## PROCLAIMED KING

WITH ALL OLD TIME POMP AND SPLENDOR.

No Mourning Was Allowed When King George V. Was Proclaimed—The Quaint Old Ceremonies.

London, May 10.—George V. was formally proclaimed King of England and all its dominions on Monday. All the gorgeous pomp and display that have marked this ceremony since medieval days were observed. No evidences of mourning were permitted, in accordance with the ancient custom, all flags being raised from half-mast to the top for the occasion. The heralds, with the pursuivants, kings-at-arms, etc., entered the city, and read the proclamation at Charing Cross, Temple Bar and the Royal Exchange, the reading being received with the royal salute, the playing of the National Anthem and the dipping of the colors. This ceremony concluded, the lord mayor entertained the heralds at the Mansion House, the first toast being to the new king. Fully half a million persons lined the streets to witness the quaint procession.

### DEATH MASK OF KING'S FACE.

Sculptor Says Face Showed Perfect Calm.

London, May 10.—Bruce Joy, the sculptor, took a death mask of the late king's face, on Saturday, at the request of Queen Alexandra. He describes the face as being almost entirely free from the lines which marked it when the king sat for his bust. It appeared much younger and showed perfect calm. The sculptor admired the shapeliness of his majesty's hands, which were outside the sheet. He noted especially the strong, well-formed nails. The bedroom in which the body of his majesty lies is only medium sized. The bed is of wood with simple carving. During the operation of making the mask, which occupied less than a quarter of an hour, Queen Alexandra entered the room twice. She was dressed with absolute simplicity. She did not speak, but seemed distressed by grief.

### "SAVE MY WIFE AND CHILDREN"

Soldier Was Drowned, But His Family Rescued.

Hullfax, N.S., May 10.—Corpl. R. J. Gregg, of No. 1 Company, R.C.G., commander of Port Clarence, on the western side of Halifax harbor, was drowned, and six others were in the boat with him had a narrow escape. Two of them may yet die as a result. They had just left the pier at the fort, when a gust of wind sprang their boat. Two of the party were Gregg's wife and infant daughter. Gregg shouted to the soldiers who were also in the boat and who could swim, "Don't mind me, save my wife and children." They managed to do this, but Gregg perished.

### WAS FAMOUS DETECTIVE.

Former Head of New York Police Is Dead.

New York, May 10.—Thomas F. Byrnes, formerly superintendent of police of the city of New York, but more famous for his work in the detective bureau, died at his home here from chronic indigestion after an illness of more than two years. He was 66 years old. It was Byrnes who first drew the headline in the financial district, below which no crook was allowed to stray, on penalty of instant arrest. His many successes in unravelling baffling crimes made him perhaps the best known detective of his generation.

### Peanut Roaster Exploded.

Poughkeepsie, N.Y., May 10.—An explosion of a peanut roasting machine on Market street was followed by freak results. Timothy Nolan, a young man who was passing at the time, had one of his shoes blown off and his foot badly scalded. Edward Clayton, a pedestrian near-by, had his watch blown out of his pocket and an unknown woman was splattered with gasoline, which failed to burn. Several pedestrians had narrow escapes from being burned. The explosion wrecked the machine.

### To Punish Girl Traders.

Washington, May 10.—The revelations made in the white slave investigations in New York and other cities make it certain that congress will pass an ironclad law for the punishment of girl traders. Investigation made by the immigration commission already has resulted in the arrest of an excellent law to protect alien women.

### Drowned in the Hudson.

Albany, N.Y., May 10.—Norman Russell, aged nineteen, of Rensselaer, was drowned while canoeing in the Hudson river, opposite Albany. William Fryer, his brother-in-law, who was with him when the canoe capsized, succeeded in getting ashore.

### DIVORCES IN CANADA.

Twenty Granted During Last Session of Parliament. Ottawa, May 10.—Divorces in Canada are on the increase. Twenty of them were granted in the session just closed. Of this number seven were from Toronto. The figures in the last ten years are:—1900, five; 1901, three; 1902, four; 1903, nine; 1904, seven; 1905, ten; 1906, seven; 1907, seven; 1908, twelve; 1909, seventeen.

### CONGO BONDS VANISHED.

King Said to Have Given \$6,000,000 to Countess. Brussels, May 10.—M. Vanderheld, the socialist leader in the Chamber of Deputies, charges in an open letter that on the day before was operated upon the late King Leopold turned over to Baroness Vaughan \$6,000,000 worth of Congo bonds, which could not be found when the Congo was annexed to Belgium.

### Was the Star of Bethlehem.

Webster City, Iowa, May 10.—"The Star of Bethlehem was only Halley's comet," declares the Rev. Dr. Spyer of St. Paul's Universal Church. "Bible student say Jesus was born four years prior to the year 1 A.D. According to the present calendar, figuring back at the interval the comet is due." Rev. Mr. Spyer finds that this heavenly visitor or was due when the star of Bethlehem was seen. The comet, like the star, appears in the east and the southern course. From these deductions, Dr. Spyer gives it as his belief that the star and the comet are one.

### A Great Engineer Dead.

Rochester, Minn., May 10.—Walter Paik Kerr, president of Westinghouse, Church, Kerr & Co., and a well-known construction engineer, died here Monday, following an operation for kidney trouble. Kerr was one of the founders of the company of which he was the head. One of his greatest undertakings is the Pennsylvania terminal, now in course of construction in New York city.
