TRIM GIRL'S PHOTOS.

Put Ban on Those of Students in Male Attire.

In accordance with a new faculty edict, no photographs of the girls at Wellesley College who take part in college plays in male costumes may be taken in the future. Also it was ordered today that none of the existing photographs of the students in male attire, taken during the May Day frolics or barn-burnings, be allowed to leave the grounds until all untrimmed legs have been trimmed from the pictures.

The action was taken because of the recent publication of two pictures of Wellesley girls in trousers. The pictures were taken at a number of the frolics by a horrified "mamma," and hence the order to cut off at the waist all photos of girls in other than skirts.

Even or Odd?

The Man On Watch.

The Lampan does not agree with a townsmen who wrote a letter to the Whig newspaper declaring that the artillery band should not be sent to play the Catholic soldiers to St. Mary's cathedral on account of the small number in the procession, there being twice as many musicians as followers. He cannot see why one church should have all the music just because there happens to be more of its adherents in the artillery. He thinks the band should also be sent to play the Presbyterians to the kirk up on Princess street for there are twenty artillerymen who march there every Sabbath morning, and a little more in front than would not be amiss. Probably Col. Burstell could send a couple of pipes along with the adherents of the Scotch church, and head the parade with a Scotch flag. The other church parades might also be headed by flags to designate them.

And while talking on the military and the church the Lampan would like to know why the 14th regiment is not taken to a Presbyterian church once in a while. Out of the thirty-two officers attached to the corps he is told that thirteen are Presbyterians. Last year Col. Cunningham took the volunteers to the Sydenham street Methodist church and this year to St. George's Anglican church. As the minister of St. Andrew's is also a military chaplain, and at the time of the Boer war offered his services to the government to accompany the Canadian contingent, and as Dr. Gordon, the principal of Queen's university, served with the 90th regiment of Winnipeg through the North-West rebellion, the Presbyterians have thus in Kingston two genuine warriors who could give a battle sermon that would be worth listening to.

The Lampan had another comment to make on military matters and that was with regard to the inspection of the Kingston volunteers last Wednesday evening. While inspections and reviews may make corps more alert, still he thinks that the test the 14th riflemen were put to was of no benefit to them. He hears, however, that the officers of the corps learned something that evening, and that was that General French does not like delays, even in sham fight exhibitions.

If anyone could inform him how much it cost the corporation of the town of Kingston to mourn on the occasion of the death of his late majesty the Lampan would be obliged. Judging from what looked like a few black shoe strings that were hung out on the market end of the town buildings it did not cost more than a few dollars. When the finance committee of the town council decides on behalf of the people of this old town to mourn again for the late majesty, the town's sovereign statesman the Lampan hopes that it will be big enough to spend at least twenty-five dollars.

A SNAKE STORY.

Old Time Serpent That Talked Like a Man.

Ashton leaves us in the dark as to what the "connoisseur" men did, but it is natural to suppose that they surrendered at once.
