to 2 and Won on the Round by Two Goals—The Local Team is Deserving of Great Praise.

Once again the junior Intercollegiate hockey cup will rest in the city, guarded by the Collegiate seven, who last evening successfully defended it against Varsity III, winning the game 5 goals to 2, and the round 10 goals to 8. Two years in succession has this plucky little team won the same cup from the same team, and both times by very narrow margins. The Collegiate seven deserve great credit for the way they have played this season and everyone is proud of them. With only a handful of students to pick a team from the institute boys went to work and trained themselves and won out. If the senior and intermediate teams lose, the juniors are showing themselves to be the best in the business, and able to play senior next season. As can easily be imagined the ice on Wednesday evening was in very poor condition, very soft, with a few puddles, that did not diminish any in vira as the game went on. The condition of the ice made fast hockey and any combination work absolutely impossible, as the players could hardly carry the puck through the slush with them and could rarely pass with accuracy. The heavy going also showed on the players wearing them gradually down until at the last quarter they were about all worn.

Collegiate were the lighter, and on fast ice the faster team, and for once the little fellows proved the better on slow ice. The locals were always in the lead and never in any danger. The team worked well together. Williams at point being the only man off color. He usually plays a good game but last evening was a little astray. One change took place in the team, Stewart replacing Walsh, who has been ill at right wing. The new man showed up well, landing one of the goals. Reid, LaRush and Goodearle on the Ins, (and they were alone the last twenty-five minutes, as Stewart retired with a broken skate) played fine hockey, and it was their back-flopping and tireless rushes here, there and everywhere through the water in search of the rubber, that were accountable for a good bit of the victory. McAmmon at cover point was about the best man on the ice, playing a fine steady game. He secured two goals, unaided on long rushes up from end to end of the rink. Slater played a good game in the nets connecting with some bad ones. Varsity played a good game, putting every ounce of strength they had into the battle, but the Collegiate youngsters had them beaten all the way through. Mulqueen was the most effective man Varsity had, and in the second period he was the only one who did any back-checking. Varsity III, (2)—Grant, goal; Downing, point; Wylie, cover; Tait, rover; Harvet, centre; Lorimer, left wing; Mulqueen, right wing. Referee, B. N. Steacy had a nice game to direct, only a few penalties being handed out for minor offences.
