**THE WAY THE MONEY WAS EX-
PENDED.**
With a small balance over a young
man was remembered—Five
hundred dollars spent in Tro-
phies.
The Frontenac trophy fund com-
mittee had a meeting yesterday after-
noon, at which the treasurer presented
his report, and matters were wound
up. The report showed a balance of
\$17.90, after every expense had been
paid, and this surplus, it was decided
by the committee, should be devoted
to buying a watch for a lad who had
accompanied the Frontenacs two or
three times, but had never played, and
whose name had been on the original
list.
The expenses of the opera house, the
athletic events, the advertising and
printing in both local papers, for the
presentation programme reached a
total output of \$145. The receipts
from the sale of tickets evening \$132—
making a deficit on the evening, when
all expenses properly chargeable to
it are included, of \$13.
The committee had on hand, how-
ever, a slight surplus from the buy-
ing of the watches. The medals \$17.60,
and the cost of the diamond ring
made the total of the souvenir ex-
pense \$500.
The 14th expense of putting on a
programme at the opera house would
have precluded the idea of sending
subscribers complimentary tickets,
without incurring a big deficit, and
the committee reluctantly decided that
to end matters evenly, they would have
to forego that pleasure.

REACHED THE SCOW.
Engineer in Territory Only Reached
by Suicides.
Niagara Falls, N.Y., April 15.—
Everett S. Mason, a young civil en-
gineer, this morning, successfully ac-
complished one of the most daring
feats in the history of the river, mak-
ing a trip out from the head of Green
Island to a mud scow which had
grounded on a reef about fifty feet
from the Goat Island shore. Mason first
made Ship Island, then worked his
way to Brig Island, both small patches
of land with a tree or two on them,
and then headed up stream for the
scow which grounded some ten days
ago in the American channel. Mason
went down twice but he managed to
regain his footing before the current
got a good grip on him. No one, ex-
cept a suicide, has ever been in that
part of the river. The scow is about
200 feet above the American falls.

BRITISH CONSULATE

**AT CHANG-SHA HAS BEEN DE-
STROYED.**
All Foreigners Have Been Forced to
Take Refuge on a Steamer—More
Missions Have Been Wiped Out.
Pekin, April 15.—The anti-foreign
riots at Chang-Sha and vicinity are
growing in violence. The British con-
sulate was destroyed, to-day, and all
foreigners were driven to take refuge
aboard a steamer. The missions bore
the brunt of the attack. Three mis-
sion stations, besides that of Wesleyan
China Inland Mission, the first at-
tacked, have been destroyed. The or-
der is spreading throughout the
entire province of Hunan and it is
feared every foreigner in the district
will be forced to flee before protection
arrives. A wholesale campaign of this
kind has been started by the frenzied
natives.
FOR BETTER HOME LIFE.
Pastoral to be Read in Roman
Catholic Churches.
Ottawa, April 15.—The second in-
stalled by the Canadian Roman Cat-
holic hierarchy at the plenary coun-
cil in Quebec, will be read in all the
Catholic churches next Sunday. It is
a very interesting document and has
some pregnant things to say on clubs,
the divorce problem, and prevailing
evils of the present day. It says:
"We especially admonish heads of
families to devote to their homes all
the time that legitimate business af-
fairs and legitimate social duties leave
at their disposal. Nothing so much
disorganizes the family circle as the
habit prevalent nowadays with far too
many husbands of seeking apart from
their wives and children distractions
and amusements to which their tacit
indulgence. They are seldom found
at home and numberless are the pre-
texts for absence, frequent and pro-
longed. There are to be found in all
centres of any importance, clubs,
which serve to an alarming extent as
counter attractions to the domestic
hearth. It is there that too often
men waste their time indulging in
companionless, conversations, games,
which leave to them unimpaired nei-
ther fortune, health nor faith."
MINING FRAUD.
William S. Phillips, Chicago, Given
Three Years.
Chicago, April 15.—William S. Phil-
lips, president of the American-Mexico
Mining and Development company,
was sentenced to three years in
prison and a fine of \$1,000 by
Judge Landis in the United States
district court. It was alleged he sold
\$500,000 worth of stock in the mining
company and to have paid large un-
earned dividends out of money re-
ceived from purchasers of the stock. His
victim are said to have lost an ag-
gregate of \$300,000.

Rochester, N.Y., April 15.—Mrs. Bar-
ow Baggerly, who lived on a farm
near Clifton Springs, N.Y., and a farm
aborer employed there, Charles
Cooley, died from being poisoned by
something they ate at dinner, and
Barrow Baggerly, the dead woman's
husband, is in a critical condition. A
laughter was not affected. It is be-
lieved that Mrs. Baggerly by mistake
put some sort of poison into a to-
mato soup eaten at the noon meal.
The tomatoes used in the soup were
home canned.
