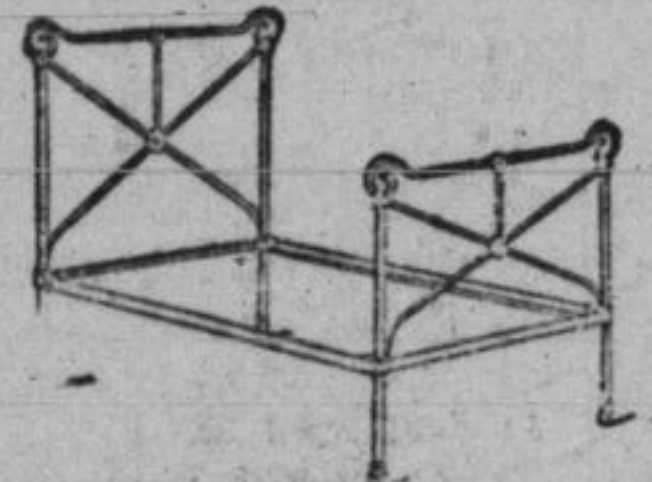

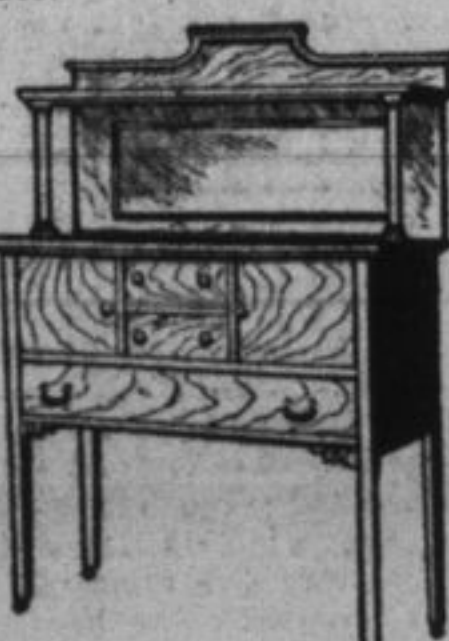

CHILD DIED FROM BURNS.

Received by Her Dress Catching Fire on Friday. The burns received on Friday afternoon by little Hilda Clay, the two-year-old daughter of Albert Clay, Wellington street, proved fatal, the little tot passing away at the general hospital at 2.30 o'clock, Saturday morning.

Just how the accident happened will never be fully known. Mr. Clay said the child's mother left her in a room alone for only a moment while she laid her baby in its cot, and when she returned found the child in flames. The mother at once tried to save her little one, and in so doing was herself severely burned around the arms and breast. Dr. Keys was summoned, and had the little girl removed to the general hospital, where she passed away.

The death of her daughter was a great shock to Mrs. Clay, who is in the Hotel Dieu, being treated for the burning she received. It was indeed a very sad affair, and the bereaved family have the sincerest sympathy of friends.

THE DRYDOCK TRANSFER To be Made on Monday by Public Works Engineer.

TO ADVERTISE CITY BY PRINTING 50,000 BUSINESS ENVELOPES. Civic Committee Decide to Seek the Aid of the Business Men in Booming the City—Deseronto Wants the Smelter. The civic industries and printing committees have decided to make a start in advertising Kingston by means of envelopes to be used by business men. Aid. Hoag, chairman of the printing committee, and Aid. McCann, chairman of the industries committee, were authorized to have 50,000 envelopes, containing on the back a reference to Kingston as the finest place on earth to live. These envelopes will be sold to business men at a reasonable figure, and will find their way all over the continent. Other cities have used that method of advertising. Everything done to boom Kingston counts. It is felt that the city council has paid too little attention to advertising the Limestone City. It will be found that it pays to advertise.

Bidding for Smelter Company. Deseronto is trying to get the Canadian Lead Mining and Smelting company, of Kingston, to locate its smelter there.
