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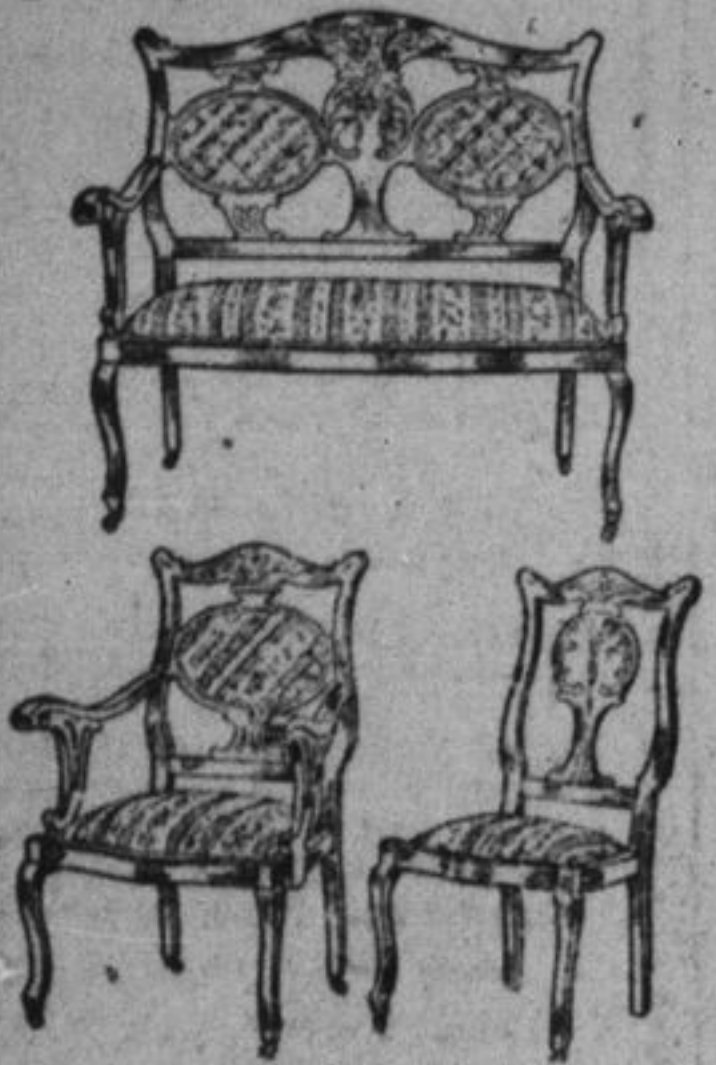

ON IRISH PEOPLE

REV. T. W. DAVIDSON DELIVERED FINE LECTURE.

Spoke on Subject, "Lights and Shadows of Irish Life," at Sydenham Street Church—Lantern Slides Used for Illustration.

The lecture given in the Sunday school hall, at Sydenham street church, on Thursday evening, by Rev. T. W. Davidson, of Belfast, Ireland, on "Lights and Shadows of Irish Life," was very largely attended, and was a most interesting and instructive one. Rev. T. E. Burke, presided, and introduced the lecturer, with a few happy remarks.

During the evening Miss Edith Orser sang very sweetly "Killarney," and during the singing of this beautiful selection, some of the scenes around Killarney were thrown upon the screen. Miss Reel rendered "The Minstrel Boy" and "The Harp That Once through Tara's Hall," in splendid voice. Both the selections provided a fine treat.

In his opening remarks, Mr. Davidson referred to his extensive trip through Canada, from sea to sea, but while he was favorably impressed with the country, he would say that the charms of his own country appealed to him.

The lecturer gave views on the aspects of Ireland, Dublin, Cork, Belfast, Londonderry, the west of Ireland, and he also gave scenes illustrating different aspects of Irish life, including the life of the peasant, and life in the city.

The speaker referred particularly to the better condition in the country. At the present time, he pointed out, there were 600,000 farmers in Ireland, who, because of the land act, had bought out their farms, and the fact that they were the new owners, made them all the more contented, and it was expected that in the not far distant future Ireland would be within the empire.

Mr. Davidson spoke of the hopefulness and also referred to the morality of the Irish people, statistics going to show that womanhood there was the purest on earth. The politeness and manners of the Irish people was also touched upon.

A WARRANT ISSUED

For Arrest of Wolfe Island Man for Assault.

On Tuesday a warrant was issued by G. H. Hunter, J.P., for the arrest of Henry Henderson, Wolfe Island, charged with breaking into the residence of Richard Goslin, and assaulting the wife of the latter, doing her actual bodily harm. The man, in some manner, got wind of his coming arrest and fled to the United States to escape the constables. The warrant will be held, however, and should Henderson return to this country he will at once be placed under arrest and brought before a magistrate. The man took place some days ago and Mrs. Goslin was very badly treated.

The Ottawa Cliffside's Bill of \$2228 for Expenses.

A despatch from Ottawa says—The Allan cup trustees have registered a kick with the Cliffside over the latter's expenses on their recent trip to Kingston in quest of the amateur trophy.
