INJUSTICE CLAIMED

BUT THE COUNTY COUNCIL TOOK NO ACTION
On Cheese Board's Second Plea—Grant Asked for During Convention—Raps for the Peddlers.
The county council was addressed, on Thursday afternoon by Bryon Gordon, Joseph McGrath and Frederick Valleau, of the Frontenac cheese board who asked the council to make a grant towards securing the meeting in Kingston next winter of the Eastern Ontario Dairyman's Association. The place that granted the most money to the association to pay its expenses and was satisfactory got the convention. The holding of the convention in Kingston would be a great thing for Frontenac. Councillor Rankin moved, seconded by Councillor Gordon, that a grant of \$200 be made towards the convention, if such be held in Kingston.

Councillor Kennedy opposed the grant, as he didn't think the county's finances warranted special grants of the kind. Councillor Hamilton wanted the matter laid over till Friday to see how the finances of the county stood. Councillors Trousdale and Miller moved in amendment that the matter be held over till Friday's session. The amendment was carried.

Mr. Gordon, on behalf of the cheese board, stated that the council had misunderstood the resolution of the board regarding the dairy school. The object of the resolution was to ask the council to call the attention of the justice done to the cheese factories around Kingston by operating a creamery in connection with the school.

Mr. Valleau stated that he had word from the department at Toronto that the government did not intend to operate a creamery as a business enterprise, but to only operate it for experimental purposes. He claimed that the present operation of the dairy school creamery was an injustice. For experimental purposes, 1,500 to 2,000 pounds of milk was sufficient, yet the school was taking 15,000 pounds of milk a day.

Councillor Sleath said he did not like to turn down thirty or forty farmers who were getting the benefit of the dairy school creamery for the sake of one or two factory owners. Mr. McGrath said that what the cheese board held was that it was unfair to conduct the dairy school creamery as a commercial enterprise. Those who had money invested in a cheese factory did not want to be forced to compete with a government creamery, which is paying one dollar for milk when the highest the factories are paying is ninety cents. The government has placed restrictions on factories, and it costs money to keep them up.

MEASURES' CONFESSION.
A Long Series of Robberies at Cobalt.

Cobalt, June 16.—John Menard, who confessed to several highway robberies in Cobalt, was sentenced to four years in penitentiary. He implicated Frank Dunn as his confederate. He stated in detail that he, Frank Dunn and a third man went into the store of Charles Aug, assaulted him, and took away a sum of money. Dunn will be tried on Friday. There had been hold-ups and robberies weekly just before the arrest of these two men.

Must Pay For Reservation.
Montreal, June 17.—Announcement is made that, taking effect June 19th, all the railways in Canada will adopt a new arrangement in regard to the reservation of sleeping and parlor cars. Space for reservation will be made in sleeping or parlor cars unless paid for at the time of making the reservation. When reservations are made, from points outside of a radius of five miles from cities, they may be held until the departure of the car from the place at which the space is reserved.

Alfred Gadbury, Long Point, Passed Away Suddenly.
Long Point, June 14.—The road commissioners are busy improving the roads. There will be a good stone road now clear through to Ellenville, from the schoolhouse corner. Isaac Larose returned home last week from the Hotel Dieu hospital, Kingston, where he had been for the past few weeks, having undergone two critical operations.

Alfred Gadbury died suddenly, yesterday afternoon, at W. Johnston's, Sweet's Corners. He was an aged man and had been a resident here for a couple of years, following the occupation of gardener. He had only been at work for a short time when Mr. Johnston found him dead in the field. His funeral takes place to-day at Lyndhurst.

The baseball team went to Battersea on Wednesday, June 8th, and played a match game with the Battersea team, defeating them by a small score. There is talk of a school picnic being held here on the 25th of June, in Warren's grove. William Warren and J. T. Moorhead left for the North-West a few days ago. STORINGTON COUNCIL.
Assessments Altered, Accounts Passed and Grants Made.

The court of revision met at Sunbury on Monday, May 30th, at 11 a.m. Members all present. On motion, Ritchie-Taylor, John Green's assessment reduced \$25; John Jackson's business assessment struck off, he having no business; John and Michael Tierney's assessment on 33 and 34, Con. 12, reduced \$100; J. Gilbert and J. Ferris' assessment on lot 16, Con. 10, reduced \$50; Alexander Darling's assessment on lots 15 and 16, Con. 15, reduced \$50; business assessment on the Perfect Brick and Tile plant placed at \$250, and that of William McElroy at \$500. Assessment roll adopted with above alterations.

The council met at 2 p.m., with members all present. Minutes of the last meeting adopted. Communications were read from the British Whig Publishing company, and from the inspector of public charities regarding Mrs. Cornell. On motion, Taylor-Shepherd, resolved that Councillors Hanley and Ritchie examine the culverts on Shannon and Seeley's Bay roads and repair if necessary. On motion, Ritchie-Shepherd, resolved that the clerk communicate with the inspector of charities for full particulars regarding Mrs. Mary Cornell, with power to make a settlement for the same.

Bills ordered paid: Reuben Clark, \$1.50, drawing plank for Milburn bridge; Thomas Gordon, \$5, building culvert on 2nd Con. and 23 for building and keeping pound; Robert Levy, \$46, assessing township, and \$4 for postage and stationery in connection with the same. On motion, Ritchie-Hanley, resolved that taxes charged against John Randall be struck off and that the collector's time be extended to May 10th. On motion, Hanley-Shepherd, the following grants will be made: Division No. 6, \$25; division No. 19, \$25; division No. 43, \$25; division No. 25, \$75; also \$25 towards building sidewalks in village of Battersea. Council adjourned to meet again on last Monday in August.

THIRD TO ATLANTIC

GRAND TRUNK TO UTILIZE THE LAKE STEAMSHIPS.
The Main Line Through Ontario and Down to Lewis, and From There by the National Transcontinental and Intercolonial to Halifax and St. John.

Montreal, June 15.—It was stated to-day by Charles M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific railways, that by this fall there would be a third line connecting the head of the great lakes, at St. John and Halifax, furnishing a third through line for Atlantic coast wheat and other exports. This line will as yet be a composite one, but it will enable the carrying of cargoes to the Grand Trunk ports at the foot of the lakes, and the making up of through trains down clear through to the Atlantic ports. Included in this plan are the use of the Grand Trunk boats on the great lakes, the Grand Trunk system to Lewis, the use of the completed Grand Trunk Pacific to Moncton and the Intercolonial from Moncton to Halifax and St. John. According to the statement of Mr. Hays, this will be in operation this fall, probably before the close of lake navigation, so that the new through system from the lakes to the Atlantic will be an accomplished fact in time to take part in the transportation of wheat. At the same time the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific from Port William to Winnipeg, where it connects with the western system to Edmonton, will prove a great factor in getting the crop out, so that by this fall the new Transcontinental will become a very important factor in the transportation system of the Dominion.

BISHOP AND LORDS.

Frank and Straight Words on Very Important Issue.

Bishop Mills in his annual address to the diocese of Ontario at Kingston, on Tuesday, dealt with the situation in Britain, and spoke frank and straight words on the relation of hereditary privileges to social injustice. His lordship, like every intelligent and unprejudiced Canadian who studies the British situation at close range, was impressed by the reality of the crisis and the inevitableness of reorganization. He evidently does not agree with the radical wing of the radicals in the House of Lords rather than with the conservatives.
