## EASTER IN ST. MARY'S

GRANDEST CELEBRATIONS IN CATHEDRAL'S HISTORY.

A Description of the New Altar and the Other Embellishments—The Music on Easter Day Was Finely Rendered.

In St. Mary's cathedral perhaps the impressiveness and grandeur of Easter celebrations were more apparent this year than ever before owing to the recent embellishments of the church. Of the decorations and other improvements only an expert could judiciously speak, so artistic are they. Not a thing was left undone that could enhance the victor as well as the victim, and add to the beauty and harmony of the entire coloring and remodeling which reveal a well-conceived plan admirably executed. Glances, for instance, at the angelic figures that adorn the arches, so live and real and winning in their garb of gold and blue. With what delight does not the eye equally greet the two rarest representations of the Virgin, so bright and fair, on either side of the sanctuary, the "Immaculate Conception" and the "Assumption." Behold, likewise, the paintings showing the "Passion," wherein sorrow, agonized and died the Son of Man, to whom a seditious murderer was preferred, and see, in one of them, how sweet his face as Veronica, with a true woman's heart and instinct, wipes the blood and sweat from it, and how similarly appealing is each seeming image as the dread drama unfolds.

And the altar! That masterful creation of the sculptor's art now being completed. We have seen not a few of the finest churches both in Europe and America and doubt if any of them can boast a richer and grander possession. Of choice Italian marble, Brazilian onyx and gold, elaborately carved and ornamented, with ogives, pyramids and shafts without number, showing at the base the "Last Supper," the "Fascial Lamb" and the symbolic "Lion," feeding its young with its own blood," then rising gradually and symmetrically till it stands superb and majestic, an object of grace, richness and beauty incomparable! Such is the high altar in St. Mary's cathedral, a credit to the firm of Bonnard & Co. sculptors, Angers, France, whence it came, and a pride to the Catholics of this city. The work of putting it up is in the hands of E. Flavin, who is acquitting himself of his difficult task most successfully and satisfactorily.

Liturgical high mass was celebrated on Sunday at 10:30 o'clock by his grace Archbishop Gauthier, assisted by Revs. Father Hanley and McLeod as deacon and sub-deacon, with Fr. Mea as high priest, the sumptuous ceremonial of the church being carried out in all its pomp and majesty. Flowers which had been offered by ladies of the congregation for adorning the altar lent their freshness and fragrance to the fest. At the close his grace imparted the apostolic benediction.

Excellent music was furnished by the choir ably led by N. E. O'Connor and effectively accompanied by Prof. Deays. At the offertory the "Hae Dies," a bright composition composed special to the day, was delightfully rendered, the duo in the piece being taken by Messrs. O'Connor and Cross. At vespers the solemn tones, under the direction of Rev. Fr. Halligan, did their part well. The sermon—a lucid expose of the scenes enacted that glorious morning of the resurrection, with all that it means—was presented by Rev. Fr. Derling, of Toronto, whose manner and words have the inexpressible charm of one who seeks not applause but the supreme good of souls. Hence it is a people prouder with their church and everything connected with it than St. Mary's congregation would be difficult to find.

## HAS GREATEST RUNNERS.

Greek Athletes Have Eighty Earned its Fame.

Fourteen years ago, when the last of the modern Olympics was held at Athens, Greece, the first three men to finish in the Marathon race were Greeks. The entrance of Louis, the winner, into the stadium, was greeted by a shout that resounded around the whole country of Greece. Even the thousands of foreigners for many nations were represented at that international meet, acclaimed Louis a hero.

For was not the Marathon a Greek institution—a tradition of the race that more than 2,000 years ago was the ruling nation of the world? It seemed but proper, then, that a Greek should win that classic event. And when two other Greeks followed Louis across the finish line in the stadium it seemed to be definitely settled that in Greece the greatest distance runners in the world were bred.

But today at American, John J. Hayes, holds the Marathon trophy by virtue of his winning the Marathon at London in 1908. He finished ahead of the runners of all nations, although Dorando Pietri got into the stadium ahead of him. But the Italian collapsed before reaching the tape and thus lost to Italy the distinction of claiming the greatest long-distance runner of their time.

It was the revival of the Olympic games in 1896 that created the consciousness of interest in long-distance running as a competitive sport. Truly, the English revived the most ancient and most simple of athletic sports when the nation awoke to a new interest in running. Prizes were offered in competitions all over the country, and from that time until the present the English have produced more good runners than any other country. The British go in more for long distance than for the fast work, as is easily seen by a scrutiny of the records for all distance events.

But the stimulus given to distance running was the first Marathon in the Olympiad at Athens in 1896. Up to that time the runner who could cover twenty-five miles or more was a rarity. The public made no demand for running events except in England, Ireland and Wales. Here the twenty-five mile race was known, although as a competition it was not frequently seen.

When the world evinced an interest in the Marathon, after the Olympic games in Athens in 1896, athletes in all of the countries participating in the Olympiad took up this branch of sport, and in all these countries a new generation of runners was born. Prior to that time no one in the United States thought of offering prizes for men doing the Marathon distance. Now the Marathon is the most-talked-of race in the world.

An evidence of this fact was given in London in 1903, when the nations sent their best runners to represent them in the Marathon. England, proud of its runners, got a terrible shock when its best runner lagged behind the runners of other countries. Italy inspired when little Dorando fell exhausted after arriving in the stadium eight minutes ahead of second man in America, sang the praises of Johnny Hayes when he was officially declared the winner of the Marathon trophy. And the other nations whose sons were in the event did nothing but vowed to send a man four years hence who would carry off the honors to this greatest of Olympic sports.

So the sport has grown in favor the world over. Especially is there wide-spread interest in this country. Marathon runs are numerous, and throughout the land the youth is earnestly training in the hope that some day he will be the greatest Marathon runner in the world.

By this deep interest in the Marathon has turned a channel of thought toward the old Greek sports from which the Marathon sprang. Greek history is replete with incidents setting forth the prowess of the Grecian runners. But the story dealing entirely with the Marathon as a feature of the Olympic games are fragmentary.

Obviously the Marathon prize was not more eagerly sought than those given for excellence in other sports. References to many books dealing with the ancient Olympic sports fails to bring to light any detailed story of any Marathon. Incidental references are made, but apparently the ancient Greek did not consider the victor in the Marathon a greater hero than he who slew his antagonist with the cestus.
