The steamer Kinnoult cleared for Beaufort to load grain for Fort William; steamer Glenlimon arrived Saturday morning from Fort William, with 74,000 bushels of wheat; the tug Bartlett cleared with two barges for Oswego and upon arrival on Saturday afternoon cleared for Montreal with three grain-laden barges; the tug Emerson passed up with the Standard Oil barge No. 57, on the way to Port Dalhousie.

Tenders for the addition to the post office have not yet been called as the specifications are not quite ready.
