TO ERECT TELEPHONE POLES ON COUNTY ROADS.

The Matter Referred by County Council to its Solicitor—To Enquire Regarding Registry Office Fees.

At the county council's Thursday morning session, Dr. William Spankie, inspector, presented his annual report on the Frontenac schools, which is given in full in another column.

A by-law was passed to raise \$30,000 overdraft at the Bank of Montreal. Another by-law was introduced to raise money for road purposes. The amount is equal to two mills on the dollar.

These recommendations of the property committee were adopted: That the chairman have power to have the contract with J. C. Lemmon & Sons for keeping the court house roof in repair cancelled forthwith, as in the committee's opinion with, as it is not lived up to the contract; that a set of roller shelves be bought for the registry office; that tender of S. Anglin & Co., for \$670 at \$6.75 a ton, and wood at \$6.70 at \$6.75 a ton, be accepted. Property accounts to the amount of \$890.42 were passed.

These recommendations of the roads and bridges committee were adopted: That the committee examine Cross Lake bridge and have power to act; that the chairman and Councillor the Salmon examine the bridge on the boundary between the townships of Barrie and Kaledar; that the chairman and Councillor Trowsdale examine Belrock bridge, in Portland township, with power to act.

Wilton was appointed a committee to interview the county solicitor and find out the financial relation of the council to the registry office. The law does not seem to be clear as to what percentage of the fees collected should go to the county.

A by-law was given a first reading fixing the assessment equalization of the various townships the same as last year. The total assessment is \$6,342,517.

J. H. Hughson addressed the council and asked that the right be granted to the Leeds and Frontenac Rural Telephone companies to erect poles on county roads. Mr. Hughson said that several townships had given the company a discussion took place as to who would be responsible for accidents that might occur by placing obstructions on the county roads. It was decided to give a by-law a first reading and refer it to the county solicitor for his opinion. The extra grant of \$600 to the Sydenham high school was revoked for the ensuing year.

WANT ANOTHER RACE. Carson's Backers Think His Horse Can Win.

The backers of W. H. Carson's May Wax want another match race with Syka Direct, the W. H. Carson champion pacer, and offer to put up another \$500 that May Wax can beat the Hawkins mare. They would like the race to take place in six weeks' time, when May Wax would be in better condition. The Kingston pacer needs a little more attention and some more weight. It has a faster movement than Syka Direct, but the latter has more stamina. The driver whom "Jack" Hart put behind May Wax for the last heat in Wednesday's race was John Fleming, one of Toronto's best trainers and drivers. As soon as Fleming started out with the little pacer, he knew she was "fall in" and, therefore, did not press her.

Elected Captains. The Portmouth Baseball Club elected the captains of the teams last night. Allan Davidson was elected captain of the senior team, and Michael Kennedy captain of the junior team. They have some good material to pick from, and are open to all games with any of the city teams, challenges to be forwarded to either captains.

Ready to Play Ball. At a meeting of the crew of the steamer Toronto, the following officers were elected to look after the baseball interests of the steamer: Honorary president, Capt. C. E. Beaman; president, J. Walter Hart; first vice-president, L. Warwick; second vice-president, George Smith; secretary, W. Nicholson; treasurer, Dr. R. S. Devlin; captain, J. J. Gynor; manager, S. Dalrymple; official scorer, R. Irvine. A challenge has been sent to the steamer Kingston Baseball Club, for a game to be played at Bayville Park, Toronto, in the near future, for the championship of the Toronto waterfront.

DISTRICT I.O.O.F. MEETING Was Held in the City on Wednesday Night.

The annual meeting of the district committee, in connection with the Independent Order of Oddfellows, in this district, was held, on Wednesday evening, in the Oddfellows' hall, in Y.M.C.A. block, J. Smith, Elphin, D.D. (G.M. presided, and every lodge in the district was represented, excepting one. The report of the D.D.G.M. was full and comprehensive, and in addition to the discussion of various subjects pertaining to the order, it gave information with regard to the membership, the growth in assets, and the distribution of the sick and funeral benefits. The report of the secretary-treasurer gave the receipts and disbursements during the district year. The assets of the lodges have increased from \$36,567.13 to \$59,692.72, or a gain in the year of \$23,125.59. The sick benefits amounted to \$2,650.14, and the funeral benefits to \$265. Kingston was chosen as the place of meeting in 1911, and the officers elected were: N. R. Gardiner, Gananoque, D.D.G.M.; R. J. Dick, Kingston, secretary-treasurer.

THE SYNOD RESOLUTION

In Regard to the Catholic Bishop's Oath.

Kingston, June 16.—(To the Editor): For the benefit of your readers, who, from perusal of the "erroneous resolution presented, yesterday, in the Anglican synod, therefore, in this city, may have formed a false notion regarding the oath taken by Catholic bishops at their consecration, I herewith submit for comparison copies, respectively, of the resolution as appearing in the daily press, and of the real oath taken by Catholic bishops, not only in Quebec but the world over, as found in the Roman pontifical, the authorized ceremonial of the Catholic church:

Notice of motion was given by Rural Dean Dobb, seconded by Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald: "That whereas in oaths imposed upon the members of the Jesuit order and upon the Roman Episcopate in the province of Quebec the king of England is described as a usurper because his succession has not received the sacred so-called confirmation of the pope; therefore, inasmuch as for other reasons, this synod is of the opinion that no change should be made in the coronation oath of the sovereign of this empire. Also that a copy of this resolution be sent to his majesty the king, to the Archbishop of Canterbury and the prime minister of England."

The real oaths as taken by the bishop of Quebec and by bishops all over the world: "I, \_\_\_\_\_, elected to the office hereof, will be obedient to the blessed Peter the apostle and the Holy Roman church, and to his successors canonically elected. I will assist them to retain and defend the Roman papacy, without detriment to my order. I shall take care to preserve, to defend, to uphold and to execute the rights, honors, privileges and authority of the Holy Roman church of our Lord, the pope and his successors. I shall observe with all my strength and shall cause to be observed by others, the rules of the holy fathers, the apostolic decrees, provisions and mandates. I shall execute when called to a synod unless prevented by canonical impediment. I shall make personal visits ad limina apostolorum every ten years and I shall render to our Holy Father, Pope Pius X, and to his vicar general, the accounts of my pastoral office and of all things pertaining in any manner whatever to the state of my church, to the discipline of the clergy and the people and finally to the salvation of the souls entrusted to me; and in return I shall humbly the apostolic mandates and exco- cutoes as diligently as possible. But if I shall be detained by legitimate impediment I shall fulfill all the aforesaid things through a designated delegate, having a special mandate for this purpose, a priest of my diocese, or through some other person of regular priest of known probity, and religion fully informed concerning the above named things. I shall not sell, nor mortgage the possessions belonging to my mensa, nor shall I enfeoff them anew or alienate them in any manner, without the consent of the chapter of my church without consulting the Roman pontiff. And if through me any alienation shall occur I wish by the very fact to incur the punishments contained in the constitution published concerning this matter. So help me God and these Holy Evangelists of God."

The mere reading of the above copies is sufficient to show the intelligent reader that the real bishop's oath does not contain the offensive references to the king, as alleged in the synodical resolution. These references are found in a fictitious document, that, since the death of the late king, has been copied in the non-Catholic press. Like all others of its kind designed to bring odium upon the Catholic church it is a clumsy forgery of some anti-Catholic writer or lecturer.—Yours faithfully, CHAS. J. MEA.
