AND BROUGHT TO HOTEL DIEU
FOR TREATMENT.

Gananoque Council Reinstates Constable Thomson—Two Gananoque Weddings—An "Indian" Goes to Jail.

Gananoque, April 7.—The six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Simon, Osborne street, met with a severe accident on Tuesday evening. The little fellow was running from the house to meet his father, and fell on a large rock, suffering a compound fracture of the right arm near the elbow. Dr. Fergus O'Connor was summoned, but the limb could not be set, and he recommended that the lad be sent to the Hotel Dieu for treatment. The child was removed yesterday.

The investigation into the charges leading to the suspension of Constable John Thompson, two weeks ago by Mayor W. N. Rogers, was taken up at the session of the town council on Tuesday evening, with the result that the charges in the main stand unproven, and Constable Thompson has by a unanimous vote of the council been reinstated to his position as night constable, and is once more on his rounds to the general satisfaction of the public.
