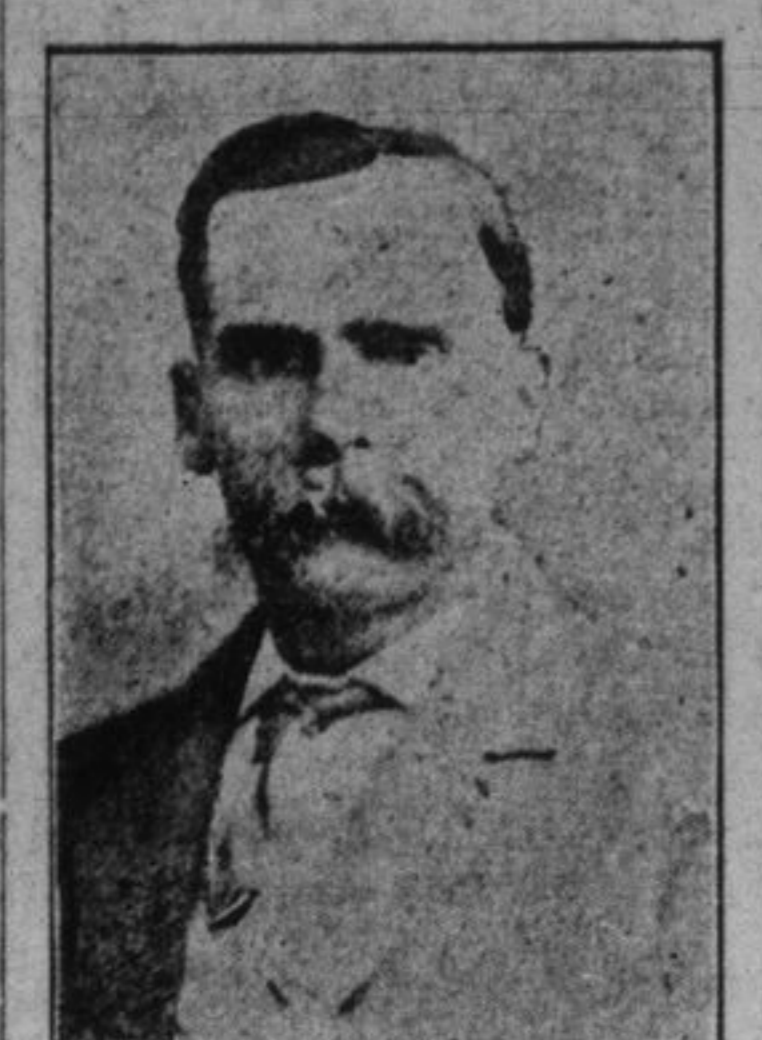
OLIVER PLANS TRIP

TO VISIT NORTH COUNTRY DURING THE SUMMER.

Will Go From Edmonton Through Peace River District and Mackenzie River to Arctic Ocean, Returning by Dawson and Prince Rupert.

Ottawa, May 14.—Hon. Frank Oliver will leave for the west in the course of a week or so, and will spend the greater part of the summer there. The minister has under contemplation a unique trip during the summer from Edmonton north through the Peace River district and Mackenzie River right up to the Arctic Ocean, thence overland to Dawson City, and from there down to Prince Rupert and Vancouver.

The carrying out of the plan is conditional at present on whether or not Mr. Oliver will be able to spare the necessary time from his duties as minister of the interior, but he is

anxious to make, if possible, a personal survey of the great northwestern timber land, through which no member of the government has heretofore ever travelled.

A detachment of mounted police will accompany him over the route from Edmonton to Dawson City if he finds that he has an opportunity to take the trip.
