GAS BUOY EXPLODED

TWO MEN WERE INJURED AT SARNIA.

It is Believed a Small Amount of Water Found Its Way Into Tank in Which Carbide Had Been Placed, Causing Generation of Gas.

Sarnia, Ont., April 14.—Shortly after five o'clock, yesterday, an explosion which could be heard a mile distant took place at the wharf of the Reid Wrecking company, injuring two men. Two iron gas buoys of the acetylene generator type were being charged with carbide, preparatory to being placed in the river, the work being under the direction of C. F. Stewart, of the marine department. It is believed a small amount of water must have found its way into the tank, causing gas to generate.

A MARATHON WALTZ. Seventeen Couples in Mad Competition in New York.

New York, April 14.—The band in a Brooklyn dance hall struck up a speedy tune at an early hour, last night, and seventeen couples started in a mad waltz, which, it was announced, was for the Marathon dancing championship of the world.

Joseph Morrissey and Alice Dunn took the lead at the start. Some of the dancers went down at the corners early in the contest. In fifteen minutes the seconds began to revive the weary dancers by throwing sponges soaked in water. In half an hour most of the dancers had quit the floor, bedraggled, wet and very tired.

TWO BOYS POISONED. Father Says it is Work of His Enemies.

Pittsburg, April 14.—Two sons of Philip Badali, a wealthy Italian of Wilkinsburg, were found dead in bed yesterday. The youths, one eighteen and the other sixteen years of age, were the victims of poison, according to the coroner's office, either administered by some one or taken by mistake for medicine.

When Badali learned of the death of his two boys he fell in a faint, declaring wildly that the deaths were due to his enemies to whom he had refused to pay money. Two years ago Badali's summer home was burned. For months after the incendiary blaze the police guarded the Badali home, day and night. Letters have been received by the family demanding money for the past six months.

WIFE DIDN'T KNOW. Lived With Husband After He Secured Divorce.

New York, April 14.—For six years after her husband obtained a divorce Mrs. Dora Schwartz continued to live with him in happy ignorance of the fact, she says. On March 10th last her former husband, Louis Schwartz, left her and her child and took the furniture with him. Mrs. Schwartz went to the courts to compel him to support her. In defence Schwartz produced a certified copy of the divorce decree.

Dog Leads Searchers. Newburg, N.Y., April 14.—The body of James Malloy, aged sixty years, was found in a pond, yesterday. It is not known whether he was a suicide or accidentally fell in the water. His pet dog, which accompanied, returned to his home, and afterward led a party of friends to a spot on the shore where Malloy had disappeared.

A CRAZY MAN.

He Got Into Telegraph Office and Did Damage.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 14.—An apparently crazy man entered the telegraph office at Marshville station, on the Watkins railway, about ten miles west of Welland, this morning, and pulled them off the table. The operator, afraid of the man, rushed from the office to get assistance. The man, after tearing the telegraph switch board, which contained three wires, from its fastenings on the wall, putting all the wires out of business and both semaphores at danger and clamped westward. The cable passing under the canal feeder just west of Welland Junction was found the other morning torn from its fastenings and broken and this is supposed to have been the work of the same freak.

Arrested the Man. Marshville, Ont., April 14.—The man who entered the station here, this morning, and threatened to kill the agent, and broke the telegraph wires, was arrested by Constable Shuley, of Montague, after a hand struggle, about four miles west of here, and taken to Welland jail. He is supposed to be insane. His name is Copeman and he belongs to Ridgeway.

AN HEROIC PASTOR. Contributes His Salary to Pay Off Church Mortgage.

Cleveland, O., April 14.—Rev. Thomas L. Frazer, pastor of the Clark Avenue Friends church, has contributed his salary of \$15 a month to pay off the mortgage on his church, while he earns a living for himself and family by working as a mechanic in a motor-car works. By May 1st, \$1,500 must be raised.

PALACE OF AMBEE TONE. Buildings in Livadia of Fairy-like Appearance.

St. Petersburg, April 14.—The czar's new palace at Livadia, in the Crimea, will be a wonderfully beautiful building. It will be built entirely of Balauza stone, which, when polished, resembles pure amber, giving buildings of which it is constructed a fairy-like appearance. The new palace will be completed in 1912.

Railroad Betrayed. Chicago, April 14.—President J. T. Harahan, of the Illinois Central R.R., after weeks of investigation by detectives, is declared to have accumulated evidence of a gigantic system of grafting, which, if made public, will startle the railroad world.

