TEMPORARY TRUCE

WHAT MAY BE FEATURE OF SETTLEMENT.

A Restricted Reciprocal Trade Agreement is Under Way—Concessions by Canada and the United States.

New York, March 23.—According to the *Albion*, correspondent of the *New York Journal of Commerce*, there is excellent reason for saying that the final settlement will be the following features, which it will be observed, appeal more to the political exigencies of each side rather than providing any practical immediate or direct benefit:

"1. Canada rejects absolutely the demand of the United States for most favored nation treatment.
"2. Canada is willing to make certain concessions in duties on the list of American articles.
"3. These concessions are merely intended to bridge the present situation and permit delaying or preventing imposition of maximum duties on imports after March 31, but the main business responsible for Canadian concessions is Tait's desire for much closer trade relations between the two countries and his determination and promise to take the initiative in a desire to bring such a result about by means of legislation.

"Expression of desire by Tait for what may be termed a restricted reciprocal trade agreement, is, of course, the encouraging feature for Fielding to 'take back with him.'"

A Washington Rumor.

A Washington dispatch says: "One of the propositions which has been submitted to Canada, and the one which it is believed stands the best chance of being accepted, is that the U. S. shall give to Canada the benefit of its minimum in return for concessions by Canada on about thirty articles of American export, including agricultural implements, iron and steel, etc. It is understood here that President Tait is urging the acceptance of this compromise, which also includes some special concessions by the United States."

IMMIGRATION MATTERS

Under Discussion in the House of Commons.

Ottawa, March 23.—In the House of Commons, yesterday, Mr. Clarke (South Essex) complained that the Ontario government had granted the exclusive right to take sand and gravel from the St. Clair river, for five years, to a Detroit company. He said that people were no longer allowed, as in the past, to take sand and gravel from the bed of this international stream without paying a royalty to the company.

Mr. Pugsley replied that he would investigate the complaint. At the same time he did not think the department of public works could take any action unless the company was interfering with navigation.

Consideration of the immigration bill was resumed in committee of the whole, and Mr. Jamieson (conservative, Digby, N.S.) proposed, among other amendments, that persons suffering from tuberculosis should be specifically excluded, and that steamship companies should be enjoined, under severe penalties, to examine immigrants at the ports of embarkation in Great Britain or the continent of Europe.

Mr. Oliver replied that the object of the first was attained by the present law, and the second was objectionable because it provided for the inspection being made by persons not directly responsible to the government.

Dr. Paquet (conservative, Quebec) urged that the immigration act should provide for the examination of immigrants in regard to their physical, moral and mental condition before they were allowed to enter Canada. Immigrants should be required to procure from a magistrate or judge, in their native country, a certificate showing that they had never been convicted of crime. The medical examination should be made on shipboard by physicians employed by the government.

In the second suggestion Mr. Wilson, of Lennox, concurred. The minister, however, demurred to it, on the ground of excessive expense.

Mr. Burrell (Con., B.C.) referred to the unfortunate misrepresentation by the immigration officials in the old country as leading very frequently to disappointed hopes. He said that if the west was to be peopled by races that made the west prosperous it was necessary to keep out other nations' hordes unaccustomed to Canada but the government might well relax certain of its restrictions to give a chance to British immigrants who, while they might not at first fall on their feet, would eventually become creditable citizens. So long as a man was mentally and physically strong, although it was impossible for him, in crowded cities, to raise the money to come to Canada, he ought to be given a chance even although somebody else might have to help him out.

Hon. Frank Oliver said that he did not think there was any warrant for the statement that misrepresentation in regard to Canada prevailed in Great Britain. The literature was very carefully prepared and with a view of not arousing unreasonable or unwarranted expectations on the part of intending immigrants. As to assisting immigration no matter what governments, in or out of Canada, might resort to, it was the policy of the dominion government to bring out only people who were dependent on their own resources in getting here. It was better to have fewer immigrants so long as they were men of enterprise and independent action.

Mr. Jamieson protested against the amendment proposed by the minister to section 3 requiring tourists to produce on entering the country the same amount that immigrants are required to produce. On behalf of the maritime provinces he entered his objection to it saying he believed it would occasion a very serious loss to those engaged in the tourist business. An officious official at a port where a steamship arrived from an American port might occasion a lot of trouble, inconvenience and unpleasantness to respectable tourists.
Hon. Frank Oliver did not answer.

W. Barker (Con., Hamilton), also opposed the amendment which he said should only be inserted under direct necessity. He reminded the house of the annoyance which Canadian tourists had on several occasions suffered through being held up by United States officials.

Hon. Frank Oliver pointed out that the amendment did not say that tourists must show what money they had but merely empowered the government to do so at any time to pass regulations to that effect.

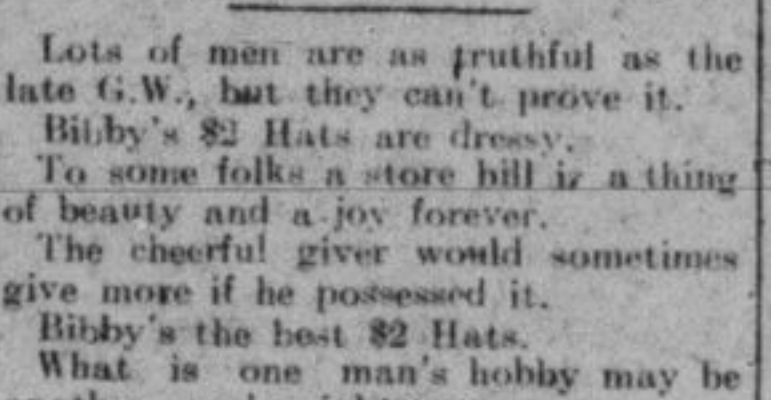
