The annual meeting of the Kingston Humane Society was held in one of the committee rooms at St. George's hall on Thursday afternoon.

The president, E. J. B. Pense occupied the chair, and also present were Mrs. Clements, Mrs. N. S. Leslie, Mrs. E. M. March, Col. Massie, J. B. Walkem, Dr. G. W. Bell, Prof. Butler, Dr. J. G. Evans and Samuel Arnie, the society's inspector.

After the opening of the meeting, Mr. Pense read the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were adopted.

A report of the work of the society during the past year was also read and adopted. It was pointed out in this report that the work of the society during the past year, had been mainly preventive, the inspector finding that in most cases, a threat of prosecution was quite sufficient to induce the owners of ill-fed and ill-housed animals to improve their condition, or of old worn out horses to agree to their being humanely destroyed.

Board of Education Passes Increases to Extent of \$4,100—General Teaching Staff of the Public Schools Not Included.

The budget of the board of education for this year is as follows: Collegiate Institute.

The amount asked from the city this year for Collegiate Institute purposes is \$11,000 or \$3,000 more than was received last year.

There is a small increase in the fuel item to supply the new gymnasium with coal.
