Fletcherized Speech Base For Divorce Action—Talks on Instalment Plan.

New York, May 21.—Married life with a man who fletcherizes his conversation is far from being a joy forever, according to Mrs. Anna Spinelli, of Paterson, N.J., whose suit for divorce was heard Monday by Special Master Henry Marelli. Among other assorted grievances she charges her husband with cruelty and "excessive stammering." She asserts that in the four months that they have been married he has become the champion of champions in the art of stammering.

In her complaint she admits that her husband was a silver-tongued orator before they were married. She says that she had no difficulty in understanding him when he asked her to assist him in carrying his name, but that soon after the ceremony his talk became tarted, a statement which has caused her husband's lawyer to assert that his client acquired the stammering habit through an intellectual effort to get a word in edgewise, Spinelli's appearance at the hearing didn't help his case any. HALTS THE ATTACK

COMMANDER SERVES NOTICE ON WARRING FACTIONS.

Nicaraguan Government Had Sent Steamer to Open Fire on the City—Insurgents Won't Surrender.

Washington, May 21.—Commander W. W. Gilmer, U.S.N., commanding officer of the gunboat Paducah, now at Bluefields, Nicaragua, has served notice on the revolutionary forces that no fighting will be allowed in the city of Bluefields and that only such armed forces not exceeding one hundred men shall be allowed in Bluefields as are necessary for policing the town until a stable government is established.

Commander Gilmer will not allow the steamer Alexandria to bombard the city as there is no armed force in Bluefields.

Such a bombardment, Commander Gilmer believes, will only result in the unnecessary destruction of the lives and property of American and other foreign non-combatants.

Senior Irla, the commander of the revolutionary forces that he intended to bombard the town if the insurgents did not surrender.

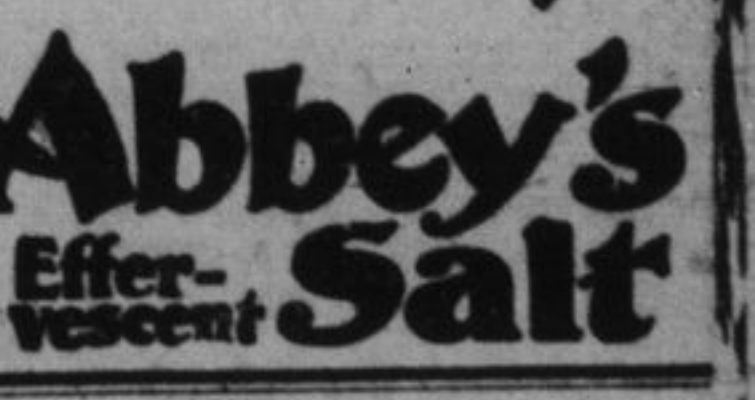

three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$50.00.
