GUARANTEEING PURE WATER.
Montreal is now interested in an ozonization system of filtration; the men who installed a plant at Lindsay, Ont., and Ann Arbor, Mich., is giving the board of control the information it desires. The ordinary filter of sand will not clear water bacteria. They get through the sand, not in large quantities, it is true, but in sufficient number to make the water impure and unhealthy. Ozonization is commended because it is simple, direct, and effectual. An expert electrician must install the plant, but an expert is not required to run it. And the cost of killing the bacteria electrically is not great. "At Ann Arbor," said Mr. Leggett, the promoter, "the cost of purifying water is fifty-one cents a million gallons. In Baltimore the cost is sixty cents a million gallons." Sooner or later every water plant, whether publicly or privately owned, must have an ozonization plant. It will guarantee pure water, free from bacteria, and nothing else will.

COMET GETTING NEARER.
In the Reviews of Reviews for April S. A. Mitchell, Ph.D., of Columbia University, (a Kingstonian, and son of John Mitchell, ex-contractor) discusses Halley's comet in a most interesting way. The article describes the history of comets of the number of which there is a record, the number discovered each year, and the theories that have heretofore prevailed with regard to them. Edmund Halley was professor of astronomy in Oxford, and following the methods of Newton, published the orbits of no less than twenty-four comets. Of the one bearing his name there are authentic records since 11 B.C., and it was known to exist for probably 225 years about that date.

On March 26th the comet passed the sun and became a morning object, but it will be the middle of April before it is at a far enough angle from the sun to be seen. On May 1st the comet and Venus will be close together, and they should present a magnificent spectacle in the morning sky, as Venus is then almost at her greatest brilliancy. On May 18th the comet comes directly between the earth and the sun, and its motion carries it by the sun into the evening sky where it will remain throughout the summer.

Halley's comet will be nearest the sun on April 20th, when of itself it will be the most luminous. After that date it gets closer and closer to the earth until May 18th. Later it should be very brilliant and be favourably situated in the evening sky for one to see. "While," says Mr. Mitchell, "nothing is known absolutely of how bright the comet will be, astronomers are agreed that it will be readily visible to the naked eye, with a tail at least thirty degrees in length. In fact the comet will be seen better without a telescope than with one, and for those who are not astronomers a look through a big glass would be disappointing."

But the comet's tail, what about it? The earth passes through it on May 18th. "Will the cyanogen be enough to poison us?" asks Mr. Mitchell. "Or if we escape will vegetation be blighted or disease brought?" The modern theory is that comets' tails, though enormous in size, are small in weight. The comet of 1882 was so situated that one could see through 10,000 miles of its tail, yet stars shone through it with undimmed lustre. Hence, though there may be cyanogen gas in the tail there is such a small quantity that "we could have a cubic mile of the tail concentrated into a glass beaker in the laboratory, and it would take the greatest refinement of chemical research to detect the cyanogen." In addition, "the earth is covered over with a shell of atmosphere thousands of times denser than the comet's tail, and the particles could not possibly penetrate to the earth's surface."

A still more remarkable fact is pointed out by Mr. Mitchell, namely, that a new tail to a comet is being constantly formed, that the old tail is left in space, and that the comet is slowly wasting away. The rarity of the tail may be imagined, "when we realize that Halley's comet has lasted for 2,000 years and is not yet consumed." May let will be a red letter day for the astronomers—for then the comet passes across the face of the sun. But it is questionable if even an astronomer will be able to see the transit. Besides, "although we shall be enveloped in the tail for some hours and be bombarded with cometary material, we shall probably be unaware

of it, for the cometary particles are so small that not even a meteor shower will take place." So that a most interesting event is at hand; but one free from all alarm and sensation.

ONE WEEK MARRIED.

New York State Farmer Ended His Life.
Auburn, N.Y., April 14.—Elmer Cutler, a prosperous farmer forty years of age, living in the town of Sempronius, died in horrible agony last night from the effects of a dose of Paris green, which he took with suicidal intent. Cutler took the poison yesterday morning, and, unattended by a physician, lived through the day, his death being a horrible one. Cutler was married a week ago, but his bride had not returned to his home, which he was making ready for her.

Now Seeks Divorce.

Guthrie, Okla., April 14.—John Abernathy, United States marshal, famous as a man who catches wolves alive with his hands, and a persona friend and guide of former President Roosevelt, who appointed him marshal, has filed suit for divorce from his child wife, at Oklahoma City. He has a four-weeks-old babe.
Abernathy's grounds are desertion and neglect of duty. Mrs. Abernathy is about twenty years old, the daughter of James Purvance, a wealthy farmer living near Guthrie. She eloped with Abernathy and they were married in Oklahoma City in June two years ago. His wife died a year prior to that date.
With a party of school girls, Miss Purvance visited the federal prison here on a sight-seeing tour and accidentally met Abernathy, resulting in their elopement and marriage.

Branded as an Imposter.

Cambridge, Mass., April 14.—Judge Lawton, in the probate court, branded as an imposter the estate of the late Daniel Russell, of Melrose, and dismissed three petitions alleged to have been brought by Daniel Blake Russell, after a record-breaking trial of 194 days. Nearly five million words of testimony were taken during the trial. The claimant to nearly one-half the estate of several hundred thousand dollars will appeal to a higher court.
