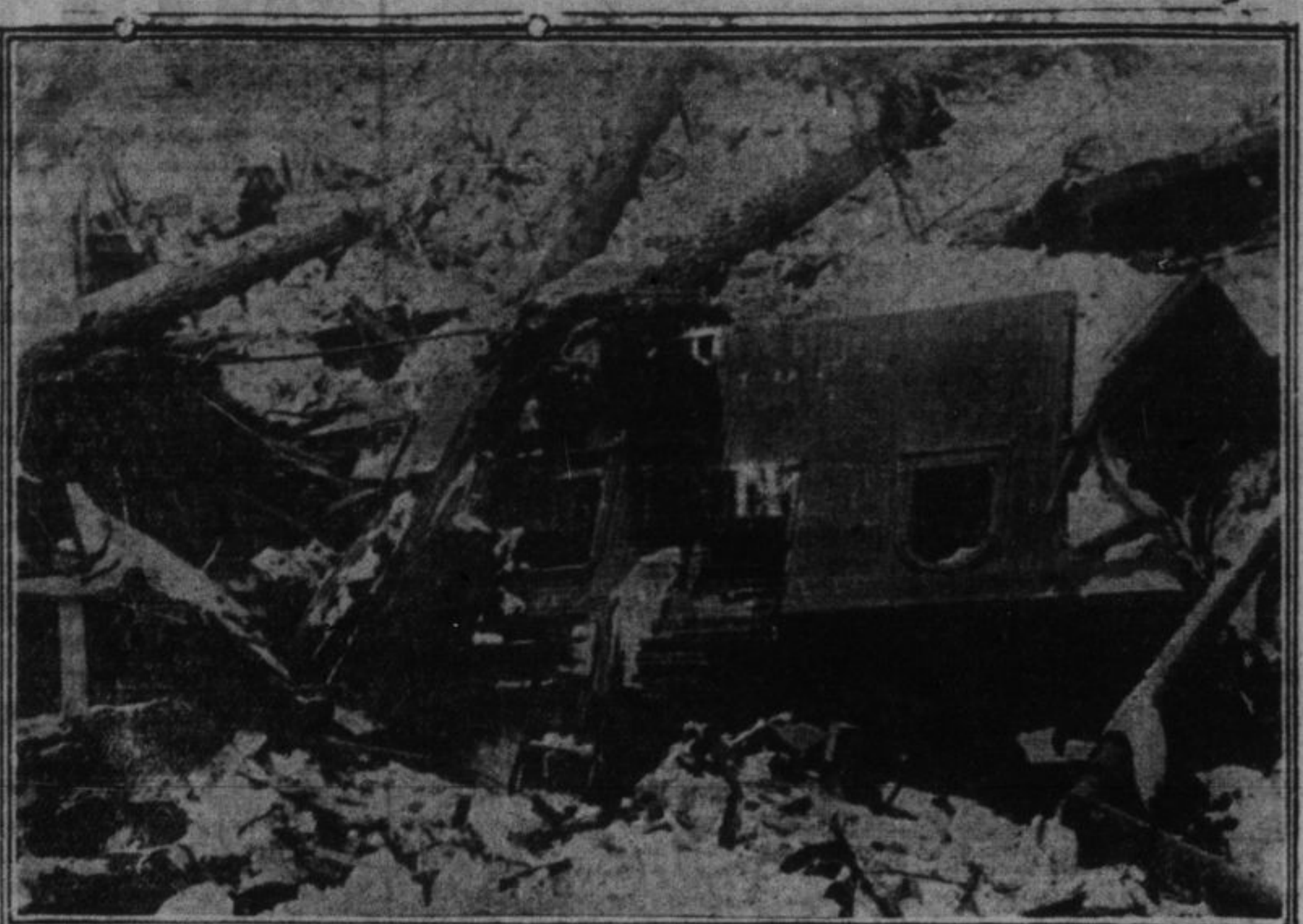

Wellington, Wash., March 21.—Working with the heroism that a great disaster begets and against heavy odds, rescuers continue to dig into the ruins wrought by the snowslide which wiped buildings away and swept heavy trains from the tracks as if they were feathers on the muck of March 1st.

Reports, too gruesome to repeat, come with the finding of dismembered human bodies and the difficulty of identification only adds to the confusion of the situation. Down the sheer side of the mountain from the railroad to the little stream—now a raging torrent—is a full one thou-

sand feet and this must be the goal of the rescuers. Every little while they come upon the body of a victim of the avalanche. Only when the stream is reached can the death roll be approximated, and then, uncertainly, for it is not improbable that some were carried away in its flood.

NO MUNICIPAL SCANDALS.

