

MEETING OF THE W.C.T.U.

Encouraging Reception From Penitentiary Female Inmates.

In view of all that may suggest of removals and house cleaning, with unpleasant weather included, a very encouraging monthly meeting of the W.C.T.U. was held on Tuesday. Although Mrs. (Rev.) McCallum, president, was not able to be present, we have cause to hope from her steady improvement that she soon will be. In the meantime Mrs. (Rev.) Craig, vice-president, fills the position acceptably.

After the usual opening exercises, Mrs. Craig called upon Mrs. James Gardner to give a brief scripture reading. Mrs. Gardner chose as her topic the words addressed by Paul to Timothy, in parts of chapters I and III of II Timothy, showing the advantage derived from early religious training in the home.

A letter was read by the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Mackie, district superintendent of the eastern counties, beginning with Frontenac, for lumber camps, suggesting aid required. It was decided to send a suitable contribution and a quantity of literature, it being too late now to prepare comfort bags for this year's work. The members have started and hope soon to complete some comfort bags for use in connection with the sailors' work.

Mrs. Wilson accepted charge of keeping the boxes at the railway stations, supplied with literature during May.

The ladies appointed to take Mrs. McCallum's place in visiting the prison, reported a very encouraging reception from the few female inmates present at the meetings, and an earnest request to have them repeat their visit.—COM.

MOTHER'S DAY NEXT SUNDAY.

Event Will be Honored in Queen Street Methodist Church.

What promises to be a very widely celebrated annual occasion is the lately originated "Mother's Day." It is one that will appeal to the best sentiment the world over, and when once it becomes thoroughly established will have perhaps a farther-reaching influence than any "day" that we have at present. It may take the mothers some time to become accustomed to being celebrated even semi-publicly, but they will doubtless in time enjoy the sight of the white flower, as a sweet reminder of sweet

memories.

For the wearing of a white carnation—or other white flower, though the carnation is especially chosen—to mark the honoring of Mother's Day. White flowers are also to be sent to friends or to hospitals in honor of "the best mother who ever lived!" The originators of the movement hope that ministers will hold special services on the Sunday selected, which has been set for the second Sunday in May annually, and that efforts will be made to have as many of the aged and "shut in," brought to these services as possible.

The "Mother's Day" movement originated in Philadelphia, only two years ago, but already has been observed all over the United States.

The celebrations to the south of the great lakes do not as a rule awake more than a moderate thrill in Canada, but it seems possible that the wearing of the white carnation may be adopted readily. Next Sunday will be "Mother's Day" in 1910.

A BARRIEFIELD ASSAULT

Ends in James Esford Being Committed for Trial.

On Tuesday afternoon, before Magistrate George H. Hunter, James Esford, Barriefield, was committed for trial, charged with assaulting George Warmington, of the same village. W. F. Nickle appeared for the plaintiff and A. B. Cunningham for the defendant. Only one witness, the plaintiff, was examined, and his story was enough to warrant the magistrate to commit the accused for trial. Warmington's face showed clearly the effects of the encounter, one eye badly blackened, his nose swollen and his face cut.

He told a clear connected story, of how on Saturday evening, Esford came to his house, asked for him, and when he appeared, he was attacked, practically on his own doorstep. The plaintiff first over the children who were playing around, then spread to the grown-ups, and before the final fight a lawyer's letter was sent to Esford warning him to keep the peace. It was shortly after the receipt of this that he attacked Warmington.

The accused, who was allowed out on bail, will appear before Judge Price early next week.

VIEWING THE COMET.

Father McWilliams Reports Having Seen It.

Halley's comet showed large this morning, but not bright. The tail was very prominent and of fair length, being very broad and broken at the termination. The comet was by no means brilliant presenting a general haze, making the outline very identified. It appeared in the horizon, about 2.57 a.m., and as it climbed up, the sky revealed something of its size. At 3.15 a.m., it stood out in a clear patch of sky and made extended observation possible.

Rev. Father McWilliams reports seeing Halley's comet this morning with a good glass. So far it has not come up to popular expectation and some astronomers are of the opinion it will probably prove a popular disappointment as far as size and brilliancy are concerned to the average observer.

There Are No Restrictions.

A change has been made in the post office money order system of late. There are now no restrictions on the payment of orders. The orders are accepted by the banks, where before they were not. The large increase in the post office money order department shows that the orders are becoming more popular. It is claimed that they are the cheapest and safest way of sending money. WILL BE CONSIDERED**WAGE SCHEDULE AT THE LIGHT PLANT.**

Matter was Taken up at the Regular Meeting and Referred to Manager and Chairman—Some Tenders for Supplies.

The regular meeting of the light, heat and power committee was held on Tuesday afternoon, in the offices of the general manager, at the light plant. The chairman, Ald. Elliott, was in the chair, and the other members present were Alds. Hartly, Toye, Rigney and McCann.

A large number of accounts were presented and ordered to be paid, as checked off by the auditor.

The manager presented a report on the gas main extensions, giving the names of the different streets where the work would be undertaken, the required number having been secured for that purpose. The work will be carried out as soon as possible.

This goes to show that Ald. Elliott's campaign inaugurated some time ago, with the motto, "Cook with gas," has had a grand result.

The records go to show that there has been a very large increase in the number of gas consumers. People who have started to use the gas for cooking purposes are delighted with the result, and during this summer it is expected that a great many more names will be added to the list.

The chairman announced at Tuesday's meeting that it was his intention to advertise the gas in the local press. He is one of the many who believes in printers' ink.

Tenders were received for cast iron pipe, and it was decided to accept that of the Gartshore, Thompson Pipe company, being the lowest, at \$33.60 per ton.

Tenders were also received for the supply of paint for the gas holder, but no decision was arrived at, the matter being left in the hands of the chairman and manager.

The chairman will also ask the advice of the manager and the engineer on the purchase of a separator.

The committee considered the ripeness of the staff at the plant for an increase in wages but no definite action was taken, it being left with the manager and chairman for a report.

Information was presented showing the wages paid in the plant at Guelph and St. Thomas, and taking an average it was shown that more money was paid out in Kingston than in St. Thomas or Guelph.

Having a Busy Time.

Outside of the carpenters, these are very busy days with all branches of trade, in the city. A plumber told the Whig to-day that business was rushing, and that he had more work than he could attend to. A great deal of this rush has been brought about by the new regulation of the board of health, calling for the putting in of improvements in the houses.
