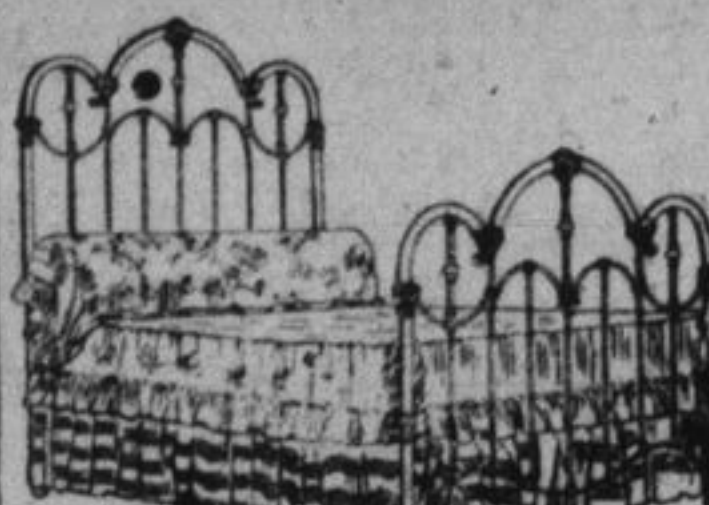
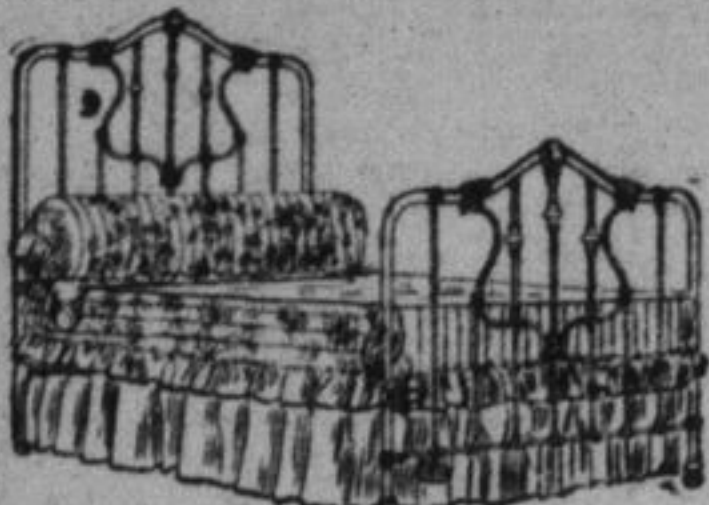

On Friday evening, of this week, Mr. Davies was to have been presented with the medal, which he had nobly won, the ceremony to take place when the regiment was lined up, but the hand of death stopped in and carried off an honored veteran before the full honors could be conveyed upon him. Mr. Davies was a warm friend of both the old and young members of the regiment, and his death was learned with deep regret on all sides.

HIS LEG WAS BROKEN

ACCIDENT TO ENOCH BURTON ON CLARENCE STREET.

His Horse Ran Away and he was Thrown on Road—Animal Kicked Dashboard to Pieces—Mr. Burton Was Tossed Into Air When Wagon Collided With Pole.

Enoch Burton, carpenter-contractor, Patrick street, met with an unfortunate accident about ten o'clock this morning, by which he sustained a bad fracture of the left leg. He was driving down Clarence street, in his wagon and when he felt his horse start, his horse took fright at a standing automobile and started to kick and run. The animal kicked the dashboard to pieces, but Mr. Burton hung on to the reins and turned the runaway horse to the left hand side of the road. A collision with a telephone pole at the side of the C.M.E.A. office followed and Mr. Burton was thrown several feet into the air and landed on the road, falling heavily on his left leg. The horse half turned, and the dazed man was in danger of being trampled on. Postmaster James Stewart, who was coming up the street, saw Mr. Burton, thrown on the road, and ran to his aid, and moved him aside to escape injury from the plunging animal. Others came to his aid also. The builder was unable to rise and said that his leg was broken. A cab was called and the injured man was lifted into it—and driven to Dr. Mundell's and thence to his home, where the doctor reduced the fracture, which is below the knee.

EAT MUCH SPINACH.

It Will Induce Energy, Says a Student.

According to a Washington, D.C., despatch, the high cost of eggs, meat and dairy produce has evolved leguminotherapy, which the department of agriculture is ready to present to the nation.

According to this science, green peas cause frivolity and flirtatiousness; carrots develop good temper; spinach inspires energy, ambition and will power, while the lowly potato develops the reasoning faculties, as well as gives great calmness of reflection. Vegetables are to be taken in quantities and varieties to suit the person who eats them.

Boiled carrots are prescribed for bad temper; green peas should be denied to girls with a tendency to flirt over-indulgence in potatoes is apt to produce apathy and laziness; spinach should be taken, particularly by the young, because it induces energy and develops constancy.

French string beans are said to constitute an ideal diet for poets and artists, while haricot beans should be eaten by intellectual workers because they restore the nervous system and should, the science holds, be preferred as a strengthening food to an assortment of meats and especially beef. Disraeli, Carlyle, Daudet and Barbé fed on haricot beans.

Cauliflower and cabbage are nourishing, but not advocated because they have the drawback of producing vulgarity of character and slowness of perception.
