BAKER AS A WRITER

ENGLISH M.P.'S IMPRESSIONS OF ONTARIO'S SILVER CAMP.

J. Allen Baker Writes of Cobalt and Gowganda—A Young Country for Young Men—Graphic Description of Mining Activity.

J. Allen Baker, M.P., who recently visited Canada, writes of Ontario's silver region in the London Daily News as follows:

North of the prosperous farming lands and the busy manufacturing towns of Southern Ontario, there lies a wide sweep of forest land which stretches northward to Hudson Bay and westward from the Montreal River, a thousand miles to the plains of Manitoba. It is a rocky land, rough and undulating, with forests of dark pine and silver spruce and birch clinging to the rocks through the shallow soil—a land made beautiful by the rushing streams and quiet lakes where live the loon and duck, a land which is still the home of the harvested moose, where you track the wolf by his foot-prints in the snow, or where, climbing a rocky bluff, you may come upon a camp fire, and see the red deer hanging dead and stiff while the tired men and dogs prepare to sleep under the frosty stars or the blazing glory of the Northern Lights.

It is strange to think that close to the civilization of the cities of Ontario there lies a country so wild and so unamed—a country unknown, indeed, until comparatively recent years, except to the hunters and trappers of the Hudson Bay Company and to the "lumberjacks" who came in the frozen winter to cut the giant white pine trees and to float them down to the saw-mills of the Montreal and Ottawa Rivers. Then suddenly, a few years back, prospectors, following the long trail with canoe and tent, brought news of silver and showed white mounds of metal that had been picked up from the crevices of the bare rock of the new land to the north.

And not only silver, but also cobalt, copper, gold, iron and nickel were found there. The new land sprang to sudden fame, and its former wealth of pine and pulp seemed insignificant beside the glittering stories that were told of its unexcavated riches in minerals of many kinds.

English investors, however, mostly held aloof, and still do so; and, indeed, this is scarcely to be wondered at, for few of the mines, except those in the famous silver lands of Cobalt, have yet been proved, and there is no doubt that there are many "wild-cat" schemes afoot. Investment should on no account be contemplated until reports have been received from thoroughly reliable mining experts. There is, unfortunately, only too much truth in "Mr. Dooley's" definition of a mine as "a hole in the ground owned by a liar."

Nevertheless, there is, without doubt, great wealth in minerals in this New Ontario wealth that will some day astonish the world. The men there, at any rate, are great believers in the future. An old prospector, tanned and worn with fifteen years of life in the forest, his back bent with carrying the pack and canoe, his hands hardened and crooked with handling the paddle and the pick, said to me one day: "We have only scratched this country and already we have found minerals of unequalled value. No one can say what there is here, for no one knows. What are wanted now are men and capital."

And men and capital are coming—capital mostly from New York and Chicago; men from every quarter of the globe. The progress that is being made as a result is interribly rapid. The great Cobalt itself, for example, was only heard of for the first time in the late autumn of 1893, when the Pan-Am railway and Northern Ontario Railway was being constructed from North Bay. Five years later, in 1908, more silver was taken out of Cobalt mines than came from any other mining station in the world. Nearly one-eighth of the whole world's output of silver came from Cobalt; two tons of pure silver every day.

INDIANS BLEW OUT THE GAS.

Old Chief and His Nephew Asphyxiated at Washington. Washington, March 5.—One of the most picturesque chiefs of the Indian race and his nephew, both members of the Chippewa tribe in Minnesota, were found dead in a local hotel, the victims of asphyxiation. The dead chief was "Pay-Baum-Wa-Che-Waish-Kung, more than ninety-five years old, and his nephew was named "A-Ne-Way-Way-Ash. Accompanied by the candle and the lamp, it is believed one of the redmen blew out the gas, which ended their existence and sent them to their happy hunting grounds.