One Glory of London is Non-Corruption. London has no municipal scandals, says the London Mail. We may be pardoned if comparing ourselves with some other great cities, we feel proud. Chicago, for instance, has been for long fighting public corruption, and not long since all the business elements there combined to elect a supposedly good man as mayor. If there has been any improvement since that election I should like to learn of it. My last tidings from that city tell of rival gangs of gamblers, dynamiting each other's places, of city wards handed over to blackmail, and of notoriously corrupt officials placed again in high power. New York is not much better, and the record of San Francisco we all know. Our American friends are apt to talk of London in a patronizing fashion. So far as public administration is concerned, we believe that London leads the capitals of the world.

A Heavy Loss.

Boston, Mass., March 22.—Two hundred and twenty-five persons perished by shipwreck and eighty-three vessels met with disaster off the New England and British North American coasts or while engaged in the New England, Canadian or Newfoundland trade, in the fall and winter season of 1909-10, which ended at 7 a.m., today. Of the eighty-three vessels, thirty-two were steamers or tugs, one was a full-rigged ship, four were barques, three barkentines, and sixty-two schooners. The financial loss exceeded \$1,000,000.

SENATOR POIRIER'S WORK.

Writing a History of the Maritime Provinces. St. John, N.B., March 22.—Senator Poirier, of Westmoreland county, who was here today, announces that he has in preparation a history of the maritime provinces, in which he expects to bring out many facts concerning the early times of these provinces, which have never been published. Senator Poirier says that a period of Nova Scotia history dating from the occupancy of Halifax by the British to the capture of Louisbourg, which was generally supposed to have been a peaceful time, was, according to records to which he has had access, marked by raids and forays of a serious character.

AGE OF MOTHER EARTH.

Chicago, March 21.—Old Mother Earth, who has closely guarded her age for her entire life, is 400,000,000 years old, according to an article which appeared in the current number of a geological publication of the university of Chicago to-day. In more scientific phraseology the approximate age of the earth, it has been discovered, may be determined by dividing the amount of salt in the sea by the amount brought down each year by the rivers that empty into it. Sir John Murray, Professor Joly and M. Dubois, all famous geologists, stand back of the new method of computing the age of this terrestrial sphere.

PLOWING DAY AND NIGHT.

Welland, Ont., March 22.—Negotiations are on between the Grand Trunk and the government for the former to use the new elevator lately built by the government at Port Colborne, instead of the old elevator which the Grand Trunk has run for years. If this is done boats can carry from 10,000 to 15,000 additional bushels of grain, lightening at Port Colborne, and returning to Port Dalhousie with quick despatch on account of the capacity and facilities of the elevator at Port Colborne. A third pier will be built at Port Colborne near the government elevator, which will make an additional two hundred foot slip for vessels.

WILD WOMEN AT WEDDINGS.

Conduct of Spectators is Positively Insulting.

London, March 22.—"Wild women at weddings" is the alluring headline given by a London paper to an article dealing with the conduct of the fair spectators at fashionable weddings in the British metropolis. According to one witness the feminine craze for attending weddings is growing, and the behaviour of many of the crowd is frequently "positively insulting." Women climb on seats, the better to view the bride, and even the baptismal font is frequently used as a coign of vantage. "Really," said a reverend at a West End church where many fashionable weddings take place, "I wonder sometimes that these wild women don't try to climb upon the chandeliers and swing like acrobats. I sometimes see women gazing with pale faces and drawn lips at the bridal pair as though their souls were sick with envy."