Indignant Over Pardon Issued by Governor. Germantown, Tenn., April 14.—Lambert figure with these words, "Ham Patterson, you must obey the law," a mob of irate citizens set the torch to the figure last night, burning the Tennessee governor in effigy here, a few miles from the place where Governor Patterson was reared. The burning followed an indignation meeting of the citizens in the public square after news was received of the pardon of Col. Duncan B. Cooper, convicted of the murder of ex-Senator Carmack.

May Have a United University Club. Ottawa, April 14.—The Ottawa branch of the University of Toronto Alumni Association have just held its annual meeting and elected these officers for the year: President, T. C. Boville; vice-president, Thomas Mulvey; librarian, E. J. C. Farster; council, Messrs. B. R. McD. King, W. R. Greene, Charles Morse, S. J. McLean, and R. S. Smart. Plans are under way to confer with other university clubs of Ottawa, (Queen's, McGill, etc.) for the formation of a United University Club.

A Better Wage Rate. Pittsburg, April 14.—An advance in the pay of thousands of employees of the various subsidiary companies of the United States Steel Corporation equal to about six per cent, is said to have been decided upon. The changes are generally for laborers and employees getting less than \$100 a month. Brisk business and increasing scarcity of labor have aided in bringing about a better wage rate.

SIX FIREMEN KILLED

LOST THEIR LIVES AT NEW HAVEN, CONN.

Were Caught by Back Draft Which Slammed Doors and Shut Them in Burning Building Where They Were Fighting Flames.

New Haven, Conn., April 14.—Trapped by metal doors and barred windows, six firemen who were lighting flames in a workshop were caught by a back draft and burned to death, during the partial destruction of the New Haven county jail, yesterday. Three of their comrades were saved through the heroism of firemen outside. The bodies of the six men were found after the debris had been removed. Many other firemen were badly burned, but remained at work.

The dead are: Capt. O. L. Chapman, William Doherty, John Buckley, T. Cullen, James Morrell and Thomas J. McGrath.

Six men from truck No. 1 were fighting their way through the cell room of the jail into the workshop, when an explosion of a gasoline tank caused a back draft and slammed behind them the iron doors separating the two buildings. Three of the men were hemmed in a corner and burned to death, while the other three made their way to a barred window, to which they clung, with streams of water playing on them from the outside. Soon after reaching the window the roof fell in, and the ladders were put from the outside and down the inside and the men taken out. The other three firemen were caught by the same back draft as they were working at the other end of the building and were carried down by the roof when it fell in.

A THIRTY NEWSBOY. Wonderful Story of Roumanian Lad at Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, April 14.—The story of the remarkable drift of a little foreign lad, aged fourteen, was revealed when he applied to the Superintendent of Neglected Children for a newsboy's license. It appears that he came out here from Roumania two years ago, unable to speak a word of English, and since that time has succeeded in mastering the language to a certain extent, has attended school and has not only supported himself but has sent ten dollars per month to his widowed mother in Roumania to assist her in support of the little family. Besides this he has saved \$35 towards the \$100 required to pay her passage to the country. All this he has accomplished by selling newspapers.

BURNED IN EFFIGY. Indignant Over Pardon Issued by Governor.

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Victory of Temperance Advocates. Boston, April 14.—The temperance advocates of the state carried their successes in the upper branch of the legislature into the lower branch yesterday, where the so-called bar and bottle bill was passed to be engrossed by a viva voce vote, all amendments being killed by wide margins.

The bill must now pass both branches before it reaches the governor. The temperance workers concentrated their efforts this year on this measure, which divorces the first and fourth-class liquor licenses and forbids the sale of bottle goods by those who sell liquor to be drunk on the premises.

If the measure becomes law it will become effective May 1st.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

Rochester, N.Y., was chosen as the next meeting place of the Imperial Council of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

Mrs. Jane Mapson, who resides at 210 Talbot street, St. Thomas, was hit by a M.C.R. train on Thursday and instantly killed.

Cecil Griffiths, arrested a week ago, on a charge of bigamy, was committed as a lunatic in Toronto police court on Thursday morning.

H. L. Drayton, K.C., former county crown attorney, was appointed by the Toronto Board of Control as corporation counsel at \$10,000 a year.

John Progers, London, who shot Miss Frank, April 6th, was remanded by Police Magistrate Love, owing to the absence of the principal witness.

Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk railway system, has returned from his trip abroad. It is said it had no particular business interest and was more of a holiday nature.

James Macdonald, York Mills, who, by the tipping of a dump cart at the C.N.R. construction works, Scarborough, had an arm so badly crushed that it had to be amputated, died at St. Michael's hospital on Thursday morning.

Two special immigration trains arrived at Toronto on Wednesday night with about 350 immigrants on board. About one hundred of these stopped in Toronto and the rest went through to the west.
