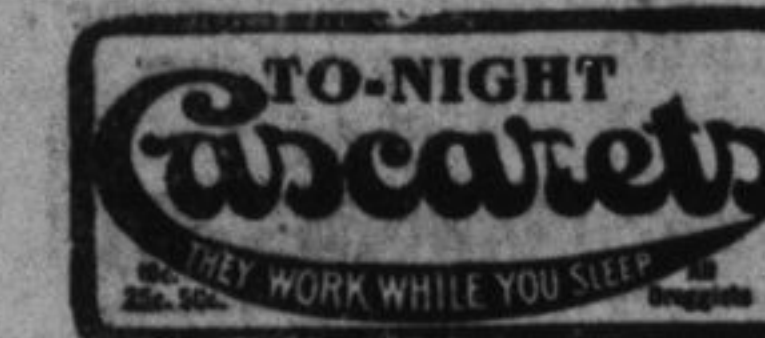

FOR A NEW BRIDGE

MARINEMEN SPEAK IN FAVOR OF IT.

Look Upon Scheme to Build New Bridge Over to Bell's Island as a Good One—Vessels Could then be Sheltered in That Section—Avoid Trouble at Swing Bridge.

Marine men in this city, who hold up both hands in support of the proposition made to do away with the Catarqui bridge, and build a new one, over at Bell's Island. Many of the spoken to by the Whig, stating that this scheme was carried out, it would be a great thing for marine business. "It would certainly be a fine thing to have all open water at that section," remarked a leading marine man to the Whig, to-day. "It would be a great place for vessels to stay in great shelter, as when the heavy gales are on, it is very difficult for some of the vessels to anchor in the harbor."

The swing bridge has for some time been looked upon as a "hazard" by the marine men, as every year vessels have been damaged in their endeavor to go through it. It is stated that it is a very difficult matter for some of the care that is taken. Last season, it will be remembered, there were several mishaps. On one occasion, the roadway was blocked on a Saturday, just when the farmers were on their way to the city, with produce, and besides having to go a roundabout way, several miles out of their usual route, they were made late for the market, and put to a great deal of inconvenience.

The scheme to have the bridge built across to Bell's Island would do away with all this trouble, and then there would be ample space for all the vessels to be laid up there.

Marine Tidings.

Rideau Lake is free of ice and ready for navigation if the locks were open.

The steamer Varuna, thoroughly overhauled during the winter in Trenton, reached Belleville on the first trip of the season on Wednesday.

The steamer Alexandria will be launched on Saturday at Picton. Extensive repairs have been made to her hull.

The steamer Corona, of the Niagara Navigation company fleet, will come down to the dry-dock to be overhauled before going on her regular run.

The steamer Sowards cleared on Wednesday, afternoon for Oswego.

The schooner Cornelia arrived from Oswego, and is at Portsmouth, unloading coal for Short's.

The schooner Britton is at the foot of Garden Island, wind bound, on her trip to Oswego.

CARRIED LOADED REVOLVER.

Young Man Placed Under Arrest for Drunkenness.

Carrying a revolver, every chamber of which was loaded, a young man, who gave the name of Woods, was placed under arrest on Thursday morning by Constable Samuel Taylor. He was too drunk to make his appearance before the court, to-day, and was given a remand to the cells for a day.

There is a very heavy penalty for carrying a revolver, without the necessary permission, and the young man will have to give an account of himself. It was indeed lucky that the police constable ran across him, as in such a condition he might have caused serious trouble.

This is the second man the police have placed under arrest this week, who carried a revolver. The man who gave his name as O'Brien, claimed Ottawa as his home, and who was sent out of the city, had a revolver in his possession.

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NO DANGER FROM THE COMET.

Prof. Mitchell Points Out How Earth is Secure.

Prof. S. A. Mitchell, Ph.D., of Columbia University, has an article in the American Review of Reviews on "The Return of Halley's Comet." He comments upon the old idea of comets as war portents, but points out that there was no serious outbreak of hostilities following in the train of "Coggia's" comet of the year 1873, and no remarkable comet at the time of the recent Russian-Japanese war. Prof. Mitchell gives a diagram showing how to find Halley's comet. As to what will happen when we pass through the comet's tail on the evening of May 18th, he says that the modern theory of the tails of comets tell us that though their size is enormous, their weight is excessively small, and as a result the number of particles in a cubic mile in the comet's tail is almost vanishingly small. The comet of 1862 was so situated that we would see through ten million miles of its tail, yet stars shone through it with unimpeded lustre. Hence, though there will be cyanogen gas in the tail, it is there in such small quantities that it could have a cubic mile of the tail concentrated into a glass beaker in the laboratory it would probably take the greatest refinement of chemical research to detect the cyanogen. In addition the earth is covered over with a shell of atmosphere thousands of times denser than the comet's tail, and the particles could not possibly penetrate to the earth's surface.

TO BUY ALLEN MARSH

FOR USE AS A NUISANCE GROUND FOR CITY.

The City Property Committee Decides to Make Recommendation to Council—If Price is Too High Expropriation Will Follow.

The city property committee decided yesterday afternoon to recommend to the council that the marsh in the eastern end of the city, owned by the Allen estate, be purchased for nuisance ground purposes. If a purchase at a reasonable figure cannot be made the committee recommends that steps be taken to expropriate the marsh. The city solicitor has advised that the city has the power to expropriate land for nuisance ground purposes. At the meeting yesterday afternoon, Alds. Graham, (chairman), Clugston, Grant, O'Connell, Hamley and McCarthy were in attendance. A deputation from the Board of Health, consisting of chairman S. R. Bailey and A. Strachan, was present to discuss the nuisance ground question, and urge that necessary land be acquired.

The Board of Health, meeting some time ago on the purchase of the Allen marsh was advocated by some of the members, who pointed out that this place could gradually be filled in and ground made of it. The property committee, with the Board of Health members, that the marsh would be a good place to acquire for dumping purposes, and it was unanimously decided to recommend to the city council that the place be purchased. It is understood that the marsh is being held at a good figure, and the possibility of its being expropriated by the city may have to be taken to acquire it.

FINE FARMING STATE.

The Land of "Evangeline" Described by S. J. Rawley.

Lake Charles, La., April 4.—(To the Editor:—I wish to thank you for the valuable space in your paper you gave my former letter and as several of my friends have asked me to write again, I take pleasure in doing so. I am now spending a couple of weeks in West Louisiana, and find this to be the best part of the state for farming. This is the "Land of Evangeline," which has been fully described by William Longfellow in his great poem. Here you can see miles and miles of sugar cane and rice. The level of the fields is broken at intervals by canals, which are used for irrigation purposes. While in the vicinity of Jennings, La., hundreds of steel derricks are seen for here are the famous Louisiana oil fields. Oil is used on the Southern Pacific R.R., in place of coal. A few miles east of here we find the beautiful and equally famous Bayou Teche, spoken of by Longfellow. This is one of the most beautiful rivers in America. The banks are lined with hundreds of giant oaks from whose branches hang garlands of Spanish moss, and sweet magnolia trees whose blossoms can be seen and smelled for miles. The Teche is a small river running through an almost flat country, and empties into the great Atchafalaya, the river which the United States engineers are seeking to divert from the mighty Mississippi.

The frontage tax is to my mind utterly absurd. It is a veritable steal. No tax is just but that which is imposed under the general taxation system, where no exception or exemption is made.
