THE MUSKRAT

More People Trap This Little Animal Than Others.

In America nearly 10,000 people trap the muskrat, or muskrat, every year. More people trap this little animal than any other. It is claimed that the greatest number of skins are taken in Minnesota and the Red River district. Most of the pelts are exported.

The skins are very uniform in color, usually a dark brown. However, those of Alaska and the Mackenzie district are very light in color. The black pelts or those which are nearly so come from the southern sections, although occasionally a few are found in other localities.

The muskrat is very prolific. In some latitudes, says Fur News, it has three litters of young in a summer and from three to five young in each litter. The animals are nocturnal in their habits, but are often seen during the day. Muskrats, it is said, thrive best in sluggish streams, lakes and marshes. In appearance it is very much like the beaver, and its habits are very similar.

History teaches how wonderful is the power of example. A short time ago Operator Binns stood by his instrument sending messages for help for his sinking ship northward, east and west. He immediately to his heroic task. How the story of his gallant act thrilled. There was not a reader or hearer of it but felt an impulse to do likewise in times of danger.
