BEGAN PASTORATE

REV. E. LE ROY RICE AT FIRST CONGREGATIONAL.

His Initial Service—A Strong Appeal for Service—The Church Failed to Realize the Glorious Opportunities Offered for Service—Self-seeking a Drawback.

At the morning service Rev. Mr. Rice preached a strong sermon on "Humanity the Gateway to Service," and made an earnest appeal for service to Christ. His text was taken from John 13th chapter, 14th and 15th verses: "If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet, ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example that ye should do as I have done to you."

Before dealing with his theme Rev. Mr. Rice made a few remarks, relative to his taking up the work at the church. He said that he had not come simply because he had been invited. "I come to you because I am conscious of a direct call from God to take up the work," he said. "I come to you because I have faith in you, who know the situation here, and I believe that you have, in a measure, faith in me, or you would not have invited me to come. I trust that as time passes this mutual faith we have in each other may not be discontinued. I ask for your hearty co-operation in the work of this church, you will realize that we must extend our energy, and that we must work if we are to succeed in performing the task God has placed upon us."

"There is nothing better that I could speak of than service, and the one thing which I wish to emphasize throughout my ministry is the need for service. If the Christian church is failing it is largely because it is not performing the work it should; because it is not taking advantage of the privileges offered for service."

Referring to his subject the speaker spoke of the way Christ had sacrificed for His people. If there were any here which should have been impressed upon the disciples it was that of service, but still at the close of Christ's ministry they had not learned this. They were still as children in a kindergarten. Soul growth was something which required a great deal of time. A mushroom would grow in one night, an oak would take a century, but man would take a lifetime. Christ understood the hearts of His people. He understood their selfishness. How often selfishness barred the way of progress. Men would be looking for higher places, and in so doing they could not see the humble places.

"One of the greatest reasons why so much of our work is ineffectual, is because of the selfishness and self-seeking that besets us," added the speaker. "Jesus performed the slave's task, in washing the feet of his followers. There is need that we, as a Christian church, should gaze on that scene in the upper room. I will not say that the church is failing in its mission, but I will say that it has never yet realized the glorious opportunities for service, that are open to it."

"You might say that you would serve if you were given the opportunity. You say that you have not served, because you had not a position of prominence. Friends, this church does not consist of its pastor and board of management. You are the church. The church does not exist simply to-day. The kingdom is in you, whether you are in the office, on the street, or in the home, and the opportunities come to you for service. Every day, people are coming to our land, from across the sea, people of various ideas, and they are to be gathered together? True, we have our schools, and they are of great assistance, but there is no force like the Christian church."

"The church of the next century is to be the church whose influence shall extend to all classes and conditions of men. The church must serve both the rich and the poor; the church of the next century is to be the church whose influence shall extend not only to the home life, but to the community life as well. We must realize the service, if we would succeed. There is a great danger of us forgetting the small opportunities. Remember that all service ranks the same with God. We must be humble, and rid ourselves of our pride. May the watchword of service be the watchword of the church in the future."

At the evening service, Rev. Mr. Rice spoke on the subject, "The Optimism of Jesus."