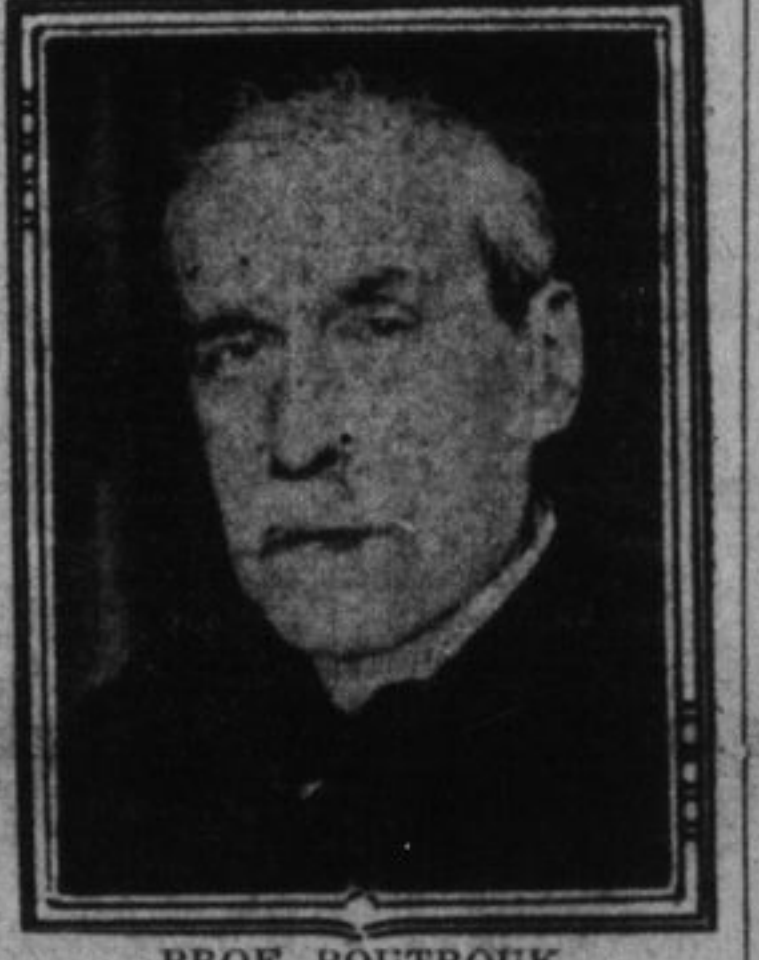
A police sergeant, who often assists to keep order at such functions, an officer of a sympathetic spirit, said: "I have often been puzzled by the hungry look in the eyes of women who come to these weddings. Whether they are spinsters who would like husbands and homes of their own, or wives who are unhappily married, it is impossible to tell. You see their eyes fill with tears, and I have even heard women sob from their emotion."

FISH CREEK HEROES.

Their Graves Are to Be Kept in Decent Order. Winnipeg, March 22.—The graves of the heroes at Fish Creek are to be tended and maintained in decent order. The Imperial Service Medal Association has learned that the cross that originally indicated the revered spot had been lost and that the pile of stones were all strewn about. A communication from the minister of agriculture of Saskatchewan was received on the subject. The minister of militia and defence for the dominion has not been heard from. This year is the 25th anniversary of the North-West rebellion on May 14th.

WILL LECTURE.

A French Professor on Way to Harvard College.

New York, March 22.—Professor E. M. Boutroux, of the Institute of France, the first teacher of philosophy to be sent to this country by the Cercle Francais, is on his way to Cambridge, Mass., where at Harvard University he will deliver a series of lectures. Before leaving New York Professor Boutroux said it was true that he is the first of the French lecturers sent here by the Cercle Francais who has been asked not to repeat his lecture at Columbia and other American universities. "I do not know," said Professor Boutroux, "why this restriction has been made. My predecessors who lectured on literature, history and art were permitted to deliver their Harvard lectures in other institutions. James Hazen Hyde, the founder of the lectures, has, however, decided to restrict me to Harvard. No reason for this action has been assigned. I am sorry the restriction has been made, because I should have liked the freedom of my predecessors."

Sued For Damages.

Belleville, Ont., March 22.—Ever since the high court opened here on Tuesday (its time has been taken up in hearing evidence in the case of the Pearce company, limited, of Marmora, who are sued for damages by parties who claim that the actions of the Pearce company caused the drowning of certain lands along the Crow river. The taking of evidence was concluded at noon yesterday and argument will be heard before Judge Tetzell in Toronto. Eminent lawyers are on both sides of the case and the costs will be heavy.

Killing the Bacteria.

Toronto, March 22.—The people of Toronto, who take their drinking water raw, have been imbibing a weak solution of calcium hypochlorite, or bleaching powder, since ten o'clock, Saturday night. At that hour the water works engineer and his fellows began applying the bleaching powder to the water according to the board of controllers' instruction to Dr. Sheard, city medical health officer. The object of the disinfectant is to kill the bacteria in the water.

Must Not Do It.

Toronto, March 22.—Chief Justice Meredith gave an order prohibiting Judge McCarthy, Orangeville, from enquiring into qualification of voters on the local option by-law. The chief justice holds that the county judge has no right to go behind the voter's list. The effect of this judgment is that the by-law of Orangeville will be sustained, only two votes, being disallowed instead of ten.

A Superlative Class.

M. A. P., London. Professor Huxley was one asked for an expert opinion for the government on a subject which he had studied profoundly. He agreed to give it, but expressed the hope that nobody would consider him infallible. "Here are," he said, "three kinds of liars—liars, damned liars, and experts."

