NO DEMAND FOR IT

EXPORT TRADE IN CHEESE IS  
VERY DULL.

And, Therefore, the Trade in Canada  
is Not Very Bright—The Output is  
High Owing to the Abundant  
Grass.

Montreal, June 1.—The market this week for cheese is opening with an easy tendency, and prices in the country are sagging owing to the small number of orders coming from Great Britain, and unless there is a speedy improvement we may confidently look for lower prices to rule this week than prevailed in the country a week ago. At Campbellford, this morning, the offerings were all sold at 10¢, and 10 11¢, but, in the afternoon the buyers' limits were generally reduced, and the top price offered was 10 9 16¢, at which price the factotymen were obliged to sell or go home with their cheese. Even at these prices there is no demand for export, and cables so far this week have been few and far between whatever have come this way being of a decidedly blue type, and have all talked lower prices, poor trade, etc. The course of prices here depends entirely upon the demand from Great Britain, and if there is no improvement in this respect we can not expect a very lively market in Canada. The receipts are increasing very rapidly, and this is having a deterrent effect upon the trade here and on the other side, and most people talk confidently of much lower prices in the near future.

The receipts of cheese into Montreal last week amounted to 45,679 boxes, as compared with 37,151 boxes for the corresponding week a year ago, an increase of over twenty per cent., the total receipts to date being 101,808 boxes as compared with 93,882 boxes for the same period last year. This increase is likely to be continued for some time, as reports from all parts of the country tell of exceptionally favorable conditions for making.

The shipments to date have not been quite as heavy as last year, the total for this year being 93,711 boxes as against 101,168 boxes for the same period last year, and is probably due to the small demand from Great Britain for immediate shipment, the supply of cheese on the other side at present being somewhat heavier than it was a year ago.

The market for butter is still strong, in spite of the heavy receipts, and prices have been well maintained throughout the week. The country markets last week-end sold at from 22¢ to 23¢ per lb., at factories

but on Monday the ruling price paid was 23¢, and on this basis considerable business has been done locally, the prices here for fancy creamery being 23¢ per lb., for solids in round lots, with prints quoted at one-half cent per pound more. A few small lines of undergrades were offered at about 22¢, but the quantity was small, and was soon disposed of.

There is still considerable business going with the west and several more carloads have been shipped out from here. The local demand was also exceptionally good, and large quantities have been turned over this week.

EUROPE'S HOTELS LEAD.

Better Food and Better Servants, Says Mr. Marshall.

London, June 1.—Walton Marshall, of the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel sailed for New York on Friday after a month in Europe, partly on business and partly on pleasure. The latter consisted of a motorizing trip while the former had as its object the studying of the principal hotels in Europe with a view to introducing the latest innovations for comfort and expedition in the Vanderbilt hotel, which is being erected in New York, and which Mr. Marshall will manage when it is ready next year. Mr. Marshall says that he has gained a lot of useful information on his trip.

"I am very pleased with what I have seen, and I think that many things might be applied to the Vanderbilt with advantage," he says. "While it is manifestly unfair to compare the New York hotels with those in Europe owing to the tremendous difference in size, I must say that the European hotels are ahead of ours in the restaurant department—especially in regard to motion and poultry. In fact, I don't know why it is, but the food material all around Europe is ahead of ours."

From the structural point of view New York hotels are away ahead of those here, while we spend a lot more money in providing music for our guests. Another point in favor of the European hotels is the excellence of the servants compared with the average New York servant. The trouble is that Americans will spoil their servants while here they are kept rigorously in their place. But then, again, the supply here is far in excess of the demand in America."
