### THE POLICE COURT

**MAGISTRATE GIVES WARNING TO BICYCLISTS**

**That They Must Not Ride on the Sidewalks—Bad Roads is No Excuse for the Court—Members of "Prohibited List" Fined.**

Spring has arrived, sure enough. In police court this morning, the first case of riding a bicycle on the sidewalk, came before Magistrate Farrell.

A young man, scarcely out of his teens, was the guilty person, and the name Samuel Arnel, was the man behind the summons.

The young man had a story to tell. He admitted that he had taken the sidewalk for about a block, but while taking this little slip, the eagle eye of the constable caught him, and the next day the young man got a police court summons. The young man's excuse for his taking the walk, was that the roadway was in bad condition. However, all bicyclists can take warning from this case, and keep to the road in the future, as the magistrate announced that all offenders would be punished. As this was the first case of the season, he did not impose a fine, but allowed it to go out as a warning to others.

The magistrate pointed out the danger of a person running down a path on the walk, and stated that this could not be allowed.

"But I have a consider track, and can stop quickly," said the young man. However, the court said that this made no difference that the practice must stop. Fines will be imposed until it is stopped, so all bicyclists had better beware.

Two members of the "prohibited list," came before the magistrate. One male and a female. The former was fined \$15 and costs, and the latter \$10 and costs, she having been found guilty on a charge of having attempted to procure liquor.

There was also a charge against a local liquor dealer, of selling liquor to a member of the "prohibited list," but this charge was dismissed. The witness in the case, swore, on a former occasion, that she was served with liquor, but when she took the box this morning, swore that she did not get the liquor.
