New York, April 25.—Twenty-two persons testified for the prosecution against Albert Walter Wolter, on trial before Judge Foster, charged with the murder of Ruth Amos Wheeler, on March 24th last. When the last witness left the stand Frank Moss, First Assistant District Attorney, de-

cided the state's case at rest, an analysis of the prosecution shewed in few, if any, dropped stitches in its mesh of circumstantial evidence.

Simon C. Eates, principal of the Merchants' and Bakers' Business School, which Ruth Wheeler attended, testified concerning the postal card

written by Wolter asking for a stenographer. Ernest Junemann, proprietor of the bakery at which Kate Muller was employed, and Mrs. Retta Klinger, who lived in the flat underneath Wolter's room, also were witnesses.

Wolter was convicted and sentenced to death.

A CURIOUS MUSEUM.

Contains Guillotines That Did Much Gruesome Service.

A special museum has been formed in connection with the Victor Emmanuel library of Rome with the object of collecting all the historical relics and documents relating to United Italy. Four awful exhibits have just been added to the collection. These consist of the guillotine used by the papal government for public executions, the hooded garment of flaming red cloth worn by the executioner, the white garment still bloodstained worn by his assistant who raised on high the head of the condemned man to show the people that justice had been done, and finally the large knife used by the executioner to give the so-called stroke of mercy in cases when the steel blade of the guillotine did not kill the victim instantly.

These relics of the past have been included in the new museum since

they were used to behead besides criminals conspirators, who plotted against the papal government. The last execution under the papal government took place on July 9th, 1870, but capital punishment was not resorted to except in cases of paricide, double murders, brigandage and other crimes.

On an average six executions took place every year throughout the papal states. Thus the celebrated Marquis Titta, who was executioner, under the popes from 1796 to 1864, beheaded 514 criminals and his successor, Balducci, between 1868 and 1870 beheaded only twelve and then retired on a pension and died mass until he died.

The whey will then be pressed out and the casein which remains will be shipped in bags. Daily shipments of cream and casein will be made.
