VETERANS AT REST JOSEPH GEORGE PASSED AWAY TUESDAY NIGHT. He Had Been a Long Time Resident Here—Peter Grattan Lived at Amherst Island and Kingston. One of Kingston's oldest and best known residents passed away on Tuesday night, in the person of Joseph George, Wellington street, at the age of eighty-nine years. Several weeks ago he was attacked by heart trouble and forced to keep to his room. Prior to this he had never been ill a day in his life, being of a very rugged constitution. The deceased was born on May 27th, 1821, in Philadelphia, Pa., and came to Canada when a young man, settling in Kingston, where he resided for the past sixty-nine years. He was once in the building business, and then opened a piano and organ warehouse on Gore street. Mr. George was an independent liberal in politics, and was connected with the First Congregational church. He was twice married, his second wife surviving. Mr. George amassed considerable wealth while he was in business.

Death of Peter Grattan. The death occurred at his home, 128 Division street, of Peter Grattan, a resident of this city and Amherst Island, for several years. Deceased was sixty years of age and had been ill for about four months. Deceased came to the city from Amherst Island but his early life was spent in Kansas. He was a carpenter by trade and in the building and built several small boats now in use around the Kingston harbor. He is survived by his wife, but no family. The funeral took place on Wednesday morning, at 9:30 o'clock, at St. Mary's cathedral, where mass was sung by Rev. Father Halligan. The pall bearers were Messrs. James and John Fleming, James Keating, J. J. Cyrille Pelletier and J. E. H. Howison. Was Ill Not Three Days. After an illness of but three days the death occurred at the general hospital, at noon, on Wednesday, of William G. Davies, of 83 Pine street, an old and much respected resident of the city. Deceased, employed as a pattern maker, at the locomotive works, was in his usual good health all last week, was at his work on Saturday, and on Sunday evening attended Brock street. Deceased, which he was a member. About midnight, Sunday, he was taken ill, and gradually his illness became worse. On Tuesday night he was removed to the hospital, but in spite of the best medical aid nothing could be done for him. He became unconscious on Monday and remained in that condition until the end. Meningitis is given as the cause of death. The late Mr. Davies was fifty-two years of age and was born in the old country. He had been a resident of the city for thirty years, was very well-known, and general regret was expressed on the announcement of his death. Deceased was a member of Kingston lodge of Oddfellows, and also a member of the Sons of England. He is survived by his wife, four sons, George and Albert, of Montreal, Frederick and Oram, of Kingston, and six daughters, Mrs. James Layden, Montreal, Mrs. William Demarest, of Demarest, New Jersey, Mrs. Walter Easton, of Kingston, and Misses Frances, Nellie and Edith, all at home.
