A MINERAL SEARCH
To be Conducted in Quebec by Queen's Men.

A. M. Bateman, B.Sc., mining engineer, of Kingston, is in Montreal, where he will be joined by Prof. J. C. Gwillim, professor of mining, in the faculty of applied science at Queen's University, and together they will leave for Northern Quebec, where they will spend the summer. They have been commissioned by the mines department of the Quebec government to make a prospecting tour through the northern part of the province and to make a report upon the mineralogical and geological formations generally. The project is in accord with the policy of Hon. Charles R. Duxin, minister of mines in the Quebec government who was convinced of the mineral wealth of the northern part of the province by recent finds along the route of the National Transcontinental railway. One of the largest and most valuable discoveries of molybdenite in the world was made along the railway route a few months ago.
