



NICKLE'S DINNER

IN HONOR OF THE PREMIER OF ONTARIO

And His Fellow Cabinet Ministers—A Brilliant Gathering in the Frontenac Club—Interesting Speeches.

Last evening W. F. Nickle, M.P.P., entertained to dinner at the Frontenac Club the premier, his two colleagues and the dozen members of the legislature accompanying them to the convocation of the university. Over fifty representative citizens gathered to hear them good company. The best efforts of the well-appointed club were drawn upon for a generous entertainment. It was a gathering made up largely of party men, and yet was non-political. The liberals showed unmixed tokens of friendship and compliment, and had but one reserve and regret that the occasions had not been more frequent of reciprocal feeling when they, too, practice the princely art of hospitality.

The king having been toasted, Edw. J. B. Pense gave "Our Country," with all the ardor of an enthusiast, and paid generous tribute to the merits of the two ministers asked to respond. The premier made reply in the spirit

The Kingston presbytery was in session at Chalmers church to-day for the examination of students desiring to be licensed to preach the gospel. The board of examiners consisted of Prof. James Fowler, Rev. Dr. MacKie, Rev. E. F. Torrance and Rev. J. K. Conn. The students to be licensed this evening are: J. W. Johnston, M.A., Athens; R. H. Liggett, B.A., Garden Hill; A. M. Little, B.A., Kingston; J. A. McAskle, B.A., West Highgate; J. M. Macgillivray, B.A., Peterborough; J. A. Shaw, B.A., B.D., Kingston; William Stott, B.A., Sapperton; B.C.; Alexander Rintoul, B.A., Badgerston, C. C. Salbury, Waterford; J. C. Robinson, Kingston. Two of the above will be ordained, viz., Messrs. McAskle and Stott, who are going to the Canadian west to take charge.

TO BURROW UNDER BALTIK.

From Denmark to Sweden—Journey of Ninety Minutes.

According to Electrical Engineering a definite proposal has been put forward for the construction of a tunnel between Denmark and Sweden, starting at Copenhagen, and connecting up with Malone. Connection would be made on the way with the small islands of Amager and Saltholm, and the electric trains which it is proposed to work through the tunnel would run on the surface of these islands, in order to reduce the underground journey as much as possible. If the scheme is carried out, it is estimated that the trip could be made in one and a half hours.

What Dr. Seath Suggests.

The board of education has received a draft proposal of how the grant from Queen's university for the pedagogic students' instruction in the city schools should be apportioned. The suggestion is that of Dr. Seath, superintendent of education for Ontario. The doctor wants to give teachers of the schools increases in salary, but nothing is mentioned as a grant to the board of education for the use of the schools. The board wants a grant of \$1,000 or \$1,500 for this use. Dr. Seath wants the teachers of Victoria school to have first-class certificates. This would necessitate a clearing out of the present teaching staff, and the board of education may balk.

Principal Ellis' Successor.

The appointment of W. S. Ellis, M.A., as dean of the Faculty of Education at Queen's university, will necessitate his retirement from his position as principal of the Collegiate Institute at the end of the June term. The man who is likely to succeed him at the Collegiate is E. O. Sliter, M.A., classical master, and assistant principal. Mr. Sliter has been connected with the Collegiate since 1888, and is one of the best teachers in the province.
