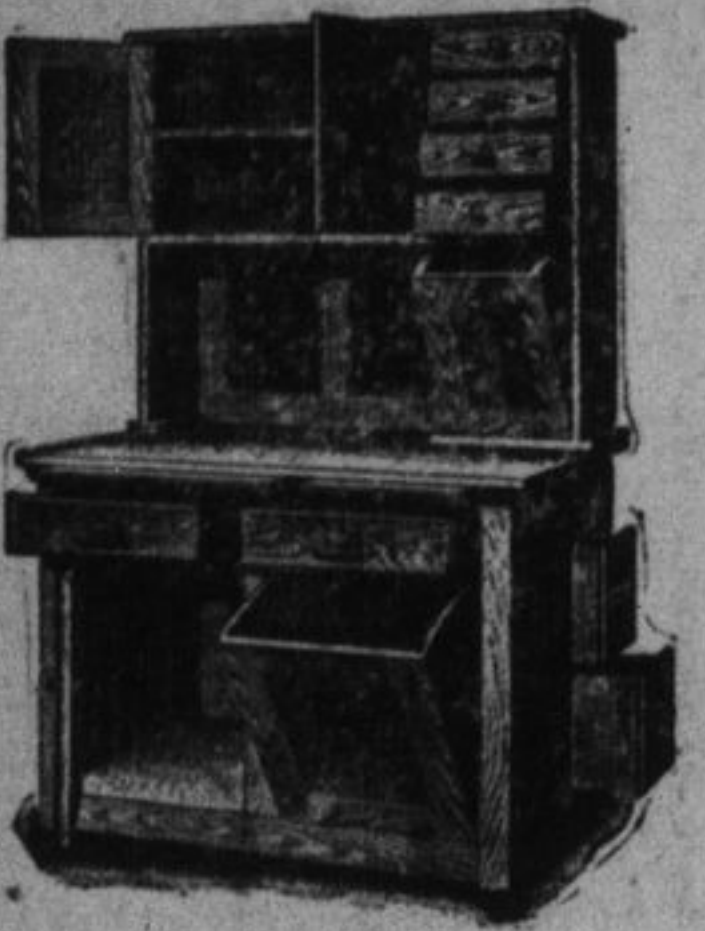

CAMP ALL INFANTRY

THREE MORE REGIMENTS TO COME TO BARRIEFIELD.

Officer of Royal Canadian Engineers Begins Duty—Position Vacant For Some Years—A Stop-Butt to be Added to the Ranges.

The military camp at Barriefield next June will consist entirely of infantry. The artillery and the cavalry which camped here last June will go to Petawawa for their training this year. In their place there will be at the Barriefield camp three more regiments of infantry so that there will be as many men under canvas as before. The infantry will consist of the 6th, 7th and 8th brigades. The 6th brigade includes the 16th, 40th and 45th regiments; the 7th brigade the 46th, 47th and 49th regiments; and the 8th brigade the 42nd, 56th and 59th regiments. No. 3 Cavalry Field Ambulance, Army Medical Corps, under Major Ross, will go to Petawawa, and No. 2 Field Ambulance, of Ottawa, under Major Shellingon, will do duty at Barriefield camp.

Capt. H. T. Hughes, Victoria, B.C., Royal Canadian Engineers, has reported for duty, and will occupy an office at the armories. There has not been an R.C.E. officer here for several years, since Lieut. Perrin was transferred. This military district is much in need of one.

Lieut.-Col. Hemming, D.O.C., expects that the stop-butts to be erected on the hill in rear of the ranges at Barriefield will be finished by the time the camp opens in June. It was found necessary to add another twelve or fifteen feet of a butt so as to render cattle safe when firing at 1,000 yards took place. Tenders have been called for, and when the addition is made the ranges will be safe for all firing distances. At present the bullets from long ranges are apt to find their way over the butts as at present constructed.

THERE'LL BE A BIG CROWD

At the Grand for the Frontenac Presentations.

There will be a big crowd at the Frontenac presentation in the Grand Opera house to-morrow night. The first part of the programme will consist of selections by the Fourteenth band, and entertaining songs, recitations, pianologues, etc., in which Messrs. Hurley, Gates, Cousins, Manhard, and others will take part.

Six boys, age eleven and twelve years, from the Y.M.C.A., will put on a tumbling act, under direction of J. J. Thompson, physical director, that promises to open the eyes of those in the audience who have never seen the younger performers. This is guaranteed to be a treat. The presentations of the watches, rings, and medals will be made by W. F. Nickle, M.L.A. This will be in the first part of the programme.

The second part will consist of the wrestling and boxing bouts. The boxing bout will be a six-round affair, between Dumphy, the champion of the Petawawa camp, and hitherto unbeaten, and a dark horse from the east. This newcomer will be no slouch at the game; and the boxing exhibition will prove intensely interesting. Sergeant McGowan will referee. The wrestling bout will be between Ellerbeck and Burns, of Watertown, and will provide interesting contest. The boys are well matched in strength and skill.

"Bill" has been in the game for some years and knows every turn and trick of the trade. He is one of the best second basemen in this district.

MAKES STATEMENT PAID FOR BURIAL

THIRTEEN YEARS AGO—JUST DIED AT PORTSMOUTH.

Mrs. Sexton Made Her Funeral Arrangements Long in Advance—An Outer Station Old Lady Did the Same.

Thirteen years ago, Mrs. George Sexton, of Portsmouth, paid James Reid & Sons, undertakers, for her burial, shortly after her husband's death. The aged lady passed away last night, and the undertaking firm was notified of the agreement made years ago, and have taken charge of the funeral.

This is not the first time that a Kingston undertaker has buried a person after receiving the expenses of the funeral long in advance. Another case was that of an old lady who lived near the outer station. Three years ago she sent for an undertaker when she was sick and handed him a sum of money for her burial. She said that she might not die just then, but she wanted to pay the money in advance and make an agreement as to what kind of coffin she was to be put in. She recovered from her illness and some months after superintended the erection of a house. Though she was eighty-eight years of age she got out the following winter to shovel snow. She died a year or so ago, but her executors did not have to pay the customary burial expenses.

REDUCED THE TIME.

New Terms Made For Kingston and Smith's Falls R.R.

Ex-mayor R. F. Elliott, D. A. Givens and John Carson, Kingston, are in Ottawa, to-day, to oppose the application of the Kingston & Smith's Falls railway for extension of time. The railway authorities are asking the railway commission to allow them two years to start and five to finish the proposed branch. The city of Kingston wants instead a stipulation of one year to start and three to complete the work.

The delegates succeeded in reducing the time limit from five to three years. Fifteen per cent. of the capital stock of the company must be expended in the first two years or the charter will be cancelled.
