The manufacturers and merchants are to be canvassed for assistance in this work.

## KINRADE MURDER.

Authorities Think it May Yet Be Solved.

Provincial Detective John Miller, who has been in London investigating pocket-picking cases, which, it is said, will result in the arrest of a number of crooks of wide repute in police circles, was interviewed about the celebrated Kinrade case.

"Still holding to the original theory of the murder?" the officer was asked.

"There has been nothing to disturb that theory," he replied.

Recently the Hamilton newspaper published an alleged interview with Mr. Wright, the husband of Florence Kinrade, in which Wright was quoted as saying the police made one great mistake in not having searched the house the day of the murder.

The detective refused to discuss the case, other than to intimate that the crown had not dropped the matter from the view. The prosecution have left the way open to unravel the mystery if opportunity offers, and have not despaired of discovering evidence that will prove either the truth or falsity of their theories.

## A CANFIELD MONTE CARLO.

Saratoga Wizard Said to Have a Concession.

Mexico City, June 10.—Mr. representing themselves as agents for Richard Canfield, have given out a statement here to the effect that he will open a gambling establishment at Taxco, a few miles from the capital, designed to rival Monte Carlo. Canfield, it is said, has already obtained a concession.

It is announced that all the parapsychists from Canfield's house at Saratoga, N. Y., will be shipped here immediately. Taxco is a year-round resort. The Casino will be remodelled and landscape gardeners from abroad are coming here.

It is asserted that the resort will be greater than Monte Carlo in a few years and will have government protection.
