SERMON FROM SHAKESPEARE

Ignorance is the curse of God. Ignorance is the curse of God! There are no limitations to this expression. It is not one of the curses. It is the curse, the evil from which all other evils spring. At first sight this might seem somewhat extreme, but a little reflection will show that Shakespeare was right. A glance back over history will prove this. The nations steeped in ignorance have been the most brutal and barbarous. Where illiteracy prevailed sin and disease found excellent breeding grounds. During the long period from the fifth to the fifteenth century Europe was intellectually in Stygian darkness; the little learning there was, was hidden in castles and monasteries. The dark ages is the name fittingly given to that period of ignorance. Cruelty was a common practice and superstition prevailed. It was not until the literature of the Greeks and the Romans, the explorations of the daring navigators of Spain and France and England had made the world, ancient and modern, known to mankind, that the darkness was, in a degree, dispelled. What does the Renaissance mean? A new birth! A birth to light and life. Man in the fifteenth century was born again. Science and art and literature worked together, to dispel the darkness that brooded over the earth. Shakespeare had no doubt about the nature of ignorance. There was "no darkness but ignorance;" ignorance was "gross and miserable;" it was "the common curse of mankind." He was enormously in advance of his age. Writing at the end of the sixteenth century and early in the seventeenth, he had apparently completely broken away from the superstitions of his time. With a seer's insight he saw into the heart of things, and on every great question spoke as profoundly as does the most advanced thinker in the twentieth century. It would be impossible to mention any question of vital importance to the individual and the state on which he has not uttered words of wisdom. He was a veritable lightbearer, a dispeller of darkness, showing kings and peasants, the rich and the poor, their duty. Where ignorance is there is the curse of God. Illiterate Turkey is unpeopled Africa; ignorant Africa is darkest Africa. Nations that remain illiterate drop behind in the race. Unless the mind is fed with healthy food the whole being becomes degenerate. A man may live frugally and grow strong, but if he starve his mind he becomes a sluggard, a butterfly, a brute. PRICES THAT SHOCK WOMEN.

The Cost of Living Has Really Gone Up. Mabel Potter Daggett, in the Delinquent. So much has been said about the rise in the cost of living that a few facts about summer prices of women's clothing may be used to illustrate just how prices have soared. A woman's ready-made suit has cost \$3 and upward more this spring than last, for the same quality. She can still buy the suit alluringly marked "\$9.49 cut from \$15," but it has so deteriorated in quality that it has ceased to be a bargain at its price. Actually the suit that is marked to-day as of the quality that sold four years ago for \$10, the woman who bought a pattern and made her spring suit had to pay \$1 a yard for common blue serge that she bought last year at 70c., or for broadcloth \$1.50 a yard for what was formerly \$1.25. Gloves that were \$1 are now \$1.25. Stockings that were 50c. while ago 25c. are now 35c. Shoes have just been marked up. The National Boot and Shoe Manufacturers say it's not their fault. It is because the public that found meat too expensive reduced their consumption of that article of food. Therefore there are fewer hides on the market, which has increased the price of leather in the last three years from 17c. to 32c. a pound. Therefore shoes that were formerly \$3 a pair are now \$3.50. Women's sandal rubbers that were 25c. a pair a few years ago are now 70c., and the men's rubbers are \$1. The manufacturers say one reason of it is the automobile, the tires of a single machine using a supply of rubber that would have made more than a hundred pairs of footwear. The kitchen broom that once was 25c. is now 40c., and a purchase \$100 recently advised by the dealer: "Better buy now. They're likely to go to \$1 before the end of the year." Even a kitchen apron costs more than it did before with gingham, which many a housewife has purchased for 6c. a yard, now retailing at 10c. Staple cotton cloth, once 7c. is now 12c. a yard, and standard sheeting has moved up from 9c. to 15c. a yard. The cheapest woollen blankets have gone from \$5 to \$7 a pair under the operation of a protective tariff.

HITS LIQUOR TRADE.

Walls of Victuallers Evoke Sarcastic Comment. As the time inexorably approaches for "the trade" to disgorge in taxes some part of the extra money it has exacted from the public, its shrieks of protest are daily becoming more piercing. At a fully attended meeting of the board of the Licensed Victuallers' Central Protection Society of London, held yesterday, Edward Johnson, J.P., presided, a resolution was unanimously adopted, viewing "With grave apprehension the imposition of enormously increased licensed duties upon an already distressed and over-burdened industry. The board reiterates its previously expressed opinion that the additional taxation imposed by the budget must inevitably result in the financial ruin of thousands of licensed traders and thrifty investors in breweries and similar undertakings, and hereby resolves to use every legitimate effort to secure at the earliest possible opportunity the removal of a burden too heavy and grievous to be borne." We reported yesterday a similar resolution passed by the Brewers' Society. In the Tory papers "inspired" articles are being published to show the colossal burden on this "suffering" industry. But there is nothing about colossal monopolies and the colossal profits, and—above all—there is no hint of how, last summer, prices were put up to the consumer to an extent that gave the brewers a very handsome profit on new taxes.
