HERD IS DESTROYED

JOHN HANNAH, A ST. JOHN MILK-MAN, SUFFERS LOSS.

Fire Broke Out in Stable at Night, Supposed to Have Been Started by a Tramp.

St. John, N.B., May 28.—Twenty-three head of cattle, comprising the whole milk herd of John Hannah, a milkman here, were burned to death late on Monday night in a fire which destroyed his barn. It is believed to have been caused by a tramp going in there to sleep and lighting a match to locate a place. There were no survivors of a man being burned to death in the fire, but search has revealed no evidence.

When the neighbors and firemen gathered it was too late to save any of the cattle, and the ruins showed the havoc of the flames, twenty-two charred carcasses being all that was left of the herd, with the busy season just opening. He valued the stock at \$1,000 outside the profits. He had only \$500 insurance. The building, owned by David Corkery, was insured.

BENEFITS OF YAWNING

Is Valuable in Diseases of the Throat.

Dr. Emil Banti, of Vienna, Austria, in speaking of diseases of the throat and remedies, said that yawning had its great value. Yawning has recently been recommended, independently as a valuable exercise for the respiratory organs.

"According to Dr. Naegeli, of the University of Luetich," said Dr. Banti, "yawning brings all the respiratory muscles of the chest and throat into action, and is, therefore, the best and most natural means of strengthening them. He advises everybody to yawn as deeply as possible, with arms outstretched, in order to change completely the air in the lungs and stimulate respiration. In many cases he has found the practice to relieve the difficulty in swallowing and disturbance of the sense of hearing that accompany catarrh of the throat. The patient is induced to yawn through suggestion, imitation of a preliminary exercise in deep breathing."
