It appears that President Ham, o the defunct bank, is incarcerated the famous Belem prison on the outskirts of Mexico, where so many priso far as the reputation of the place is concerned the old French Bastile was a paradise in comparison.

A day or two before the smash My Ham went to the Bank of Montreal, and, stating that he had three-quarters of a million of dollars in gold deposited in a New York banking institution, asked to have a draft cashed for that amount. Mr. Saunders, manager of the Canadian bank, and his advisory board, having explicit confidence in Ham, cashed a draft for 8600,000.

A few days after they discovered that, although Ham had shown then n pass-book with the amount of three quarters of a million on deposit in New York, as he had alleged, not one cent was forthcoming, and this is why Ham is now languishing in prison, where his lawyer alone can see

him, and only at rare intervals.

When the "run" started the Bank of Montreal, having no idea of the bank's condition, took charge of the wreck and paid out some \$600,000 more to the depositors, which, as a matter of fact, was so much good
