DEMAND FOR HORSE FLESH.

Mr. Haycock, who is now an active and useful government official, and not giving to expressing his thoughts on passing events out loud, read that the British government had forbidden the export of old horses, and he remarked, sententiously, "England is short on horses and long on navy."

The remark called attention to conditions of a most remarkable character. News came to the London Daily Mail that the regulation of the board of agriculture had been ignored and that great cruelty was being practiced in shipping to Holland and Belgium, many of the animals whose age or abuse had rendered them unfit for service.

There was a public meeting in London when the Daily Mail gave its exposures, and at this meeting the Duke of Portland, who presided, confessed that no fewer than 50,000 poor, crippled, old horses were "annually sent to their cruel fate on the continent."

ANNUAL FINANCIAL SCARE.

The annual panic at the city hall has set in, and some of the aldermen are contributing to it. It is given out that large demands are being made upon the council, and that the only way to meet them is to do some extraordinary act which the situation does not justify.

Larger and rapidly growing cities have revenues which meet their increasing wants. If our city were adding a million or two a year to the assessable property the council would be excused if it dipped into an occasional extravagance.

would be well, of course, to fit them up with the opulence which a bank displays, but if the money is not available the improvements can be deferred. As for the school board it does not meditate any attack upon the city finances which will be alarming.

According to the report of the works department the streets are to be improved with money raised on the local improvement plan. It appears to be the most equitable manner of meeting a just liability, and the chances are that it will be approved by the council.

There is, therefore, no need of taking the funds which have been saved by the economies of the water and electric light departments. The public utilities should be managed so that the people will receive their water and light and power at the lowest possible cost.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

As soon as the city commences to milk the public utilities—and milk them dry—the troubles of the council will have begun in earnest.

The Wholesale Grocers' Guild won in the case against them, for alleged conspiracy, but their defence cost \$12,000. It takes a lot of money to establish one's innocence sometimes.

SPIRIT OF THE PRESS

A Sign of Weakness.

Ottawa Journal. The speaker of the Manitoba house has ordered a speech stricken from the records of the house, and has forbidden the press to publish it. Such prohibition can hardly be enforced, it being contrary to the spirit of the times, which says that every word or act of the people's representatives shall be reported to the people without let or hindrance.

How the Money Flies.

Toronto Globe. The province plans to expend during the fiscal year ending October 31st 1911, the sum of \$7,625,745.66. Of this total the sum of \$6,969,845.66 is credited to current expenditures, \$535,900 to capital account, and \$118,000 to other purposes.

The special large appropriations include \$100,000 for a new government house, \$200,000 for the new wing of the parliament buildings, \$67,400 for additions and repairs to Osgoode Hall, \$50,000 for the new provincial prison at Guelph, \$15,000 for the Dog Lake storage dam, \$60,000 for new trunk roads, \$118,000 for colonization roads, \$200,000 for the hydro-electric transmission line, and \$50,000 as a grant towards the provincial museum.

Who Dreadnought Squealers Are.

Vancouver Sunnet. In effect the conservative party is asking a Canadian to display the white feather for the empire. Canada is being asked to advertise to the world our opinion that the empire is in danger and is unable to take care of itself in the present situation.

If the leaders of the conservative party in Ottawa could be accepted as authorities on the question of empire defence their utterances would make comforting reading in Germany if that country is really harboring such evil designs against the empire as the Canadian conservative party would have us believe.

It is noteworthy that on this coast at least the leading Dreadnought squawlers are not native born Canadians and such Canadians as are fussing speak English with an acquired accent. These people know little of Canadian history and have no sympathies with Canadian ideals.

Not Amounting to Much.

The government has introduced in the Ontario legislature a bill to give to municipalities in the province which enters into contracts with electric power companies the right to themselves build electric lines, if the consent of the railway and municipal board be obtained before an electric railway lays tracks on public streets, relieving the city of Toronto from its obligations under the contract with its street railway company as they have been interpreted by the judicial committee of the privy council, giving the railway and municipal board power to remedy conditions which electric railways in regard to which complaint is made, and providing that the law shall apply notwithstanding any agreement made between a company and a municipal corporation. Contracts with Ontario municipalities after this bill becomes law are not likely to be regarded as meaning much.

Ill-Luck of the Bakers.

How any one chances to be a baker I can't imagine, for it is the one business on earth that outsiders are contentedly meddling with. No one does the Ottawa government give up the attempt to interfere with bakers all over the dominion than our own legislature takes up the talk. Just at present W. K. McNaught, M.P.P., is endeavoring to make it uncomfortable for all concerned. He says that people want a smaller loaf. Perhaps they do. However, if the legislature would give up meddling with the bakers for a time the people, through the good old laws of supply and demand, would get what they want. No baker who makes short weight bread or poor bread, or a loaf too big or too small, is going to live in Toronto or in any other centre over long.

Like the manufacturer of any other product, the baker must keep up with the procession or fall behind, and when he falls behind he is down and out and done for. There would be just as much sense in legislating over the size of a hen's egg, the thickness of the soles on a pair of boots, or the cubic measurement of a head of cabbage.

Opposition by the Legislature.

The liberal opposition in the Ontario legislature is small in number, but it has never had reason to blush for it. It has never acted as if it bore a grudge against the electors or putting it in opposition, it has not gone about eternally calling in question the integrity or honesty of its opponents. It has, on the contrary, challenged them, and the advice and wisdom of their public acts. It has exhibited a helpful spirit in legislation, contributing cheerfully of its knowledge and ideas to the common fund of good for the province. There are liberals who perhaps would prefer a more robustious and impetuous attitude, but we venture to think they are wrong. In their provincial affairs the people of Ontario are not stupidly partisan. Mr. McKay and his followers are more likely to commend themselves to public respect by their moderate and rational conduct than if they were shouting

A Royal Municipal Commission.
