Amateur Baseball League.

William McFeedie, the president, presided at a meeting of the executive of the Kingston Amateur Baseball League, held at the College Inn cigar store, and also present were Vice-President Joseph Ahearn, Secretary-Treasurer R. J. Tierney, William Kennedy and W. Laird represented the L.C.C., "Mipper" Matheson and R. Tilson the Irishmen, and Stanley Trotter and H. Nicholson representing the Victorias. There will be three teams in the league, the same as last year, the Victorias, the Irishmen and the L.C.C. There was a large attendance of the players, and the business arising out of the games last season was wound up...

Manager Edward Harrow, of the Montreal baseball club, with twenty men, are at Columbia, N.C., for spring training. Football changes in the American games are proposed and designed to eliminate mass plays to a large extent, and with a view to reduce the danger of injuries to players. The Canadian Wheelmen's Association is seeking for a man to organize bicycle clubs throughout Canada. The annual meet this year will be at Waterloo, Ont. J. K. Foreyth, of Toronto was elected first vice-president of the Canadian lacrosse association, and Dr. McMillan headed the poll for the council. The convention resisted all efforts to weaken the residence rule, and decided to apply it to the new senior series. All applicants for reinstatement who played in the old C.L.A. senior series were accepted, but N.L.U. players were refused. Walter Johnson was elected president at the annual meeting of the Montreal football club, while "Tommy" Stinson was re-elected captain of the senior team. The financial reports showed that the sport is not a big money-maker. The club reported a deficit of \$1,850, most of which was charged to the rugby club, the receipts for matches showing a considerable falling off.

Report of the Committee.

The finance committee reports that the bonded debt of the city, including debentures not yet issued, but authorized by law, is \$1,240,590.29, made up as follows: Water works, \$208,100; light works, \$274,725; schools, \$49,675.75; local improvements, \$281,621.46; general purposes, \$446,468.08; total, \$1,240,590.29. The amount of the sinking fund is \$15,503.83 and this amount \$105.41 is invested in local improvement bonds of this city and \$13,497.42 in an special deposit in the bank of B.N.A. THE CIVIC BUDGET

WATERWORKS TO SUPPLY EXTRA SCHOOL NEEDS.

The Same Rate of Taxation as Last Year—Board of Works Gets \$1,600 Less Than Last Year—More Money for Street Lighting.

The budget will be presented to the city council this evening. It recommends the same rate of taxation as last year, but in order to cover the extra amount required by the schools, it advises \$9,000 of water works funds.

A review of the budget shows that Mayor licenses this year will yield nearly \$1,200 less than last year. The police department will cost \$400 more than last year, but the extra salaries will be about \$400 more and contingencies nearly \$600 more.

The board of works gets nearly \$1,000 less than last year, parks committee gets the same as spent in 1909; fire committee \$733 less, city property \$107 more. The budget for the board of works and remodeling the east wing of the city buildings; \$260 extra is allowed for further street lighting.

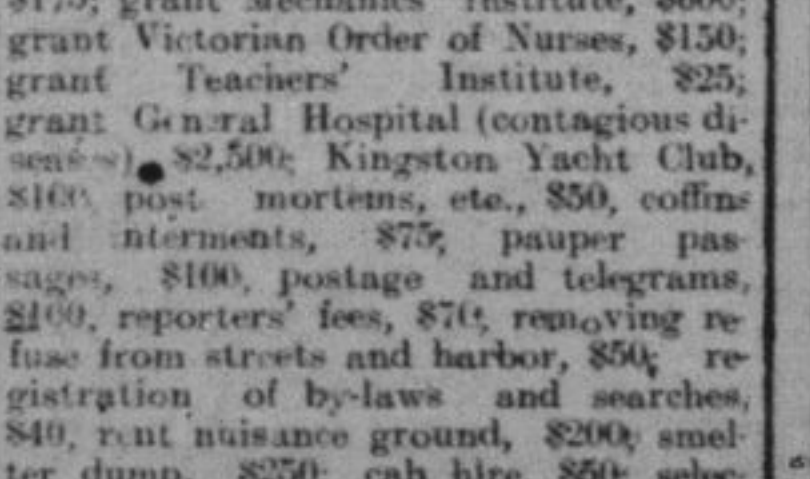
