ONTARIO RICH IN MANLY YOUNG MEN

If there is one thing more than another that strikes one forcibly about him, it is his resoluteness of purpose in reaching for a position for himself and his reasoning that he can accomplish it. The average Canadian boy of to-day is unaided, to see who we're the worthy boys and girls, because we're just starting then. I wanted to find out the students who were borrowing money, either at high rate of interest or from somebody who would want it back too soon, boys who by virtue of fact that the younger boys at home had come along and required an education found less fund available for them.

President Creelman tells a good instance of this sort of thing which has not been brought out before. He relates in these words:

When I came to this institution five years ago, I found that in the safe of the President's office there was a cheque book on a bank in Guelph with a deposit of \$1,000 in the bank to my credit. It looked to me that this was pretty nearly found money for me. I went on further in the investigation and discovered by writing to Dr. Mills that the will of the late W. H. Pittsburgh Companies Find it Hard to Keep Employees.

The matrimonial bee finds its way into the heads and hearts of sixteen per cent. of the 1,200 or more telephone operators employed by the two companies operating in and about Pittsburgh. Statistics furnished by those in authority a few days ago substantiate this claim and this is one of the reasons telephone companies are obliged to keep their training schools busy from day to day.

Most of the girls are taken into the employment of the telephone companies between the ages of eighteen and twenty-three, although some are as young as sixteen, while others are past twenty-three. The company realizes that this is a young woman's most advantageous age from a matrimonial standpoint, although some have continued in the service fourteen years or more before braving the storms of matrimony. The greatest drain on the service occurs in the months of June or December, or just at the close of Lent, when many of the girls leave the service.
