

DOG OWNERS MEET

PROTEST AGAINST THE PROPOSITION TO MUZZLE.

They Will Ask City Council to Change By-law so as to Provide for Tagging—Will Assist in Keeping Streets Clear of Wandering Dogs.

On Tuesday evening a well-attended meeting of local dog owners was held in the council chamber, when C. Corbett was elected chairman and Dr. J. G. Evans, finance secretary.

The dog men present decided, on motion of the secretary, that "every dog owner shall place a collar upon his dog whenever he is allowed on the street or outside of his own door, and the name or address of the owner shall be plainly fixed on the same for the purpose of ready identification."

This motion was carried and was followed by one introduced by C. Bowen and seconded by T. Carson, to the effect that "the city assessor shall issue tags to all persons reporting to him on his assessment rounds at the time of making the report, and that the amount of tax due to the city be collected as at present."

WANTS NEW TRIAL.

Miss Orr Got \$43,500 as a Heart Balm.

Boston, March 17.—Disgruntled because jury has broken all Massachusetts records by awarding Miss Marion Orr, of this city, \$43,500 heart balm, William Wood, a wealthy resident of Portland, Me., is preparing to ask for a new trial. Miss Orr and her father sued for a total of \$70,000. The father was given \$2,500 for loss of his daughter's services, she got \$1,000 for an alleged assault and \$10,000 for breach of promise to marry.

Miller Bill Drastic.

Ottawa, March 17.—The Miller bill to prevent betting and gambling is more drastic than at first thought, and it contains some clauses which were not in the bill referred to the special committee. In the bill any man who "records or registers any bet or wager, or sells any pool upon the races, of any political or municipal election, of any race, of any contest or trial of skill or endurance of man or beast," becomes liable to a year's imprisonment or to a fine of \$1,000.

Renew Local Option By-law.

Renew, Ont., March 17.—The council gave the third reading to the local option by-law Monday night. The opponents of the by-law applied a few days ago for an injunction to prevent the council from giving it the third reading, and the council deferred action till the result of that application was known. The temperance people had some thought then of seeking a mandamus to compel the council to pass the by-law. This has now been rendered unnecessary by the council's own action.

Alberta Truancy Act.

Edmonton, Alta., March 17.—In the legislature, Premier Rutherford moved second reading of the truancy act. Its chief provision is that it will require all children between the ages of eight and thirteen to attend school, and this includes private as well as public schools. It provides that no children of these ages shall be employed at any work during school terms.

Szecheny's New Palace.

Berlin, March 17.—A despatch from Budapest says that Count Szechenyi, whose wife was Miss Gladys Vanderbilt, daughter of Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt, of New York, has bought a great estate at Friesne Rebditz, where he intends to erect an imposing residence, to be christened the "Castle Gladys."