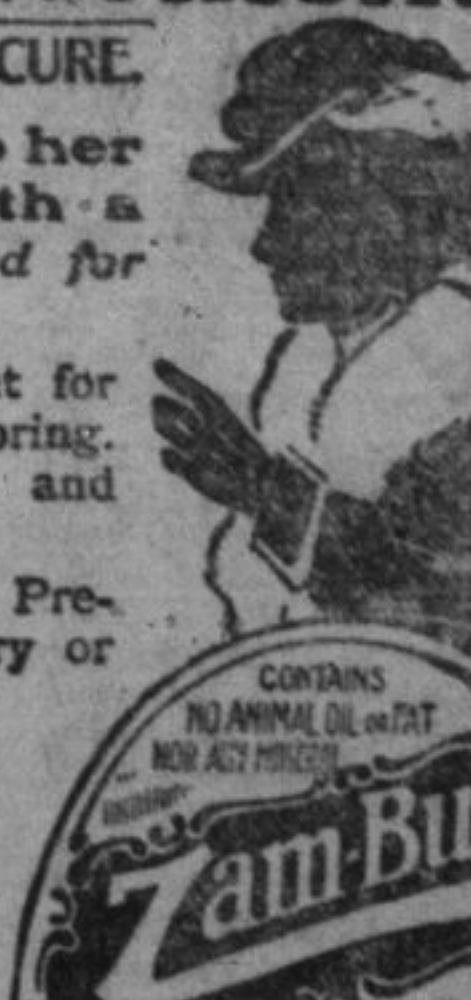

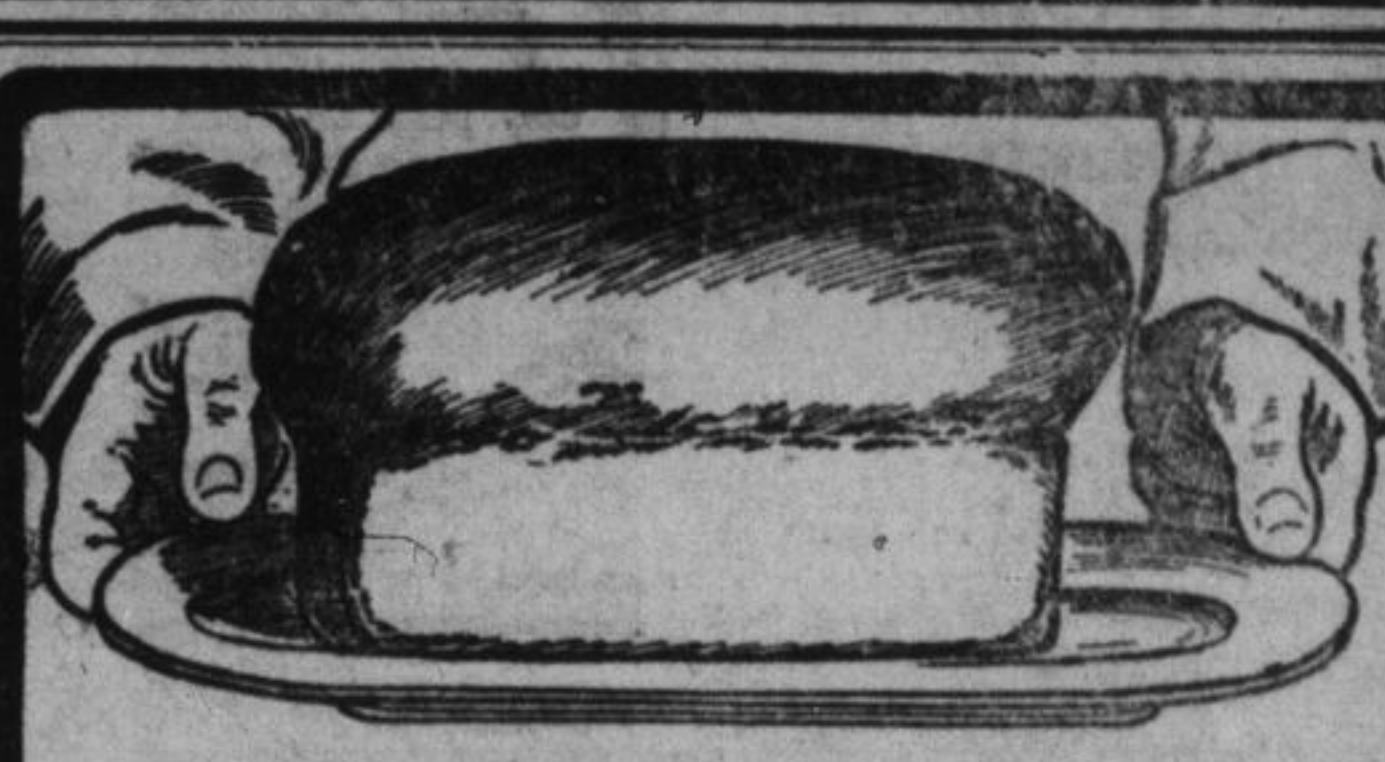
