MYSTERY OF TELEPHONE.

Calgary, Alta., June 1.—That Thomas White, whose body was found on the trail near the Sarcee reservation, met with foul play, was the opinion of coroner Sanson. The circumstances connection with the case are mysterious. A telephone message was received at the mounted police barracks, Saturday, stating that there was a dead body on the reservation trail. The man who telephoned would not give his name. A man went to the site designated and could not find the corpse. He went back Sunday afternoon and located it and brought it to the city.

Postmortem revealed that White had met a violent death. An inquest will be held and an effort made to locate the man who telephoned. White was identified by papers found in his pockets.

Mevin Sweet, farmer of Lyndhurst, died on Tuesday after an illness of nearly one year with Bright's disease. Mr. Sweet was upwards of fifty years of age and leaves a wife and family.
